Harvard Medical Men Say America's Spur for Students in Story of Miss Fritz, Who Holds World's Record-Has Marvelous Speed.

PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 21.—Every student of stenography and typewriting inclined to be discouraged should be spurred on to renewed efforts by the story of Miss Rose L. Fritz, champion typist of the world, who yesterday in the office of the Underwood Typewriter Company, at 725 Chestnut street, gave a remarkable demonstration of the speed and accuracy she had developed in both these studies.

Six years ago, when 15 years old, Miss Fritz began the study of stenography and typewriting. In thirteen weeks she was writing without mistakes or hesitation 120 words a minute in shorthand atnd sixty words a minute on the typewriter.

In November of 1905, when she was only 16, Miss Fritz entered a typewriting contest, held in Madison Square Garden under the auspices of the National Business Shows, in which she won second place, competing with the then world champion.

Her first brilliant success came in 1906, when at the Chicago Business Shows she led her nearest competitor by 1,300 words and won two championships—the American ladies' and the blindfold. In this last, with eyes covered, she wrote 4,457 words in one hour. In the history of opera there are many curious anomalies, but perhaps the strangest is the roleplayed by the librettist. For the most part obscure and unimportant and generally unremembered, his ranks have nevertheless been recruited from the ablest and most brilliant men of letters. Among those who have undertaken the part type such unlikely names at Voltaire, Goethe, Wieland, Addison and Fielding, while others of considerable poetic talent, as, for example, Metastasio, Celzabigi, Rinuccini, Bolto and Coppee, have tried their hand at libretta writing with assurance, giving to it their best efforts. And yet the successful librettists are few—the merest handful out of a harvest of three centuries.—Forum.



any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba. Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader,

son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader,
Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-upt a quarter-

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-unpt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price 3.00 per acro. Dusies—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra. A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

TELEPHONE COMPANY ANSWERS COMMITTEE

Statements and Statistics of Committee Contradicted — Com pany Denies Over-Capitalization and Declarse New Rates are Necessary

The New Brunswick Telephone Company which is admitted by the Board of Trade Committee appointed to consider the increase in Telephone Rentals in this city to have been "willing to discuss the question in a friendly spirit and to furnish all the information they had in their possession" regret that the Committee had not sufficiently neformed themselves of the facts before making a report.

The Telephone Company is composed of nearly a thousand stockholders in the Province who have invested their money in the enterprise with a full knowledge that the nature of the business itself involves an element of risk but they are not willing to conduct their business upon conclusions arrived at by a Committee who admit that they have not obtained any statistics later than the Parliamentary Report of 1905; who declare that the Central Telephone Company "was taken over at too high a figure," yet admit "that the issue of capital stock of the Central Telephone Company did not receive from us the attention we bestowed upon the issue of the capital stock of the New Brunswick Telephone Company prior to the merger," who offer no basis for their valuation of the St. John plant, and who, having the details of the stock issues of the New Brunswick Company before them, have overlooked evident facts, wille unfortunately suggesting that there



NEW YORK, Jan. 22.—The boycott for cheaper meat waxed hotter in New York today. Pledges to abstain from meat eating for thirty days or more were extensively circulated and signed, and the indications were that the movement, although slower in getting a foothold here than in many cities, will reach impressive proportions in metropolitan territory. Formal action by many organized bodies is expected to follow the general trend aiding families to cut down their meat consumption, a movement said already to have reduced sales at the retail snops 50 per cent. with the condition of the stations and their own quarters.

The city's houses at Lancaster were inspected by another committee and were found to be in much better order than had been expected. They are in good repair and show that they have received good care and attention.

A third committee will report on the suggestion to appoint two extra men to the permanent fire force with a view to making it possible for all the men to get a day off. It is their opinion that with the extra men available it would be possible to arrange this.

Women are taking the leading part in the local agitation. Today arrangements were being made for a great mass meeting of women in Union Square at noon on Tuesday next to protest against the high prices of foodstuffs and sign meat abstention pledges. The National Progressive Women's Suffrage Union is arranging for the demonstration, which is expected to be one of the most impressive in the city's history.

CHICAGO, Jan. 22.—Organized labor of Chicago has joined actively in the war on high prices of meat and other commodities. The Chicago Federation of Lebor several weeks ago decided to of Labor several weeks ago decided to take up the cudgels against high prices of meat, and the appointment of a committee was authorized for the purpose of making the investigation. The secretaries of all affiliated unions will make investigations among the members touching the cost of living two, five and ten years ago as compared bers touching the cost of living two, five and ten years ago, as compared with the present cost of commodities.

The purchasing power of a dollar today as compared with two, five and ten years ago will be used as a basis. Not only meat but all articles of food will be included in the inquiry.




