PROVINCIAL LEGISLATURE.

Special to the Tribune. HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

FREDERICTON, March 8. Yesterday afternoon Hon. Mr. Willis introduced a bill incorporating the Mercantile Insurance Company of St. John; Mr. Girouard, a bill to amend the acts relating to the encouragement of agriculture; Mr. Covert, a bill relating to bastards; Mr. Beckwith's bill relating to survey and export duty on lumber was referred to a select committee. Mr. Crawford presented a petition praying for the incorporation of the Loyal Orange Association. Mr. Maher promised to prepare a bill fixing the number of days for which members may draw pay, their services to be unrequited for the rest of their stay in Fredericton. The Provincial Secretary said the estimates were in the hands of the printer. Wanted with this extraordinary half-day's work the House adjourned. There was no business before the Upper House. Some little anxiety is felt in reference to the fate of the bill for legalizing school assessments, but it is not probable that the Lords will dare to throw it out. A two-thirds vote for the abolition of that branch of the Legislature would pass the Assembly at once.

Today's Proceedings.

Mr. Theriault took his seat this morning.

Mr. Macpherson presented the petition of Thomas Temple and others praying that a Bill before the House to legalize and confirm the assessment of Fredericton for 1872 be not passed.

Mr. King introduced a Bill to amend the practice of the Supreme Court and consolidate the Acts of Assembly relating thereto; also a Bill to admit sections at law by the representatives of deceased persons in certain cases, when death is caused by the misconduct or wilful act of another; Mr. Butler an amendment to the Act relating to the protection of moose; Mr. Maher a Bill to incorporate the Diocesan of Christ or Christians, of St. John and elsewhere, repealing 80 Vic., chap. 76; Mr. Cate, a Bill relating to the distribution of by-roads money of the Province, which was referred to a special committee of one member from each County.

Mr. Maher moved the Committee of Whole on a bill to establish a lien in favor of mechanics, Harrison in the chair. It provides inter alia a lien for work done and money expended on buildings, by giving the builders notice.

Mr. Willis would cordially support the bill.

Mr. Donald thought the bill should extend to other laborers as well as mechanics.

After favorable discussion of the principal of the bill, progress was reported, and the bill referred to a special committee—Maher, Tibbits, Humphrey, Adams, and Macpherson.

Mr. McPherson presented the petition of Dr. Murphy and 180 others praying that the bill relating to assessment, &c., be not passed.

Mr. Tibbits gave notice of a motion relating to great roads, &c.

LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL.

The bill in amendment and in addition to the laws relating to highways was passed.

Several bills were received from the House of Assembly.

PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

(Special to the Tribune.)

A Test Vote—The Government Triumph by Sixteen Majority—How New Brunswick Members Voted.

Ottawa, March 8. After the recess yesterday an exciting debate occurred on Blaker's motion for a summary settlement of the election cases, and Sir John's amendment referring them to a Committee.

After some discussion Mackenzie made an amendment similar to the original motion.

Palmer, of St. John, replied to Mackenzie, making a telling speech on the Government side. It was neither legal nor just, he said, to ask the House to sit in judgment on a case where no evidence could come, and where the defendant nor defendant could be heard. The retreating officer might have acted illegally, but the House could not affirm or deny that without having the law and the facts before them. If this were ignored, and constitutional questions decided by a vote, anarchy would result. While a representative he would give an independent vote. After a fair investigation of the questions, and when both sides were heard on this case before the proper tribunal, and the reports were made, the House could fairly decide. Mr. Palmer's unanswerable legal points made a strong impression. The whole speech was received with much applause.

After speeches from Sir Francis Hincks, Howe, Cameron and Blake, the debate was closed by Sir John A. Macdonald in a most brilliant speech.

The vote was taken at midnight Mackenzie's amendment—yeas, 79, nays, 95; Government majority 16. Cauchon voted with the Opposition. Of the New Brunswick members, Domville, McAdam, Moffat, Outer, Palmer, Costigan, and Burpee voted with the Government, and Anglin, Ferris and Pickard against, the rest being absent.

Severe comments are made to-day on the course of New Brunswick members seeking better terms and at the same time voting the overthrow of the Government. Their course will damage the cause greatly.

Tenders for the construction of the Vale Verte canal will be printed in a few days.

The proceedings in the Senate are merely the consideration of the speech.

Hon. Mr. McPherson made an attack on the Pacific R. R. and Sir Hugh Allan, characterizing the scheme as a conspiracy to forward American interests, and, after some discussion, the debate was adjourned until Monday.

REPLY OF THE GOVERNOR GENERAL TO THE ADDRESS FROM THE ONTARIO LEGISLATURE.

TURK.

GENTLEMEN: I beg leave to thank you for the very kind and flattering address which you have given me on behalf of the Legislature of Ontario.

The cordial welcome which, as the representative of Her Most Gracious Majesty, I was received in every city, town and hamlet of Ontario, afforded me the most striking proofs of the loyalty and devotion of the people of the Crown and person of the Queen.

In Toronto, the capital of the Province, in Hamilton, in London, as well as in the surrounding districts, I saw equally unmistakable evidence of the industry, energy and patriotism with which the population at large are developing the resources of the Province, while the universal presence of excellent schools and colleges in every direction exhibited their enlightened appreciation of the benefits to be derived from the sound training and proper education of the rising generation.

The ability, dignity and moderation which show in a not less satisfactory manner how happily political talent is associated with mercantile enterprise and agricultural industry in your Province.

The combination of such qualities can not fail to render the people of Ontario one of the most prosperous communities on this continent, and I need not assure you that I shall always take the deepest interest in their welfare.

Bravery of two Deputy Sheriffs—Bathurst to the Front Again—Patrols vs. Petitions.

POCKSHAW, March 4. About three days ago Sheriff Carter deputed two of his sons, who inherit the superabundant courage of their sire, to arrest Andrew Darcy. An eyewitness who saw their departure from their family supposed from its affecting nature they were about to travel to some far distant country from which they might never return, but their destination was only Pockshaw, where they arrived safely and proceeded to the residence of Andrew Darcy, when one of them remained outside to guard the door and the other entered the house where he saw Darcy lying on a couch, and asked him if that was Darcy's house, to which he replied in the affirmative; he then asked if he was Andrew Darcy, when a man sitting there replied it was none of his business, and Darcy taking the hint made a rush for the door when he rushed into the arms of the other brother, who manly lifted him up, and a daughter of Darcy's comprehending the situation, seized a stick and struck the valiant deputy, at the same time threatening to take a revolver that he had from him and shoot him if he did not release her father, when the two brave fellows not wishing to have their lives imperilled by a woman, and considering that discretion was the better part of valor, and he who runs away may live to fight another day, abandoned their presence, and returned to Bathurst leaving their laurels behind them; but finding the boys in the street, seeing at them on their return they instead making another effort with the old chap for a leader, at recovering their lost reputation by capturing the woman.

POCKSHAW, MARCH 4.

Mr. Joseph Bullock, of the Forest City Oil Company, being desirous that his Ontario friends should know what the Brunswickers mean when they talk about trout, has obtained four fine specimens from Campbelltown for shipment to London and Dundee. They weigh from four to five pounds each. They will be packed in ice and forwarded by rail.

Revival Meetings.

For the past two weeks revival meetings have been held nightly in the Mission House, Lower Cove, by the Rev. Wm. Maggs, at which a large amount of good has been accomplished. Each night the church has been well filled. Last evening the attendance was unusually large, and many were up to the penitent bench. It is probable the meetings will be accomplished during the coming week.

The Spirit of a Good Man Awakes a Backslider who Visits His Grave.

Rev. C. Powell, in writing to the Christian Visitor concerning the lamented Rev. T. Ansley, and the desirability of procuring memorial stones for his grave, says:

In his own words, September 12th, Lord day six persons were baptized, of whom was one Bro. Samuel Currey, a lad of 19 years of age. A peculiar miracle of grace, he had been enlightened under the preaching of Elder Thomas Ansley about ten years ago, but got into the world and lost his serious impressions and conducted in an improper manner. A few weeks past he went in a vessel to St. Andrews, N. B. After hearing where the venerable Ansley's body was interred, he repaired to the grave, knelt on it, and endeavored to pray, and thought the spirit of the departed appeared to him and told him that there was a reformation in Yarmouth. He did not return to the vessel again, but came direct to St. John, crossed in the packet and returned home. He was much troubled in mind and felt, as God had cast him off for ever and that he was despised by man, and through the temptation of the adversary of souls he took a rope and prepared a sharp knife, and returned to the woods to put an end to his miserable existence. But at that awful moment the thought struck him he would first call on the name of God, when Christ appeared by His blessed Spirit to his soul a deliverer. He came out to his neighbors rejoicing in his Saviour, confessing his sins and exhorting his fellow youth with a power that was truly astonishing to all that heard him.

The London police have arrested the paragon of Warren, the principal in the forgeries on the Bank of England. The sum of £15,000 in gold was found in her apartments. She was committed to prison for examination. Notes, the clerk of the forgers, was brought before the Court to-day, and after examination was remanded for a week.

Paris, March 7. France up to this date has paid to Germany 3,500,000,000 francs on account of the war indemnity.
