

vote by congress and after this, approval by a majority of the state legislature.

The new congress before which the proposal of the Episcopate will be placed, is to begin its sessions September 1. The campaign will be handled by Catholic laymen, as participation in politics by churchmen is forbidden by law.

NATION-WIDE EFFORT.

It has been planned to organize a nation-wide political party to support the amending of the constitution. This party will avoid adopting a Catholic name or violating the laws prohibiting participation by religious parties in the politics of the country. At the Episcopate, it was said today that church services in Mexico, will be resumed when the religious regulations are modified. It was declared that the Episcopate was without power to call off the economic boycott instituted by the league for defense of religious liberty, which has brought about a considerable dislocation in trade, since the league, not the Episcopate, ordered it.

Seize Beer at Moncton Freight Shed

CHARGES AGAINST TWO C.N.R. OFFICIALS

Evidence Taken and Cases Adjourned to Monday and Tuesday

MONCTON, Aug. 20—The enforcement of the New Brunswick prohibition law and the extent of the inspector, authority under the act towards the suppression of illegal importation of Quebec beer to the province was tested out in the Moncton police court before Judge MacDougall, today, when H. B. Ayer, local freight agent of the C. N. R. and Charles Cole, freight shed employe, appeared before the judge to answer to charges, in the first case of obstructing or attempting to obstruct an officer making a search on the C. N. R. premises and, in the second case, with obstructing a peace officer in the execution of his duties.

The first charge was preferred under the terms of the N. B. Prohibition Act against Mr. Ayer, while the second charge was made under the criminal code against Mr. Cole.

They were ordered out of the freight shed by Mr. Cole, witness continued, and Inspector Kelver went to secure a search warrant, which was produced to Freight Agent Ayer, who said to them the warrant was no good. But the officers continued going into the freight shed and there they encountered more opposition when attempting to make the search, Inspector Bourgeois informing the court that Mr. Ayer took him by the coat to show him to the door. The cases of alleged ale were, however, taken for rebilling to Fredericton, but they had, in the interval until the procuring of the search warrant by Inspector Kelver, been taken by rallway handlers and locked in the bond room.



LONDON, Aug. 21-A remarkable statment with reference to the private fortune of the late Tsar of Russia has just appeared in the Italian Press. On the authority of a high perso age formerly at the "Court of Nicholas II." it is declared that a capital sum of approximately \$60,000,000, plus accrued interest, is still in deposit in London for the late Tsar's accoun and that the surviving members of the Imperial Family are disposed to leave the manner of its distribution among them to the decision of some such arbiter as King George or King Victor


There is difficulty, however, in the absence of legal proof that the Tsar and his family are dead.

According to the authority quoted, the Tsar's fortune, deposited in London, was at the outbreak of war very much greater than the sum now mentioned. After the Revolution further considerable turns were withdrawn to finance plans or the escape of the Imperial prisners.

Claim Made Tunney Cannot Hit Hard-Will Prokably Make Attack on Body

NEW YORK, Aug. 21-Jack Dempsey's biggest concern as he prepares himself for his fight with Gene Tunney will be to find out how much has been taken out of his weapons by three years of idleness.

three years of idleness.

In training he can find out how good his wind is and correct any deficiency by proper exercise and diet. He can find out how strong his legs are and do more roadwork if he thinks he hasn't the proper strength. He can improve his speed and his boxing by sparring with fast and shifty partners.

But there is no way for him to recover any lost mental spark, the thing called co-ordination which makes the hand and foot respond to the eye and the brain automatically.

All the work he could do in the gymnasium or the training camp would not improve an eye that was one-thousandth of the second slow because the best of sparring partners are not good enough to give him the real test or they would not be sparring partners.

Not many critics give Tunney a big chance. They admit that Tunney is young but they do not class him as a killing puncher. They admit that the long absence from the ring may have impaired Dempsey's speed, eye and boxing but they refer to the Carpentier and Firpo fights as proof that Dempsey can take it even no matter how many times Tunney hits him.

But, if memory serves correctly. Dempsey was hit by Carpentier and Firpo when he was stepping back or rolling with the punch. He didn't have to take the double force that a boxer gets when he steps into a punch or "runs into one" as the boxers put it.

WILL MAKE BODY ATTACK

Tunney no doubt has figured for some time that his chance for victory rested on an attack to the body, based perhaps on the belief that Dempsey would be hurt more inside by his long absence from the ring.

Before Dempsey went to his training camp, some friends in New York gave him the laugh when he said he was not taking Tunney lightly.

"Explain, if you can," one of them said, "how you can lose unless you're in such bad shape that you collapse from your own exertion. Tunney can't hurt you—"

"Listen," Dempsey interrupted, "an wan can be hurt if he's hit in the right spot, and I've got just as many right spots as any other champion."
