





## FROM THE STATES.

**Bangor, May 16.**  
Post despatch says serious disagreements between Halleck and Hooker. Halleck countermanded Hooker's new movement.  
Prominent Congressmen united in vigorous protest against Halleck's taking the field.  
Though President may veto the project, advice from General Grant are to the 8th. He expresses satisfaction with affairs in his vicinity, and states Portjulludsen undoubtedly evacuated except by a small force and heavy artillery.

## GEN. LEE'S ADDRESS TO HIS ARMY.

**Head Quarters, Army Northern Va., May 7, 1861.**  
General Order No. 59.—With heartfelt gratification the General commanding expresses to the army his sense of the heroic conduct displayed by the officers and men during the arduous operations in which they have just been engaged under trying vicissitudes of heat and storm.

Yog attacked the enemy strongly entrenched in the depths of a tangled wilderness, and again on the hill of Fredericksburg, 15 miles distant, and by the valor that has triumphed on many fields forced him once more to seek safety beyond the Rappahannock.  
While this glorious victory entitles you to the praise and gratitude of the nation, we are especially called upon to return our grateful thanks to the only giver of victory for the signal deliverance He has wrought. It is therefore, earnestly recommended that the troops unite Sunday next, in ascribing the Lord of Hosts the glory due his name.

Let us not forget, in our rejoicings, the brave soldiers who have fallen in defence of their country, and while we mourn their loss, let us resolve to emulate their noble example.

The army and country, alike lament the absence for a time of one whose bravery and skill they are so much indebted to for success.

"I have received your despatch, and unite with you in giving praise to God for the success which has covered our army. In the name of the people, offer my cordial thanks to yourself and troops under your command for this addition to the unprecedented series of great victories which your army has achieved. The universal rejoicing produced by this happy result, will be mingled with a general regret for the good and brave who are numbered among the killed and wounded."

## DEATH OF STONEWALL JACKSON.

The reported death of Stonewall Jackson appears to be confirmed. The Richmond papers say that he was accidentally wounded by his own men, having had his left arm shattered and his right hand shot through. When Gen. Lee was informed of it he sent Jackson, regretting that he had not been wound instead. The Richmond papers are said to contain the following—

**Headquarters Northern Virginia, May 11, 1863.**  
General Order No. 16.

With deep grief the commanding general announces to the army the death of Lieut. T. J. Jackson who expired on the 10th, at 3.15 p. m. The daring skill and energy of this great and good soldier, by the decree of an All-wise Providence, are now lost to us but while we mourn his death, we feel that his spirit still lives and will inspire the whole army with his indomitable courage and unshaken confidence in God as our hope and strength. Let his name be a watchword to his corps who has followed him to victory on so many fields. Let the officers and soldiers imitate his invincible determination to do everything in the defence of our beloved country.

The Boston Courier says—  
The touching allusion, in Gen. Lee's address to his army, to the absence of one of his officers, can only be in reference to Gen. Jackson, who it now appears has sunk under his wounds. The name of no officer of the Confederate Army is so familiar to all classes of people as that of "Stonewall" Jackson; and throughout the South, owing to his distinguished bravery, his military skill, his steady energy and fervent religious character, he was regarded as a sort of combination of Chevalier Bayard and one of Cromwell's devoted fighting Generals. To the Confederates his loss is really irreparable, and now that he has fought his last great fight, we may well say, as David did when tidings reached him of the death of Saul, "his enemy—though afterwards there was long war between the house of Saul and the house of David"—"The beauty of Israel is slain upon thy high places." "How are the mighty fallen in the midst of battle!"

Our victory on the Rappahannock has cost us dear in the severe wounds unfortunately received by the great and good General

Jackson. His left arm has been amputated above the elbow; a bullet has passed through his right hand. His condition is now, we learn, as favorable as could possibly be expected; and he will doubtless recover, and is not, we trust, lost to active service. We could better spare a brigade or a division. It would be grievous to think that his banner will never more flash out upon the Yankee rear, and throw them at its first gleam into headlong route, with the sudden outcry "Jackson's coming!"—that the stern eye of the hero will never more lighten with a warrior's joy as he launches brigade upon brigade upon the stubborn foe, until the hated flag stoops and the columns reel, and break and fly, with the vengeful Confederate cheer ringing in their ears.

Our base foe will exult in the disaster to Jackson; yet the accused bullet which brooded down was never moulded by a Yankee. Through a cruel mistake, in the confusion, the hero received two balls from some of his own men who would have died for him.

It is stated Russia will address memorandum to the powers upon Poland stating concessions made to Poles and causes of continual insurrection. Asserted Poles will publish counter memorandum.

**DENMARK.**  
There is warlike news from Copenhagen; it is said all Danish ships of war are to be put in commission and army mobilized.

Seven ships of war fully armed including iron clads, are at Cherbourg, and partisans of war assert it is designed to send French fleet to Swedish port of Carlscrona.

**POLISH MATTERS.**

Cracow correspondent of the London Times says it appears from official enquiries on the part of the National Government of Poland there are 150 bands of insurgents in the Kingdom alone, some few of which are from 200 to 500 strong, while others only number 50 to 60. Many bands are in existence of which nothing is known by the National Government beyond the fact that they do exist. The fine weather increases the number of insurgents, but it will also enable the Russians to employ their artillery.

Warsaw official Journals confirm the news that 500 Russians have been defeated and forced to seek refuge in Prussia Territory.

**GREECE.**

The Representatives of protesting Powers of Greece will assemble in conference in London about 25th May.

**CHINA.**

Private telegram from Singapore via French mail at Suez without date, reports cotton goods and yarns much up.

**LATEST.**

London via Queenstown, 3rd.—Consols, after official hours yesterday, were very firm at 93 5-8.

Paris Bourse opened 69.65.

Sir C. Trevelyan's Indian budget will show surplus of £2,000,000, with which he will sweep away almost all existing custom duties, replacing them by a uniform rate of 5 per cent ad valorem. The exceptions are spirits and tariffed piece goods; the beer duty will be reduced to 3 1/2 p. per barrel.

The Shipping Gazette reports that the Government has abandoned the Metropolitan Amalgamation Police bill.

The Prince of Wales was present at the annual dinner of the Royal Academy yesterday evening.

The Observer in a pacific article does justice to President Lincoln, and his advisers, who, it says, evince earnest desire to cultivate the most friendly relations with Great Britain, and to avoid giving just cause of offence.

## MINISTER ADAMS AND MATAMORAS TRADE.

**RESTORATION OF THE EXTENSIVE CORDIALS WITH EARL RUSSELL.**

[From the Times, April 28.]

The public will be glad to learn that the difficulties occasioned by the recent issue by Mr. Adams of the certificate or pass to Messrs Howell and Ziman are likely to be smoothed down. It is reported that Mr. Adams is conscious of having acted in the matter upon imperfect representations and with undue haste, and that consequently he raises no pretensions such as would necessitate any absolute protest from one government to the other on the subject. It is, therefore, believed that the relations between our cabinet and the United States Legation in London will continue on a friendly footing, a result which, in a personal sense, will afford unmingled satisfaction, since the individual and historical claims of Mr. Adams, to

respect and esteem have never been disputed in any quarter.

We have it on the best authority that whatever difficulties might have been expected from the recent issue of a letter of safe conduct by Mr. Adams, the United States Minister here, to a British ship bound for Matamoros will be avoided. No unpleasantness now exists on the subject in the relations between Mr. Adams and our Government, such frank explanations have been given by the United States Minister as have re-established those friendly feelings which have always existed between himself and Earl Russell.

## BRUTALITY OF FEDERAL OFFICERS.—A

Washington correspondent of the Philadelphia Sunday Despatch, in detailing numerous acts of brutality perpetrated on the men by the officers of the Federal army, says—

Old men have been tied to trees with their arms up over their heads for hours and when taken down were so exhausted by the unnatural strain that they had to be rubbed to bring them to their senses. A more judicious punishment would have made them feel ashamed of their conduct. It would, too, have prevented their comrades from feeling that sympathy for the oppressed which is so dangerous.

There is not a shadow of doubt that our officers have been "picked off" and shot by their own men on the battlefield in numerous instances to gratify private grudges. A staff officer in conversation with me on this very subject, stated that he had been informed by a surgeon, who had gone over the battlefield at Antietam, that "he found from his great horror and surprise that nearly all the officers killed were wounded from behind."

One of the despatches contains the information that Stoneman's cavalry raid has been greatly overrated, and the damage done by him to the railroad was repaired in twenty-four hours; and yet this raid a few days since was called the "most brilliant exploit of the war."

A despatch to the Bangor Times says: "The truth of the report is now satisfactorily ascertained, that some of our wounded who were lying in the woods around Chancellorsville were burned to death. The woods were fired by our own and the enemy's shells, and the flames spread rapidly until the rain fell."

The Westminster Times says that the body of an infant female child, about three weeks old, was found in some bushes on the Shedd road, two miles from town, on Sunday last. An inquest was held on Monday, before Jacob Wortman, Esq., Coroner, and the body identified as that of a child which was born in town last Christmas Day, and is supposed to have been deserted by its mother about the 12th of January last, having on that day left town with the infant in her arms, and has not since been heard from. The jury returned a verdict of wilful desertion by the mother, and death from exposure to the cold.

**POPULATION OF POLAND.**—Out of a population of 29,220,000 included in the ancient kingdom of Poland, there are supposed to be about 8,500,000 Roman Catholics, 3,740,000 Greek Catholics, 3,430,000 members of the Eastern Church, 2,150,000 Protestants and 2,110,000 Jews, besides about 50,000 Mahomedans.

**THE NEWS SENT ABROAD.**—It is stated that a special messenger was despatched to England by Lord Lyons, in the steamer Persia on Wednesday, with the news of Gen. Hooker's defeat in Virginia.

**IMPORTANT LIQUOR CASE.**—The proprietor of a hotel or saloon in Montreal having been repeatedly pounced on by the law for selling liquor on Sunday, hit upon a plan to avoid trouble, and at the same time make the coppers. Over his bar was the dining room; to it he made a "dumb waiter," by which the cocktails, &c., were sent aloft.

After this plan was in operation it was astonishing how hungry the visitors to this establishment became. All Sunday there was a general rush to the "Dining Room." A "stranger" dropped in on Sunday week, and enquired for the bar. The waiter very obligingly showed him up stairs to the eatable room. Here he found a crowd of thirty "chiefs," who, if they had been eating, had evidently had been as hungry as they were thirsty, for no visible marks of boiled or roast calves or lambs were there, but the "dumb waiter" was hard at work bringing up the "horns." "Stranger," took his "nip" quietly, paid for it, and then walked away. Next morning Boniface was invited to the Recorder's Court, where he was rudely asked "Why he sold liquor on Sunday?" He answered quite satisfactorily, to himself, that he did not sell in the bar, and those who were drinking in the establishment were travellers or boarders. The Court took into consideration the excuses, and a few days after decided that "wines, ales and spirits could be supplied out to travellers or sick persons, but not the regular boarders in a hotel." A fine of \$15 was thereupon imposed. [Toronto Globe.]

## CHARGES OF CRUELTY AGAINST NAVAL OFFICERS.—The court-martial on Capt.

Hillyar, C. B., and Lieut. Lillingston, of H. M. S. Cadmus, was brought to a conclusion this afternoon, after having extended over fourteen days. The evidence for the defence was closed at 10.45, and at 3.40 the court was again opened, when the Deputy Judge Advocate read the finding of the court.

Captain Hillyar was acquitted of the charges of cruelty and oppression, and also for ordering punishment not to be entered in the defaulters book, but was found guilty of an act to the prejudice of good order and naval discipline, in not making himself acquainted with the punishments which were going on in the Cadmus while he was in command, and seeing them entered in the defaulters book, for which the Court adjudged him to be severely reprimanded.

The charge against Lieut. Lillingston was found to be partly proved, inasmuch as he had been guilty of an officer like conduct in ordering punishments to be inflicted upon Baker and other boys of the Cadmus, which were not authorised by her Majesty's regulations. The Court adjudged him to be dismissed her Majesty's service; but, in consideration of the zeal and ability shown by him, they recommended him to the favorable consideration of the Admiralty. [Portsmouth paper.]

## ST. ANDREWS, MAY 20, 1863.

From an official notice in this day's paper to which we direct the attention of our readers, it will be noticed that it is His Excellency, the Lieut. Governor's intention to pay his first visit to St. Andrews on the 28th inst; a Levee will be held in the Court House, at noon, where all persons desirous of being presented, will have an opportunity afforded them. We wish that His Excellency's visit had been appointed for a week or two later, as the foliage on the trees would then have given our streets that picturesque appearance so frequently noticed by strangers. We understand that the Lieut. Governor also purposes visiting St. Stephen, St. George, Campo Bello and Grand Masson. What a shame it is that the flag so long promised for the Fort, has not yet been sent. The flag formerly used for the purpose, was, together with the Brass Field Pieces improperly removed during the Crimean war, and have not been returned. We trust that the gallant Colonel of the first Battalion C. C. Militia will take measures not only to obtain a flag from the Government, but will also demand that the Brass ordnance belonging to the Battalion, be returned without delay.

**THE QUEEN'S BIRTH DAY** falling this year on Sunday, His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, has issued a proclamation appointing Monday the 25th instant, to be kept as a General Holiday. It is in contemplation here, to observe the day in a becoming manner, by firing a Royal Salute from the fort, obtaining fireworks, and having a bon fire on the hill. It is to be hoped that all will cheerfully contribute towards defraying the expenses of our humble though hearty demonstration. We do sincerely trust that the day will be observed as a Holiday, and that although the shop doors will be locked, the merchants will follow the example of those in other places, and leave their shutters off. The Volunteers will keep up the military ardor by a general parade and marching through the streets. God save the Queen.

**A WANT SUPPLIED.**—By reference to our advertising columns, it will be noticed that great desideratum has been supplied to the public in the establishment of an accommodation Stage in connection with the Railway trains, steamboats and Hotels. We trust that by the time we will meet with that encouragement which this undertaking merits. The Stage will be a great accommodation to travellers.

Circulars have been forwarded to the local Agricultural Societies by the Secretary of the Provincial Board of Agriculture, stating that the Board offer two premiums of the value of \$20 and \$10 on the 1st and 2d largest quantity of cutched flax water retted raised in this Province. Also recommendations for a more uniform system of awarding Premiums, and likewise a recommendation to the several Agricultural Societies to appoint local Emigrant Agents. In our next issue we will publish the circular.

**MANGANESE** has been discovered in this County, Edward Jack, Esq., has some fair specimens. The fact has been established long since, that this County abounds with mineral wealth; it only requires capital, energy and scientific knowledge to develop the great natural resources of Charlotte;

and we believe the day is not far distant when our mines will be worked. A good business is already doing by the company who are working the copper ore at Le Tang.

It is reported, that one of the most central and well finished Houses in town, has been rented by a stranger for the purpose of opening a Hotel for the accommodation of families visiting St. Andrews for the benefit of sea bathing, and spending a few weeks in this vicinity. It is also contemplated to enlarge the building by adding an ell to it, should the demand for accommodation require it.

The American papers report the death of Gen. T. J. Jackson, the "great" Confederate general. With others we are not prepared to believe the report unless authenticated by better authority, as it has frequently been stated by the same papers, that Beauregard was dead, and in one or two instances Jackson killed. If the report is true, the Federals will be too glad to know that they will not have to face "Stonewall" Jackson again. That he was a great general and a brave man admitted, and his place in the Confederate army will not soon be filled by his equal.

We have been informed on good authority that a series of military fortifications are to be immediately commenced in St. John and its vicinity. It is time that this necessary movement were made by the British Government; and we hope the same power will take into consideration the very defective provisions made for the accommodation of Her Majesty's troops in Fredericton, the military Headquarters of the province. [Reporter]

A man named Clarke was drowned on Wednesday last by falling overboard from the Bonnie Dhu on the trip to Woodstock. The steamer's bow was caught by the eddy and the very rapid tide at Burgoyne's Ferry, and the deceased, who was sitting in a canoe on the deck, went over the side as the listed; a portion of the freight went overboard at the same time.
