A DOMESTIC DRAMA.

A New Glasgow woman who brought suit for the Detention of Children and the Revocation of Her Marriage License.

New Glasgow, N. S. Feb. 7.—New Glasgow has had a genuine sensation, and the town is agog over the matter which indeed received with incredulity, having been written by some scribbler having the usual undoubted reputation for unimpeachable veracity. It will be remembered that about two years ago two citizens of this town were sued for defamation of character to the tune of \$30,000 by Mrs. Brown, who by the way, has the generally admitted advantage of being handsome. Mr. Brown did business in the United States and his wife who is a native of this country resided here occasionally. On this particular occasion her picture was displayed in the store of R. S. McNulty, an elderly gentleman of the old Puritan style, and as usual, Fraser, who is a bit of a wag, was passing when he saw the picture and he went in to the store and jeeringly made some derogatory remarks about the woman, referring to her home, which caused Mr. McNulty to take the picture and throw it into the back shop. The picture, whose name was Limberg, was known here as the "Count," passing soon after, went in and asked what had become of the picture, and was told emphatically by McNulty that he did not want to be imposed upon by the character of the woman, and for this reason he would not allow the picture to remain in his premises. The "Count" immediately required to Mrs. Brown, who, highly indignant, accompanied him to the office of John McNulty, barrister, and entered suit against the parties for defamation of character, leaving her claim at twenty thousand dollars.

The case came off at the supreme court at Pictou before the Chief Justice, Messrs McNulty and Budge, and the result was that the chief justice was unkind in damages to the amount of twenty-five hundred dollars. Mr. McNulty answered to the tune of four thousand.

An appeal was taken to the bench of judges at Halifax, and judgment in the case of McNulty was reversed, he getting a trial by jury. Fraser's judgment was confirmed, and the twenty-five hundred dollar penalty being over him like a veritable iron maul.

Fraser, looking around for any lawyer to get off the difficulty, wrote to some of his employers in New York asking for some information in regard to this particular woman's character. This prompted a telegram from Brown, which reached Fraser with the result that he was spoken of as an "old man" and a "good fellow" for that purpose. Since the judgments were delivered the defendants discovered that Fraser was an alleged wife living in Newark, New Jersey, and your correspondent learned that also after some time.

Friday, and is now staying at a private house. She claims to have been married to Brown at Newark twenty years ago, and shows a marriage certificate and has bundles of Brown's letters to her. ST. JOHN AS A WINTER PORT.

The following Memorial of the Board of Trade has been forwarded to Ottawa.

That your Memorial be read, and that you report thereon as soon as you may have opportunity.

That your Government are about taking the necessary steps to secure an improved Atlantic mail service.

That in the past the fact of the Memorial going to the winter season in American ports, after landing Canadian mail passengers at Halifax, has been a serious matter to the Government, and that the Canadian mail service, which is the backbone of the Canadian Pacific Railway, has been seriously injured by the fact that the Canadian mail service is not as good as it should be.

That after the service which the people of Canada have made to secure the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway, some portions of which have been built at enormous cost, with the avowed object of keeping Canada in touch with the rest of the world, it would be a matter of course that the Government should see to it that the Canadian mail service is as good as it should be.

That the Canadian Pacific Railway is a national asset, and that it is the duty of the Government to see to it that it is as good as it should be.

That when the Short Line Railway is open for traffic between St. John and Montreal, freight for Montreal, Toronto, and other cities, can be delivered as quickly and cheaply through St. John as through American ports, and your Memorialists are satisfied that after the Steamship Line to the port of St. John is established in connection with the Canadian Pacific Railway, it will be found that a large traffic will be developed, and that the trade of Canada canals, and yet be placed in bed in office having had charge.

That even if for a time it should be necessary for the Government to pay a somewhat larger subsidy in order to change the current of the trade of Canada, which has been heretofore passing through foreign channels, yet the benefits from a national standpoint, will be so great that your Memorialists are satisfied that the people of the Dominion will cheerfully sustain a Government in the increased outlay requisite for the purpose.

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
