HALIFAX, N. S., June 23.—The exploring steamer Alert, which is to sail tomorrow for Hudson's bay, goes direct from here to Fort Churchill, not calling at the other points, thence to York factor to survey Nelson river. The vessel will go to Cape Henrietta Maria, Marble Island and Chesterfield Inlet on her return, calling at the stations along route and abandoning them. Capt. Markham, R. N., who was commander of the Alert on the Arctic expedition of 1875-76, with Sir George Nares, goes on this trip representing the Winnipeg & Hudson's Bay railway.

The long-continued law suit between the Windsor & Annapolis Railway and the Dominion government has finally been settled by the verdict of the Imperial Privy Council rendered to-day for \$130,000 damages, costs and interest alleged to be sustained by the railway and Annapolis Railway for breach of contract by the Dominion government in illegally taking the Windsor branch railway from the Windsor & Annapolis Co., and handing it over to the Western Counties Railway company. The trouble was caused by defective legislation.

Twenty mounted police have been sent by the Dominion authorities to keep whiskey peddlers out of the crew of between 3,000 and 4,000 men now at work on the Canadian Pacific railway in the Northwest mountains. But the British Columbia government have licensed the different liquor dealers along the railway, and the Provincial police and stipendiaries are averse to the interference of the Dominion forces. There was a good deal of trouble last year between the two bodies of officials, and it is expected there will be more this year.

WOMEN WORK WHEN THEY CAN.—In order to provide work for the unemployed in Dublin pressure has been put upon those who had contracts pending and improvements in contemplation to expedite them and set the work going at once. One of the largest contracts was that for the erection of the Museum of Science and Art in Kildare street for which Messrs. Beckett are to receive \$70,000. The work was begun a few weeks ago, and seventy stonecutters were employed. The other day they all struck work, and marched out in a body amid the cheers of the crowd. The men complained that the wages—25s. a week—were too low, the Dublin scale being 35s.

MISS MEIGS, to whom Archibald Forbes (the famous war correspondent) was married on Saturday, is the daughter of Gen. Meigs, and is in the neighborhood of 28 years of age. She is of medium height, with a very well rounded figure, almost inclined to stout. She has a very clear pink and white English complexion, dark brown eyes, and irregular features. Her expression is, however, very pleasant. Her hair is a golden red. She wears always dresses in black, and is considered one of the finest horsewomen of Washington. Mr. Forbes is 48. He is quite stout from rheumatism and exposure, and he says that there is nothing which will sooner exhaust and break down a newspaper correspondent than to engage in a "special" in the field. He attributes all his rheumatism and bad health to the exposure and fatigues of his many campaigns. His marriage with Miss Meigs has been postponed several times on account of his ill health.

WHOLESALE POISONING.

MORE THAN TWO HUNDRED PEOPLE POISONED BY ICE CREAM.—THE LIVES OF TWENTY-SIX IN DANGER.—THE POISON SUPPOSED TO BE FROM THE FREEZERS.

ELMISTOWN, N. J., June 23.—Exactly 214 people were poisoned at last Thursday's picnic near this place. Six will probably die and twenty are in a precarious condition. It is now believed that the ice cream, which was freely eaten, caused the trouble. Whether the inside of the cream freezers were lined with the sulphate of zinc, or whether arsenic was put in the cream purposely, still puzzles the doctors. One of the physicians in charge of the patients says he believes the poisoning was the work of some devilish mischief-maker. He examined several of the freezers and there was not enough sulphate of zinc in their composition to injure any one. The symptoms manifested by the patients are clearly of arsenical poison. Three or four people who ate of the cream soon after it was frozen are perfectly well and have had no signs of sickness. The sick people are those who ate of the cream after it had been in the freezer half an hour. This makes the doctors believe that the poison was introduced within 15 minutes after the cream was frozen. Any one could have slipped the poison into the freezers. The task of serving it out was tiresome and any body offering to perform that work was welcome. The physicians all have their hands full and say they will be lucky if they do not lose a great many patients.

A BRUTAL ATTACK.

The Toronto Globe of Saturday 25th contains a vile personal attack on Sir John Macdonald and his family. It says: "I thought of this we have no personal knowledge; there is a heavy settlement on his daughter; this is illegal; it is to be expected that a Globe is most outrageous, and no decent newspaper would admit to its columns such a calumny upon a lady, and especially an invalid, as Sir John Macdonald's daughter is. Sir John Macdonald himself has been so hounded and abused during his forty odd years of public life that he can now bear without a murmur any charges made against his personal honor; but his defenceless children are not public property and should be spared from the savagery of the incoherent and malignant clique who now control the chief organ of the Grit party. The recklessness of the slanders is shown by the slander itself. They admit they have no personal knowledge that such a settlement has been made, yet they unhesitatingly would the feelings of an invalid lady by publishing the vile untrue. Such respectable tactics should sicken every respectable Reformer in the Dominion."—Reverend Review.

THE HANLAN-HOSMER RACE.

Hanlan and Hosmer rowed a three mile race on Lake St. John, Quebec, on Friday afternoon. The Quebec Chronicle reports: "The start was all that could be desired and was loudly applauded. Both crews were got away with about 350 strokes to the minute. There seemed to be no advantage to either at first, but gradually Hosmer took the lead, and after the end of the first half-mile, when the stroke of both had been reduced to 325, the American had the lead. UNION OF CHURCHES.

TORONTO, June 24.—The Church of England Synod here today took steps to confer with the Presbyterian, Methodist and other Christian bodies in Canada, for the purpose of ascertaining the possibilities of honorable union with such bodies, and if such union be found possible with out a sacrifice of essential Christian principles, to formulate a scheme for effecting such a union. A few years ago the Canadian Methodist Church, the Bible Christians, the Episcopal Methodists, and the Primitive Methodist Church united. This union was looked upon by many as a preliminary move toward the foundation of a great evangelical church in Canada, out of the principal Christian churches in this country. The movement to-day is considered as a step in the direction of forming a great evangelical church in Canada.

BAPTIST CONFERENCE.—The Union Baptist Ministerial Conference met yesterday morning in the Mission rooms, on Gorman street, Elder Capp in the chair. The reports from the churches were encouraging. One was read by the Rev. F. B. Church, and one by the Rev. F. B. Church. The Carleton church has kindly granted their pastor an extended vacation, and made him a handsome donation. THE IRISH QUESTION.
A FENIAN CIRCULAR SAID TO BE IN CIRCULATION.

GLADSTONE ASKS THE PEOPLE TO CLEAR THE TRACK FOR THE TRAIN OF PROGRESS.

LONDON, June 21.—McDonald, an Irish landholder, had been selected to contest the West Division of Lington against Richard Chamberlain, brother of Joseph Chamberlain. McDonald, although he has been blind since the day of his birth, is a finely educated man. He graduated from Trinity College, and was for a time Protestant minister, and he is an eloquent platform speaker.

The Times publishes what it says is a copy of a private special circular recently sent by the president of the supreme council to different "centres" of the Irish Republic, which has been throughout the kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland.

The document fills a column of the Times in fine print. The gist of it lies in the claim that to the efforts of the Fenians Ireland indebted for the present advanced position occupied by the Irish cause, and in the statement that while Gladstone's scheme is inadequate, because Ireland must have nothing short of independence, it is the duty of Irishmen to support the premier in every way in order to enable him to complete the step he wishes to take. The Times says the document is marked "to be destroyed when read."

EXTENSION, June 21.—Gladstone addressed another large and enthusiastic meeting here to-day. In the course of his speech he said it was irksome to always be compelled to come to Ireland, and that this was due to the Tories, who blocked the way, so that the government could not get rid of the question and proceed to the other business of the empire. He relied, he added, upon the people's energy to clear the line now and allow the train of progress to go on to its destination. If they continued in office, the cabinet would carry out the home rule programme with due regard to their obligations. They desired to secure local self-government for Ireland, with perfect security to the imperial union.
