Session Just Closed Unproductive of Constructive Legislation- Spaniards Aroused Against Rebel General.

Mexico City, Dec. 15.—From now until April 2. President Huerta will be obliged to conduct the government without congress, as that specially created organization was formally adjourned today. Its most important acts during the session were the ratification of the president's assumption of power over the various departments of the government, after dissolving the preceding congress, and regranting to the president this same power, which gives General Huerta until congress convenes again, practically the sway of a dictator.

Altogether, the new congress was unobtrustive interfering not at all with the executive's ideas of government. Its most notable act aside from those directly connected with the executive plans was the ratification of a conscission to a Belgian syndicate to construct 5,000 miles of narrow gauge railway.



Congressman Guernsey For Quarantine of All Foreign Tubers.

TO ADVISE THIS AT WASHINGTON

Aroostook Growers Claim New Brunswick Product have "Powdery Scale" Almost to Same Extent as Potatoes from Ireland.

Bengor, Maine, Dec. 15.—Representative Guernsey, of the Fourth Maine Congressional District, which includes Aroostook County with its wast potato lelds, believes that an extension of the existing foreign potato quarantine will be ordered to include New Brunswick and other Canadian tubers at the coming meeting of the Federal Horticultural Board to be held in Washington, D. C., on Dec. 18. Akhough it is impossible to tell what action will be taken in advance, he is inclined to think that the Canadian product will be barred admission in the future, he says.

Congressman Guernsey has interviewed the members of the board in response to appeals which have been sent him from the Aroostook growers, who are naturally interested in having the embargo declared. They have represented that New Branswick and Prince Edward Island potatoes are infected with "powdery scale" to nearly the same extent as those which have come from Ireland.

Protatoes are now coming into the United States at the rate of about 60,000 sacks a week from Belgium, Denmark, and Holland, according to Congressman Guernsey. Were the quarantine raised on Irish potatoes, the importations would probably amount to 150,000 sacks a week, he thinks. Last year Ireland raised 130,000,000 bushels and the crop is said to be fully as large this year. It is claimed that it is affected by potato ecab in some sections of the island. In connection with the situation Congressman Guernsey says:

"The introduction of Canadian and toreign potato diseases into the United States would be a serious matter, particularly for Maine, whose seed potatoes are shipped to half the States in the Uniton and, for that reason, it is of the greatest importance to all-convended that the crop should be above the suspicion of infection.

"I shall urge the extension of the quarantine against all foreign potatoes and particularly against Canadian, as Canadian potatoes, especially those from New Brunswick, come directly into Maine and are distributed through the United States with Maine potatoes."
