ADJOURNMENTS MADE Both cases were proceeded with after hearing the evidence of prohibition inspectors Bourgeois and Keiver in both instances, adjournment was made by the magistrate until Monday.

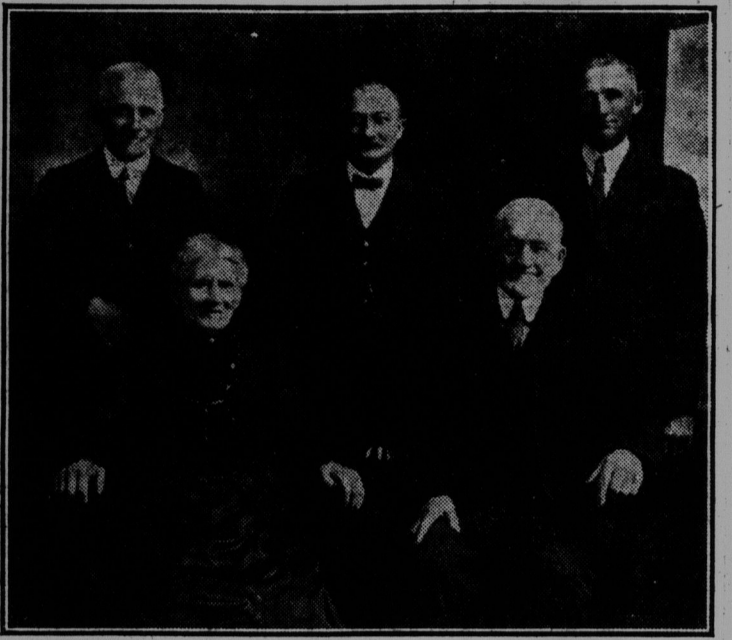
EX-TSAR'S FORTUNE SAID TO BE DEPOSITED IN LONDON BANK

LONDON, Aug. 21.—A remarkable statement with reference to the private fortune of the late Tsar of Russia has just appeared in the Italian Press. On the authority of a high personage formerly at the "Court of Nicholas II." it is declared that a capital sum of approximately \$60,000,000, plus accrued interest, still deposited in London for the late Tsar's account and that the surviving members of the Imperial Family are disposed to leave the manner of its distribution among them to the decision of some such officer as King George or King Victor Emmanuel.

Why Do Men Cease to be Lovers After Marriage?—The Worried Engaged Girl Whose Fiance Insults Her With Jealousy—Should Wife No. 2 Be On Friendly Terms With Divorced Wife No. 1?

DEAR MISS DIX—Please tell me one thing which I cannot understand. Why is it that a man can court a girl for three years and become more and more infatuated with her and want her car more than ever, while after marriage he gets tired of her in a few months?

ANSWER: Various answers may be given to your question, Miss Cynical. One way to answer it is by the parable of the man who said that he ceased to chase a street car after he had caught it, which, being interpreted, means that courtship is a means to an end, and that having won his objective, the man who has married the lady the lover automatically ceases wooing her.

Again, your question may be answered by saying that the reason why men show less enthusiasm over getting parties after marriage than they did before is because we are foolish enough to make kissing obligatory in the family circle. Therefore, nobody wants to do it. You can't keep any kind of a peck on the cheek that becomes a daily habit and that you do because you are expected to do it.

The very fact that a husband and wife have to kiss each other every time they part and every time they meet, no matter whether they have any desire to kiss or not, strikes a death blow at romance and robs the kisses of all meaning.

For a kiss to be worth having it must have flavor to it. It must be inspired by love, by tenderness, by desire and no one is always in the mood for these things.

Hence it is inevitable that the conjugal kiss, which must be given at station intervals as a matter of duty, would degenerate into nothing but a peck on the cheek that is an insult to both the giver and the receiver.

If married couples had enough sense to cut out all the ham-and-egg flavored occasions, which is given by a man who is grabbing for his hat with his mind on the business problems of the day and received by a woman whose thoughts are centered on getting the children off to school and what she will order for dinner, kissing might be restored to the status it occupied in their pre-nuptial days. There would be fewer kisses, but they would have more pep in them.

As for your theory that a man falls out of love with his wife as soon as he marries, that is a mistake, unless the woman proves very disappointing and disillusioning. That is, generally speaking, of course, there are a few men who are philanderers by nature and that no woman could hold but the great majority of men are fairly well domesticated and they are generally a lot fonder of their wives than they were of their sweethearts.

The very fact that a man has picked out a woman to be his wife and bestowed his name upon her makes him think better of her, just as he thinks better of an automobile as soon as it becomes his property.

The only reason that he is less demonstrative after marriage than he was before marriage is that he doesn't feel that he has to be. Not many Americans are glib lovers. They feel foolish handing out soft talk, and they are glad when it is over, but they can say it with clothes and food.

The mistake that women make is in not understanding this and realizing that the men who work like dray horses to make them comfortable are really proving their devotion every day in every way, even if they are dumb when it comes to loving and making their kisses as fluffy as cold buckwheat cakes.

DEAR MISS DIX—I am a good, honest, settled and sensible girl and engaged to a man whom I love very much, but he makes me tell him everything I do during the day and when he is not with me in the evening. If I go into a store; if I speak to some one on the street, and if I am a few minutes late leaving the office he wants to know all about it and why I did what I did. I must even tell him what street car I take, exactly when it left a certain place and when I arrived at my destination. All of this is getting on my nerves and raising my disposition. What should I do about it?

ANSWER: Why, your poor little Worried Girl, there is just one sensible thing to do if you would save yourself from a life of torture and that is to break your engagement and refuse to marry the man who treats you with so little trust and consideration.

Why, the man's half insane, and if you are idiotic enough to marry him you will find yourself nothing but a prisoner. You will not be permitted to have any friends, or to go anywhere, or to have any of the natural pleasures of life. No matter how much you give in to him or how discreetly you conduct yourself you will be forever under suspicion and have your most innocent action wrongly construed.

Furthermore, you will have to listen to all sorts of vile accusations, for jealousy does not have to have anything to go on. It looks into its own black heart and puts its own dark interpretation on other people's actions.

The days of the Grand Turk are over, and the harem is an institution into which the independent American girl does not fit, so have nothing to do with a man who wants to keep you under lock and key and who forces you to frame an alibi for every minute you are away from him.

There can be no happy marriage in which there is not absolute trust between husband and wife. And there is no half-way house in trusting. It must be all in all or not at all, and so I earnestly advise you not to marry a man who does not believe you to be so straight and honest and to have such strength and integrity of character that you could be trusted to go anywhere in the world and talk to any man, and still keep your honor bright.

TODAY'S RECIPES Green Dyeing Beans—When you have strung, broken and washed the beans, put them in a large stew kettle (the old-fashioned iron kettle lends a flavor which is found neither in aluminum nor granite) with water clear over the top of the beans. Boil in this water, with a little salt added, for one hour. Then the water is drained off and a new supply covers them. At this time put in a generous amount of uncooked breakfast bacon cut into squares or cubes of about two inches, not too small for it will fall apart in cooking. (Use about one-fourth pound bacon to two pounds of beans.) The beans are then covered and cooked for three hours, adding water if necessary, but they must be just almost dry at the end of three hours. When serving the beans garnish with bacon cubes. This is not only pleasing to the eye, but very pleasant when eaten with the beans. The new potatoes may also cook with the beans, adding them about one-half hour before removing the beans from the fire. The potatoes are served separately, of course. Both beans and potatoes served very hot. Tuna Fish Salad—One can tuna fish, one-eighth cup diced cucumber, one-fourth cup diced apples, three small

Milk Record**

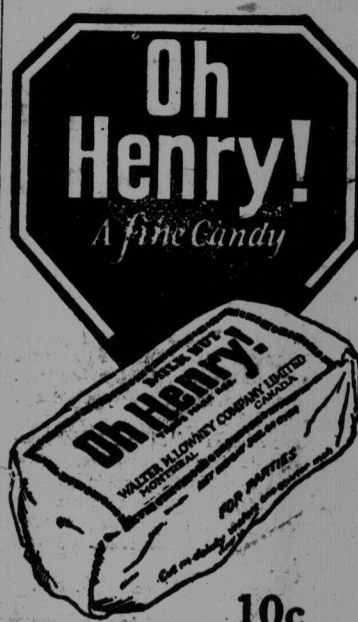

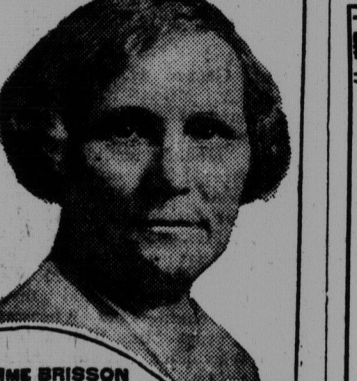

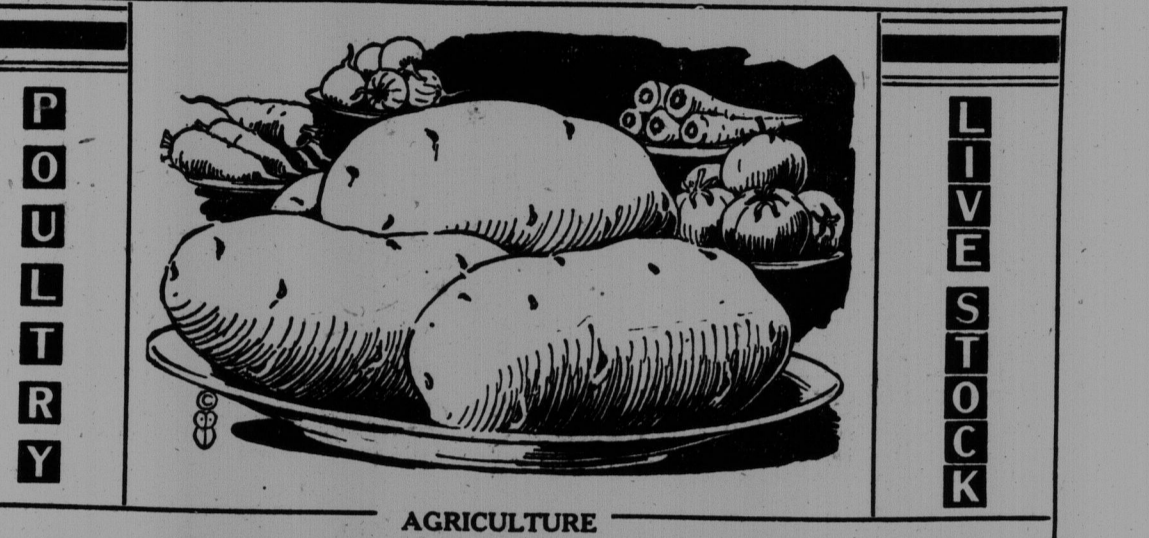

TELLS STORY OF STRUGGLE WITH EUROPE CRIME

Author Describes Police Systems in Continental Cities

LONDON, Aug. 21.—The story of the ceaseless struggle between the forces of law and the criminal element throughout Europe always makes fascinating reading, but it is especially fascinating when written by a man who, as a police reporter for many years, has had advantages denied to other writers. Such a book is "Scotland Yard," by Joseph Gollomb, in which the author describes the police systems of London, Paris, Berlin and Vienna, and compares their method with a wealth of detail and anecdote. Speaking of a case in which a flake of clay was the only real clue, Mr. Gollomb says: "The search of Scotland Yard for the bed of mud whence that clay had come thrilled me perhaps more than the flash of lightning intuition of French detectives, which mistakes perhaps more often than it hits. "Such a tedious searching," he con-

tinues, "is one of the most characteristic procedures of Scotland Yard cases, with the patience, the bulldog tenacity, the racial talent for teamwork, and the special talent of Scotland Yard for such effort these hunts have something of the inexorable quality of fate about them."
 Comparing the English and French methods, Mr. Gollomb says: "It must be something like the difference between being hunted, by plodding, unrelenting, sure-scented bloodhounds on the one hand, and on the other being potted at by marks men who shoot without seeing their quarry, but take aim by brilliant calculation. Nine times out of ten the shots go wide, but the tenth goes through the heart."

TELLS OF GERMANS.
 Speaking of the German police force, he says that "if he were an habitual criminal, no matter how clever at deceiving detectives, he might sometimes have the following nightmare: "I would dream I am being hunted, not by human beings, but by a machine. This machine uses mechanical means whose very cut of hand and hair of the head, whose walk and talk is prescribed for by military regulations; out of whom every bit of individuality has been drilled; who move not singly, but as military squads; who individually do not know what they are doing, but fit like cogs in a machine as delicate as clockwork, but with the force of a stone-crusher."
 Discussing the crime museums in the various capitals, Mr. Gollomb says that in Vienna there is the greatest collection of the kind to be found anywhere. "There is something about the mixture of fine artisan skill and laxness of morality that makes counterfeiting characteristic of Viennese crime. Here is no heavy-handed butcher murder that made the Berlin crime museum a thing I want to forget."

MUSEUM DISPLAY AT THE EXHIBITION

Dr. MacIntosh is Preparing Comprehensive and Interesting Number of Articles

Preparations for the Natural History Society's exhibit for the Saint John Exhibition are now engaging the attention of Dr. William MacIntosh and he has selected a very comprehensive and interesting collection of articles showing New Brunswick's widely varied and extensive natural resources and with this collection he will also exhibit some of the specially interesting articles from the Natural History Museum.

The Natural History Society exhibit will occupy its usual space on the gallery of the main building of the exhibition. One section will be devoted to a display of the economic minerals of the province and their products and in view of the important place the mineral wealth of the province is now

taking this section is expected to be specially noteworthy.
 The specimens to be shown will include lime, gypsum, ornamental and building stone, pottery and brick clays, metallic ores, manganese and shales. Another section will be devoted to wood products and will be something of a revelation to the ordinary citizen who does not realize how very many articles are manufactured from trees.

More than 100 specimens will be shown in this section including paper, pulp, artificial silk, chemicals, tanning bark, linoleum and gramophone discs. A very complete series of colored photographic plates showing the birds and the wild flowers of New Brunswick will also be included in the Natural History section.

INDIAN RELICS.

Some of the most interesting of the American Indian relics in implements and utensils from the museum collection and a comprehensive display of the curious specimens of arms of savage races will also be shown. There will be an educational exhibit of flax showing all stages of the plant in process of manufacture into fibre and material.

A collection of old books, the earliest dating 1637, and many of them relating to the history of New Brunswick will be shown in another section of the gallery and an Oriental exhibit

will also be arranged for. In the Oriental exhibit, Dr. MacIntosh plans to have some fine embroideries, metal work, cloisonne pieces, pottery, lacquer, clothing and ornaments.

secretary and manager of the New System Laundry, Ltd., adjournment of the case began before Mr. Justice White, in the Chancery Division of the Supreme Court yesterday morning and continued in the afternoon, in which the Civic Power Commission is asking for an injunction to restrain the New System concern from buying current from the New Brunswick Power Company, and for damages by reason of the loss of sale of current since the laundry switched from hydro to the N. B. Power Company service, was made until Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock.

The Power Commission set up the claim that the contract between the laundry and the commission, which was for one year, was automatically renewed unless notice to the contrary was given 30 days before the expiry date, and they claim that this was not done, and that the contract therefore ran for another year.

Hon. J. B. Mr. Baxter, K.C., counsel for the Power Commission, said that the motive for extending a business, as long as it was not done fraudulently, was perfectly natural and legitimate. He said that the natural motive of the Power Commission was to obtain as much business in the city as possible.

JUDGE INTERRUPTS.

Judge White interrupted Premier Baxter with the remark that this may or may not be the highest standard of Christian teaching, but it is done in everyday business.

R. A. Willet, on the witness stand, said that adequate compensation for damages, suffered by the Power Com-

mission since the laundry began to use N. B. Power Company juice, would do as well as an injunction.

C. P. Inches, K. C., counsel for the New Brunswick Power Company, asked Mr. Willet if, in bringing suit, he had any thought of getting business away from the Power Company. Mr. Willet replied that he was but following the instructions of the Commission.

Mr. Inches—"Mr. Willet, do you or do you not know whether, since this suit was started, your company has signed on customers, using Power Company current, while their contracts with the Power Company were still in force?"

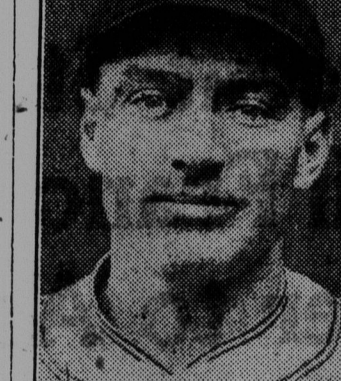
