





Latter Gets The Advantage Both Going And Coming

HOME RULE AND CUSTOMS

Why Dublin Parliament Will Not Have Control of This Branch— John Buil's Market Garden and Fattening Farm-Some Trade

(Times' Special Correspondence) Dublin, June 23-Some exceedingly significant figures on England's export trade which have just been published throw a strong light on the relations of Ireland and Great Britain and reveal at a glance the reason why Irish control of foreign trade was excluded from the home rule

the other.

The British Tariff Reform Commission recently has produced some interesting figures on Ireland's imports and exports from which deductions can be drawn which it is hardly likely the British protectionists had in mind. For instance, Ireland, which produces the best bacon in the world, exports most of it, and imports more than \$6,000,000 worth of cheap American and Canadian bacon every year to feed her own people. The fact is that Irishmen can not afford to eat their own bacon. That is reserved for British breakfast tables, while the producer has to be content with inferior stuff.

Similarly Ireland imports about \$30,000,000 worth of wheat and wheat flour every year. It is true that she does not grow much wheat now, but when her population was double what it is she produced enough bread to feed all her own people and had some over for export. This again is due to England's demand for cheap food. She gets her wheat from America. Canada, India, Russia and the Argentine, and has turned Ireland into a vast grazing ranch for fattening cattle for the butcher—and often these cattle are imported from abroad, so that Ireland does not even have the breeding of them.

What this means may be realized when it is stated that a wheat farm which would employ a dozen or more men finds a living for only one cattle herder when it is laid down to grass.







WHAT IS THE FLAG TO FLY

Here Are Two Pronouncements on Question Which Has Been Recently Raised

(Vancouver Sun.)

The secretary of state for the colonies has recently advised His Royal Highness, the governor-general, that the "Union flag is the national flag of Canada as of all other parts of His Majesty somminon, and may be flown on land by all British subjects; and that the red ensign with the arms of the Dominion of Canada in the fly is intended to be used only by Canadian merchant vexeds."

What led up to the issue of this letter by the secretary of state has not been made known to the public. A similar letter was sent Lord Grey, April 12, 1011 It would be interesting to know just what brought about such, a deliverance from Downing street. Certainly it was not the result of any discussion in which both cides were heard. We have at Ottawa in Sir Joseph Pope, the under-secretary for foreign affairs, an implicable enemy of the Canadian flag, who recently went so far as to deplore the fact that New Zealand has a flag of her own. Sir Joseph belongs to the old fogey type of thinker who believes that empire means subordination rather than co-ordination, and regards every attempt by any portion of this empire to assert its individuality in the slights degree as a prelude to separation. We will not be surprised to find that the letter from the secretary of state for the colonies has been elicited by some exparte representations made by our good Sir Joseph.

Sir Charles Tupper, on November 13, 1890, pointed out that "since about 1869 our ships have been encouraged to use the red ensign with the Canadian coat of arms in the fly," and were so known all over the world. In 1891 the governor-general—Lord Stanley—reported to the then colonial secretary that "the flag is one which has come to be considered as the recognized flag of the dominion both ashore and afloat." At the same time the British vice-admiral at Halifax supported the contention in favor of the Canadian flag. Next year the admiralty gave way and issued a warrant authorizing the use of the red ensign with the Canadian coat of arms on board vessels registered in the dominion. No doubt the Joseph Popes of those days were hotly opposed to granting even this slight concession to Canadian pride.

The same reasons which prevailed with the admiralty to authorize the use of the Canadian arms at sea are equally effective when applied to its use ashore. The flag as we have it today was constructed under the government of Sir John Macdonald about the year 1869. It floated as the official flag of Canada over the Parliament buildings at Ottawa and on all our public buildings, while Sir John Macdonald was in power (1871-4 and 1878-91), during Mr. Mackenzie's premiership (1874-8), throughout the other Conservative regimes (1801-96), and under Sir Wilfrid Laurier (1896-1904).

For a quarter of a century it remained the flag officially recognized by the people of Canada. In 1891 Lord Stanley declared that it had come to be recognized as the flag of the dominion ashore as well as afloat. If that were true in 1891, how much more obvious was the truth in 1904, after thirteen years more of continuous official usage?

There can be no doubt that if the question of the flag is properly put before the secretary of state for the colonies, an answer will be elicited very different from the one recently given. He would be reminded, for instance, of the fact that at the imperial conference of 1911 the British government agreed that Canadian warships should fly at their jackstaffs the distinctive flag of the dominion instead of the Union Jack, just as Scotland, under the statute which created the Union Jack retained the right to fly St. Andrew's cross, and England, St. George's cross, at the jackstaff, not as sea flags, but as distinctive flags of the country from which the phins in each instance series. distinctive flags of the country from which the ships in each instance came.

The Canadian in no way seeks to supplant or detract from the British flag. It would add a new feature, a fresh expres-






