La MARQUISE de FONTENOY

A Princess Visiting the States - Indian Prince Who Mingled the Ancient and the Modern - An English Admiralty Matter

Princess Leopoldine Hohenlohe, who arrived in the United States on Tuesday last on the steamship Kaiser Wilhelm II, from Bremerhaven, is the widow of Prince George a younger brother of that Victor of Hohenlohe, Duke of Ratibor, and Prince of Corvey who is president of the Imperial Automobile Club of Germany.

The princess enjoys the predilect of Serene Highness, belongs to the mediatized or formerly petty sovereign houses of Germany and Austria which are still entitled to wed on a footing of equality with the now reigning families, through her marriage, a cousin of the German Emperor and empress, of the Carina of Russia and of the great Bohemian feudal and mediatized family of Lobkowitz, which received its title of baron of the Holy Roman Empire away back in the fourteenth century, that of prince in 1666 and that of Duke of Raudnitz in 1786.

The Lobkowitzs by the by at one time owned the Duchy of Sagan, which now belongs to the French Duke of Talleyrand and to his American wife formerly Anna Gould, or rather, I should say, to their little boy, who is now Duke of Sagan.

Princess Leopoldine Hohenlohe is the sister of the chief of the Lobkowitz family Prince Ferdinand, Duke of Raudnitz, who plays an important part in Austrian politics, as a member of the house of Austria in Vienna. He is a privy councillor of the emperor and like his father and grandfather before him a knight of the Order of the Golden Fleece.

Death of an Indian Prince - India's premier prince and vassal ruler, the Nizam of Hyderabad who died suddenly the other day presents a remarkable blend of the Orient and of the Occident.

In this way that he had absorbed without losing his Indian character an extraordinary amount of western culture without departing from the customs of the east. Thus he was keenly interested in astronomy, a science in which his studies were of quite an advanced character and he not only built and equipped in his dominions the finest observatory in India, or perhaps even in the entire Orient, placing it under the control of an eminent English astronomer, but also retained, in ancient eastern fashion the services of a court astrologer whose predictions he obeyed-when it suited his convenience.

The astrologer scored greatly on the occasion of the death of King Edward. He did not indeed actually predict that King did not die, but he directed the nizam to repair suddenly to a particular residence. By the mistake of a telegraph official, the message announcing the death of the king was not received in India.

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delivered at the place where the nizam was officially supposed to be, but at the particular residence to which the Nizam had secretly repaired. Thus the nizam learned the news without delay and the credit of the astrologer was enhanced.

The nizam maintained a great chemical laboratory where valuable research work in bacteriology has been done; while, on the other hand, he employed native alchemists to delve into the question of the transmutation of metals and in search for the philosopher's stone. He also retained by way of contrast with the present the ancient military forces of Hyderabad and on the occasion of the recent Indian tour of the German crown prince the latter was treated by the nizam in the same way as previous royal visitors, such as King George when Prince of Wales, the Duke of Connaught and the present Czar of Russia to a review whose part of the Hyderabad troops were equipped, uniformed and drilled in the most ultra-modern manner, with the very latest thing in the way of repeating rifles, machine gun, and field ordnance.

While following these, were corps of archers, with bows and arrows, cavalry of which the troopers, their officers and their horses were adorned in armor more than 1000 years old and other soldiers marching in thick cotton wool coverings, presumably designed to baffle the archers.

The late Nizam, like his young son and successor, is directly descended in the male line from Abu Bekr, whose daughter Aysa was one of the wives of the Prophet Mahomet, and who himself succeeded the prophet as head of the Moslem faith, and was the first of the long line of caliphs.

The late nizam was a very distinguished looking man who, with his Dundreary whiskers and mustache, clean cut features, his plain black frock coat of immaculate build, always tightly buttoned up, his head surmounted by a jeweled turban, was a marked figure in any of the great gatherings of Indian princes. Hyderabad even during the great Indian Mutiny remained loyal to England. But there was a time, some twenty-five or thirty years ago, when the late nizam was a child, when Hyderabad was a source of end of trouble to the British authorities, owing to the fact of its being a perfect nest of intrigue.

An English Admiralty Matter - Henry Labouchere is mistaken when he alleges in the pages of London "Truth" that the English admiralty makes it a strict rule never to give employment to an officer who has lost his ship and sinking under the name of Captain Edward Stedford Fitzherbert, who has just been appointed to the command of the contract built ship, in spite of his having lost the fine cruiser Bedford off the coast of Korea last year.

If there has been any rule of this kind, it has been more honored in the breach than in the observance. In fact, the most notable many instances of this, and I can cite all of them, is that of Lord Mayo's son, who died as commodore of the royal navy and whose naval career was a succession of misfortunes in the way of loss of ships, officers and men reluctant to serve under his orders.

Maurice Bourke was in command of the ill-fated British ironclad Victoria when she foundered off the Syrian coast some 600 to 800 to the bottom of the sea. He was in command of the Sultan, another ironclad when she ran on to an uncharted rock and was wrecked near Malta. He ran another ship which he commanded, a reef, somewhere in the West Indies in spite of all this he was appointed as commodore of the squadron of warships in Newfoundland waters and remained high in favor up to his death, alike in society and at court, retaining his post of equity to the queen's second son, the sailor Prince Alfred, Duke of Edinburgh and of Coburg. In fact, if he had lived he would have enjoyed the distinction of being the youngest admiral, as he was the youngest commodore and the youngest post-captain of the British navy.

It was his funeral, by the by, that led to an old dispute between Admiral Prince Louis of Battenberg, then a captain in charge of the naval intelligence department at the admiralty with the first lord of the admiralty. The latter was in those days Mr. (afterwards Viscount) Goschen, and he directed the prince to represent him at Maurice Bourke's funeral. It was the first time that a prince who virtually formed part of Queen Victoria's family had been asked to undertake such work as this, namely, representing at a public ceremony, an officer of the crown, who was a commoner, a city merchant, possessed of neither naval or military rank from a professional point of view.

When Prince Louis first received the orders from Mr. Goschen, he resolutely declined to obey them and referred the matter to Queen Victoria, as did also Mr.

Goschen. Queen Victoria, realizing that a matter of discipline was involved, and that from the moment that princes of the family were serving in the army and navy they must submit to the regular discipline and regulations direct from London to comply with the order.

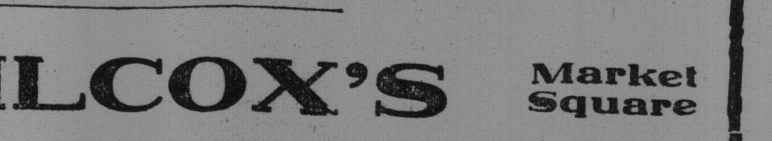

PROGRESS ON PRISON FARM IN ONTARIO

Laying of Corner Stone of New Building in Guelph

MUCH WORK IS DONE

Roads, Bridges and Lime Kilns Built and Quarries Worked—Plan Works Well in Keeping Men to Recover Standing

(Toronto Mail and Empire.)

Guelph, Ont., Sept. 25.—In the presence of a gathering of men representing the entire people of this province, including members of Parliament, members of the Legislature, judges and justices of the peace, Sir James Whitney this afternoon laid the corner-stone of the Administration Building of the new group which will form the new Central Prison. More than a year ago the province purchased 840 acres of land near this city for the purpose of establishing a model prison farm, the first of its kind.

Those who saw the property a year ago and saw it again today, could not help but be impressed with the tremendous work already accomplished, and that to be carried on in the future. Of remarkable interest also are the prisoners who are giving out their sentences here. No prison paler marks their faces, no slouching to and from prison cells. Instead, they bear their heads proudly, and on their faces is the clear complexion of those who live healthy, outdoor lives.

To Ameliorate Conditions

Before the corner-stone of the Administration Building was laid there was placed in it a box containing the Toronto and Guelph newspapers, coins, and the Canadian Almanac. Sir James Whitney, with a silver trowel, with which he laid the stone. In speaking briefly after the ceremony, Sir James stated that the Government proposed to put into operation a scheme or idea which was not new or startling, but which would have as its foundation the desire on the part of the government and the people of the province to ameliorate the conditions of the men who had broken the law and, according to the law, had to be punished.

So far as the men were concerned, those serving sentences at Guelph were sent down for minor offences, instead of the more serious crimes, which necessitated the infliction of just and necessary punishment, which was inflicted with due regard for the welfare and happiness of the criminals in the future, so that when it came time for them to go out from the institution they should have to carry as a handicap as possible. The scheme, he said, should not be confused with any idea in some countries, where the men, mostly women, sent bouquets of flowers to prisoners charged with as serious crimes as murder. It was a common sense plan, and called for ordinary consideration of the most elementary fair play, so that the men would have every assistance in their efforts to redeem themselves.

Results are Good

Hon. W. J. Hanna stated to the gathering that what they saw on the grounds was an indication of how the government was trying to carry out the new system of dealing with minor offenders. The expectations of those in charge of the work had been met over and over again, and the results were better exercised than in the past, and there was a sense of security as to the future which could not have been possible had it not been for the success of the past. The merit and classification of the work done must be recognized, he said, as well as the fact that there was grown on the farm as fine a crop of vegetables as could be raised anywhere.

He referred especially to the excellent work done by the parole board. He was anxious to avoid claiming too much for what had been done, or what the Government was trying to do. He didn't want people to think that because the institution was succeeding that it was to be thrown into a state institution, like some of the Canadian prisons, like the penitentiary at Kingston. The men serving sentences there were minor offenders, serving terms averaging eight months and a class quite distinct from those in the state and dominion prisons.

He again praised the parole board, and expressed his thanks to Sir Allen Aylesworth, who as Minister of Justice, fell in with the idea and gave the Provincial Government and the parole board every assistance.

Mr. Justice Tiesler, chairman of the parole board, expressed the opinion that the wisdom of the Provincial Government never had been better exercised than in selecting, not himself, but his colleagues, on the parole board. It was a delightful work, he said. The men who were in the institutions were sent there for minor offences, and were largely first offenders. It was lamentable, however, how many of the men were between the ages of 18 and 30. The movement was one of the most commendable steps that any provincial government in the dominion ever had undertaken.

One difficult problem in connection with the work, he said, was not just to punish the men and turn them out unclaimed, but to do curative as well as punitive work. That was one of the salient features of the establishment of the farm, where, by acts of kindness, the men were turned out with some ray of hope, so that they might redeem themselves and become respectable citizens, instead of being sent back with no encouragement.

Look After the Men

While they were doing good work with the parole board, some hundred cases having been dealt with, the institution first was started, it needed only one element to make it complete. There should be some provision made by which the men, after their discharge, could be looked after. One association in the province which did excellent work along that line was the Salvation Army; but he thought that some official of the government should be appointed to carry out the work, to see that the men secured employment, and to exercise watchful care over them. In that way it would be a greater success.

In closing the ceremony, Sir James Whitney, on behalf of the people of the province, expressed the sense of obligation which the Government had for the parole board, mentioning the names of the members.

Those who composed the board, he said, were well adapted and equipped for the work, both in information and ideals. They did their work with a sense of public service, and not for fee or reward. He thanked them for the confidence of the government and the people of the province, to thank the members of the board for having taken up the duty, and for the remarkably successful manner in which it had been carried out.

The visitors then adjourned to the work shop now under construction, where luncheon was served. At one end of the building there was arranged an exhibit of fine vegetables, butter and other farm products as could be seen at any exhibition, all grown by the prisoners on the prison farm. In addition there were samples of the stone quarried on the property, lime burned by the prisoners in the kilns and fertilizer produced as a by-product.

During the afternoon the members of the party walked or were driven over the grounds. Everyone was most enthusiastic in his praise of the work already accomplished. The bridge over the Speed River, built entirely by the men, is a three-span stone and concrete structure, the equal of which cannot be found in any county in Ontario. The roads are models. It is the intention of the government to have all prison roads, as well as those surrounding the prison property, model in every way. The place has been fenced and 20 acres of land on a high hill has been planted in a young orchard. There also is a nursery, where the young trees are cared for.

Excellent progress has been made on the quarries and the gravel pits, from which building material is hauled. Enough lime is made there already to supply all the public institutions of the province, and the supply of building stone is inexhaustible. A narrow gauge railway has been built on the grounds in order to facilitate the carriage of building material, and everywhere there is great activity.

Far more interesting than the great change already made on the grounds, however, are the prisoners themselves—"the boys" as they are called. They are all happy and contented, satisfied that after serving three or four or six months, or even two years, they will be discharged with a chance to become better citizens, healthy, strong and happy determined to lead better lives and to show the world that the trust placed in them while serving their sentences has not been misplaced.

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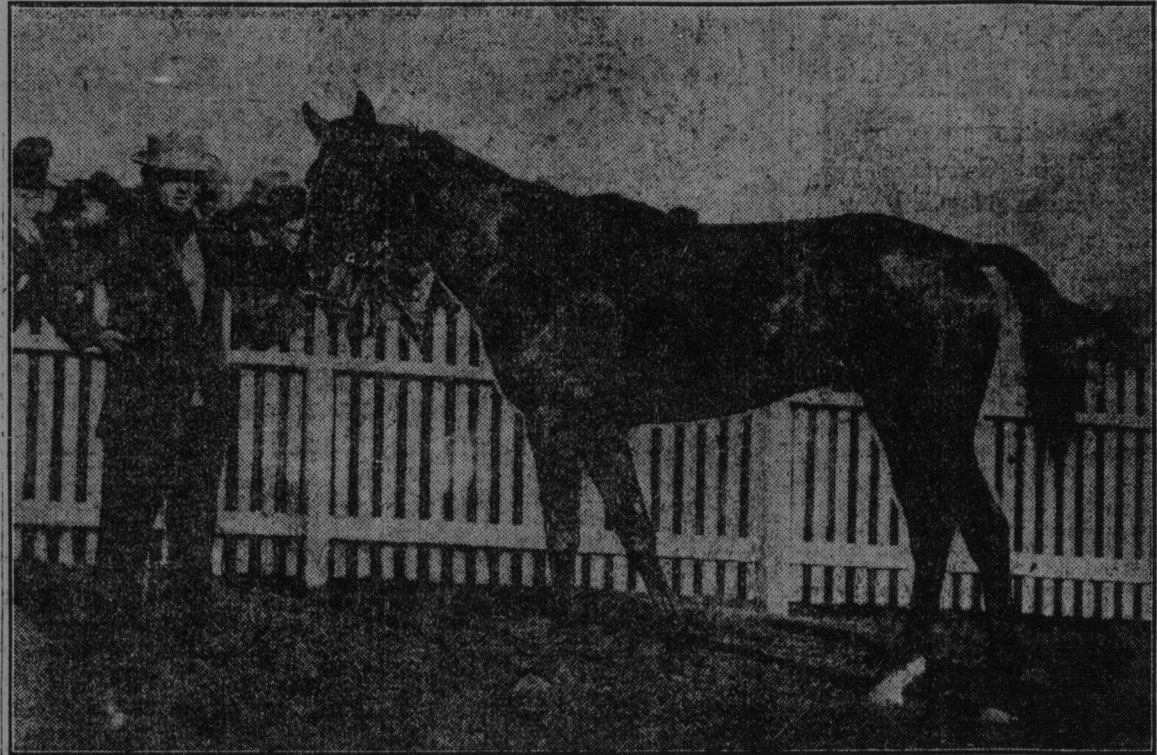

Mr. Borden's Tribute to Him Mr. Borden said—"Should it happen that I remain in the service of the people for some time to come, I hope to display the same vigor and endurance as that which has been shown by the prime minister. During the campaign just closed, there is no one who has not yielded him the highest tribute of admiration. He said Canada's problems were closely similar to those which confronted the American colonies after the revolution. 'We have not yet grasped or realized Canada and her opportunities, much less the still greater empire,' said Mr. Borden. Another Account Ottawa, Sept. 27.—In a speech, marked by rare tact and dignity and by a whole-hearted and inspiring imperialism and Canadianism Earl Grey made a formal public farewell to the people of Canada today; expressed his heartfelt regret at severing a long and happy official relationship with Canadians; voiced his hopes and aspirations for the dominion as the potential dominant partner in the British Empire and urged upon all patriotic citizens the duties and responsibilities of high ideals of civic and national life. His excellency announced that owing to the political events of the past week he was glad to say that he would have a week longer in Canada than he had expected. His departure had been postponed until October 12. He also intimated that he expected to disregard the unwritten convention which had kept previous governors-general from returning to the dominion, coming back next time via the Hudson Bay Railway. He suggested the wisdom of cultivating a closer partnership with Newfoundland, in preference to the present mutual policy of holding aloof on each side. He urged as among the ideals of Canadian statesmanship the necessity of training the character of the children through the influence of the very best teachers that money could buy; the thorough supervision of moving pictures to prevent evil influences on young minds; the careful sanitation of homes and effective measures to prevent the curse of slums in the rapidly growing cities of the dominion. 'Every moment of my life in Canada during the past seven years,' said his excellency, 'has been one of uninterrupted happiness for myself and my family. To be governor general of this dominion is the happiest and pleasantest billet in the whole service of the imperial crown. It is not easy for us to leave without suffering many tears at the heart. We return to England, our whole lives illumined by many glorious memories and we shall leave a large part of our hearts with you in Canada.'

BROAD STREET SITE AGREED ON

Safety Board Committee Favor Application of Company in States to Establish a Canning Industry Here

If the suggestions and recommendations in the report of a sub-committee of the safety board appointed to deal with the request of the Franklin Baker Co., of Philadelphia for definite information in the way of providing a site for the plant which they propose erecting in this city, are looked upon with favor at the meeting of the common council it is expected that the new industry will be established here, in Broad street.

The sub-committee visited the site and report favorably. They decided that it would be suitable for the establishment of the industry, and they favor the granting of the application of the American company under certain restrictions and conditions.

The chairman of the sub-committee, Ald. J. B. Jones, was asked this morning by a Times reporter in reference to the matter. He replied that while there seemed a disposition on the part of some of the members of the council not to grant lots for building purposes along the harbor front, the members of this sub-committee felt that, as the board of trade for some time had been making efforts to induce manufacturers to establish here, no danger was apprehended in establishing industries in the zone referred to.

Asked as to the site, Ald. Jones said there were several which could be used to advantage according to the findings of the committee and if the conditions which the city will probably impose meet with approval, the Franklin Baker Co., will come to St. John to erect their canning plant.

Ald. Jones said that when last in the city, the manager of the company had expressed his opinion that St. John was more suitable for his business than any other city in the province, owing to its being on the direct line of steamer service to the West Indies, from where he would import fruit. For many years, the chairman of the committee continued, there had been a portion of land in the eastern portion of the city lying vacant and likely to remain that way. These lands would be of great value to the city and it need not interfere with Courtney Bay development.
