The New Tariff.

The question as to how the new tariff affects imports of goods in common use in this part of the country has had some attention from prominent people interested in the subject, and we have seen the statement made in a public way that the duties have been increased. So far as we can learn they have not been increased, but rather diminished, while their adjustment has been much simplified. In matters of this kind correct conclusions cannot be arrived at by taking up any particular article, but rather by obtaining results from a-considerable variety of goods, and an analysis of a recent Miramichi importation develops the fact that the tariff readjustment has been most skilfully done, leaving it to be said with truth that there has been a reduction of duties, while the truth itself hangs on a very narrow margin.
