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TRADING QUIET IN THE STOCK MARKET

New York, Oct. 9.—Heaviness of the coolers and strength of the southern stocks gave today's stock market its only movements of importance. Following a period of moderate activity in the first hour, the market became dull. Trading was without interest or purpose. The unwillingness of operators on either side to take an aggressive position indicated that the market had become somewhat heavy. A rut, pending developments which will give a more decided cast to speculative sentiment. Although the - corrected selling - kept the market in an hysterical state most of last month has now definitely subsided, security owners have shown no inclination to increase their holdings or take back stocks sold on the decline. It is regarded by most market observers as to be looked for until some of the present political uncertainties are dispelled. The market opened today on a somewhat higher level, but the improvement was of short duration. The coolers were forced down to well below Saturday's close and the remainder of the list sagged with them. Before noon the market had recovered its losses with the exception of bonds which were heavier of the coolers at one time showing a loss of more than two points. The selling of these stocks was associated with the convening today of the Supreme Court, which is seen to pass upon the government's case against Reading in the Anthracite suit. This is the first case of this precise nature to come before the Supreme Court since its promulgation of the "rule of Reason" in the interpretation of the Sherman Law.

Nothing more definite than a report of a coming extra dividend for Louisville and Nashville was at hand to extend the buoyancy of southern rails. Both Atlantic coast line and Louisville and Nashville advanced more than four points, and other southern roads scored smaller gains. The decline in Allie Chalmers securities which began last week, was contained today. The five per cent bonds sold down to a loss of nearly two points and the preferred stock declined 1.4, although both issues subsequently made a partial recovery. Reports made a partner of the company was quarantined his fixed charges were followed by the official admission that the corporation's business had fallen off sharply.

A larger increase in copper stocks than had been expected was shown in the September statement of the copper producers.
