MIDSUMMER MEET AT CHATHAM PROVIDED SOME SPLENDID RACING

ACTION AGAINST KEDGEWICK PEOPLE

Fredericton, N. B., July 11.—Twenty settlers of Kedgewick, a lumbering village on the International Railway, are being proceeded against by the department of lands and mines under the law respecting forest fires as a result of the recent forest fire which did upwards of \$150,000 of damage in that district. The papers have been sworn out, before Magistrate E. F. Matheson, before whom the defendants will appear in Campbellton on July 15. Some of the charges are for fighting fires without a permit, while others are charged with allowing fires to burn on their lands without making any attempt to put them out.

"LONG LIVE THE DEAD" WILL BE THE BUGLER'S CALL

Plans for Impressive Ceremonial at Paris on Victory Day, in which 20,000 Picked Allied Troops Will Participate.

Paris, July 16.—Twenty thousand picked men representing all the armies will parade from Fort. Maitlot to the Place de la Republique on Victory day July 14. How many millions will view the triumphant march of the victorious armies is a matter of conjecture.

A squadron of Republican Guards will lead the procession, then come Marshal Foch and his staff, then General Pershing and the American generals; then Field Marshal Haig at the head of the Highlanders, Irish Fusiliers and English troops.

Gallant little Belgium will be represented next by Generals Guilian and Lenman, the hero of Leige. The Contingents of Japan, Greece, Poland and Portugal, Siberia, Roumania, Siam and Czecho-Slovakia, consisting of one company and flag, will march in the order named.

Marshal Petaia with Generals De Castelnuo, Debeney and Berthelot, Military Governor of Paris, will immediately precede the French detachments from twenty-one army corps bearing the flags of all French regiments which have seen service during the war.

Even Germany Represented. Even Germany will be given a place in the Victory Parade. German flags captured from the enemy in the bitter battles of 1918, in the memorable days of the Yser, the Marne, the Somme and Verdun will be carried by the units which emerged victorious from these engagements. There is one flag at present at the Minister of the Interior, in M. Pains' private office, the staff of which is broken and the banner in shreds. It is the flag of Fort Vaux, which Major, now Lieutenant-Colonel, Raynal, defender of Vaux, will bear down the boulevard. M. Pains' eyes filled with tears as he told the correspondent today how he regretted to part with the flag, even for a few hours. The flag will be returned to the Pantheon after the parade.

Under the Arc de Triumphe there is being constructed a huge catafalque with an empty coffin embodying the souls of the million and a half men who died in France.

At this point the troops will come to attention, Marshals Foch and Petaia, Field Marshal Haig, Generals Pershing, Guilian and Diaz and others high officers will salute, the soldiers will present arms while the bugler will trumpet "Long Live the Dead."

MARSHAL JOFFRE WILL LEAD TROOPS

During the Triumphant March in Paris on Bastille Day.

Paris, July 16.—Marshal Joffre, it was announced today in the lobby of the Chamber of Deputies, will lead the troops during the first triumphant march here on Bastille Day, July 14th, but on arriving at the Presidential stand to salute President Poincare, he will leave the procession and will be invited to take his seat beside the President.

More than 100 deputies, dissatisfied with the place given Marshal Joffre in the parade, introduced in the Chamber a resolution, which they signed, inviting the Government "to give Marshal Joffre and commanders of armies and army corps under him places in the victory parade merited by their eminent services in the battle of the Marne, which saved the country and civilization."

An official note was issued today saying:

"The newspapers announce the Government has not invited Marshal Joffre to participate in Monday's parade in the place which is due him. This news is false."



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

TWO MEN SENT TO PENITENTIARY FROM BATHURST, N. B.

One Sentenced to Ten Years' Hard Labor, and the Other to Five.

Sheriff Meahan, of Bathurst, had two young men escape from jail last week. They broke the lock of their cell door and escaped while the servant was taking tea to some prisoners. Their freedom did not last long. On Saturday night a week ago the C.N.R. freight station was burglarized and the Sheriff having some idea as to a clue waited until Monday night when he suddenly swooped down upon a camp in the woods not far away.

The Northern Light then proceeded to the Sheriff's Deputy, F. C. Meahan, and Inspector O. B. Lawson, of the C.N.R. and Officers Ramsay and Gagnon took part, the pair of burglars being finally captured and lodged in jail. One of them was found to be William Gagnon, a young man with a well-known record in crime, and the other gave his name as McDonald and his native place as the Island.

The case against Gagnon and McDonald is said to have developed into a record handing out of justice in the Dominion. The offence with which they were charged was committed on Sunday night. They were taken into custody on Monday night. Before Magistrate O'Brien on Tuesday morning for trial, and on Tuesday afternoon their cases were submitted to the Grand Jury and a true bill found. On Wednesday they appeared before Judge McLatchy and a petit jury. McDonald pleaded guilty, and Thursday Gagnon was found guilty and the pair were sentenced. INGENIOUS AND DARING GIRL

To Figure in the Provincial Courts.

Fredericton, July 14.—One of Canada's biggest mail order houses in Toronto has been victimized, not once but no less than sixteen times, by a young woman who, during the past year, attended the New Brunswick Normal School here, and whose daring and ingenuity for some time completely baffled the management of the wealthy corporations with whom she operated. Like most crooked cases this one eventually came to grief simply because everything seemed to be so easy that she overstepped. Now a representative of the Toronto company is hot on her trail, and it is believed that to-day will see her arrest at Sussex, N. B., where she is attending a Summer School for teacher.

The charge upon which the young woman's arrest will be sought is that of obtaining money under false pretences. It is declared she not only carried on her operations while at school here, but also from her home on St. North Street. The young woman's plan of operation was to write a letter to the mail order house, complaining that goods which she falsely ordered had not been received were unsatisfactory, saying she was returning the goods and asking them to return her money. In this way she took advantage of a loophole in the company's system, for on comparatively small orders it was not deemed worth while to check back on the books and the company merely sent her a money order for the amount named in her letter without waiting to find out whether the money was coming to her or not. In this way, by writing varied letters and using different names, the young woman, it is claimed, was able to victimize the Toronto house on no less than sixteen occasions. "It seems a most remarkable thing to us that a young woman possessed of so much initiative, ingenuity and daring as to make it possible for her to victimize one of Canada's biggest business houses should respect her time studying to be a teacher in some little country place," commented the agent of the Toronto concern.

"Own Your Own Home." This slogan has become almost as popular and universally recognized as "Win the War," many business organizations, federations and construction industries, and other associations, are making a particularly strong plea that the citizen who owns a comfortable, sanitary and attractive dwelling, is a more contented, progressive and solid resident than the individual who is always paying rent, and is at the beck and call of an avaricious landlord. The sense of possession, the pride in surroundings, the domestic influence and the realization of ideals which cluster around the model and inviting family habitation, have been enlarged upon in many pertinent and stimulating articles. There is, therefore no need for reiterating them. The sentimental phase of this important question has been presented forcibly in numerous public addresses and instructive brochures. There is, however, a practical and business side, not to speak of the aesthetic or romantic appeal during world-wide process of readjustment and reparation.

RETAIL LUMBERMEN CAN DO MUCH BY PUBLIC PROPAGANDA

and strengthen the strongly implanted desire that is in the breast of every father and husband—to plan, build and own a home. One enterprising eastern dealer advertises that he furnishes all kinds of materials for "homes—not houses." This appeal is particularly pointed and embodies both a sentimental and practical viewpoint. The retail lumberman is also in the position to furnish much valuable advice and should be able to give estimates, make suggestions, and provide facilities such as will encourage the average householder to launch out on a venture in his own behalf. Never has home building been so vividly portrayed in magazines and in the daily press as at the present moment, and even in a pictorial way the sentimental side of the proposal is "played up" with a good deal of effect and sometimes with not a little humor. In connection with the enterprise the United States Department of Labor has undertaken to furnish retail lumbermen, contractors, builders and others with a series of bright and pointed bulletins. This department has an information and Education Service Bureau which is doing effective work, and hundreds of copies have been sent broadcast, with the result that even the most listless have been incited to do some serious thinking relating to the home building proposition. It might be advisable for some of the districts of the Ontario Retail Lumbermen's Association and other similar bodies in the various provinces of the Dominion to adopt a like move and demonstrate that as lumber merchants and builders' supply men they are real vital factors in the stability and progress of the community. One particular vigilant lumberman has sent to the department of Washington for copies of these bulletins and has displayed them in his yard and office. The result that he has aroused considerable local interest in the home building idea. It is not necessary to comment at length on the instructive and insensate effect of this move. In the service there are epigrammatic utterances—grave, gay, solemn, weighty, pointed and racy—constituting clarion calls to suit all minds and

HOW THE V.C. WAS WON BY N. B. MAN

Remarkable Achievements of Corp. Herman Good.

(Halifax Herald)

"For most conspicuous bravery and leading when in attack his company was held up by heavy fire from three machine guns, which were seriously laying the advance. Realizing the gravity of the situation this N. C. O. dashed forward alone, killing several of the garrison and capturing the remainder. Later Corp. Good, while alone, encountered a battery of 5.9 inch guns, which were in action at the time. Collecting three men of his section he charged the battery under point blank fire and captured the entire crews of three guns."—From Official Gazette.

Among the men who enlisted from the lumber camps of the Chaleur basin, was Herman James Good. He was not yet 30 years old, but he had for a number of years been boss of the big lumber drives under the Bathurst Lumber Company. He worked in the forest and on the drives in the winter and spring. The rest of the time he worked on his farm about three miles from Bathurst. Outdoor life made him strong and physically courageous. It gave him great powers of endurance, so that when he was in the great battle in France, though wounded three times, he recovered and was at the front on the memorial 11th of November, when the Armistice was signed.

Sergt. Good enlisted June 28, 1915, with the 55th Battalion. After a period of training in Sussex and at Valcartier, he went to England. He got to France April 12th, 1916, just a year after the first heroic stand of the Canadians, of which the men in the Lumber camps had read and talked of the spring before.

Sergt. Good has been through all the fighting since, with the exception of a few months in hospital as the result of wounds received on three different occasions.

Just a month after going into the trenches, Sergt. Good received his first wound. Back to the trenches in a short time, he was again sent back, Sept., 1916, for shell shock, when he was in hospital for six weeks. Two whole years of active service followed without any more wounds or sickness. He received his third strip for wounds, August 17, 1918, when he was gassed just eight days after he had won the Victoria Cross. After being in hospital for a month and then spending three weeks' leave in Glasgow, he went to France and was there till fighting stopped.

Sergt. Good is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Good, of Big River, N. B. about four miles from Bathurst, their nearest town. He was born on his parents' farm at Big River, and lived in that vicinity all his life until he set out for France, where he has distinguished himself so signally. Sergt. Good himself owns a farm not far from his father's. After he left school he worked on his father's farm. Then he took charge of a farm of his own, and spent his time between it and the lumber camps.

The victory which we all rejoice over was not won by chance. It was made possible by individual acts such as are recorded in the official report of Sergt. Good's deed of valor which won him the highest honor conferred on British soldiers. On the field of battle he was made Lance Corporal, then Corporal and after he won the V. C. he was made Sergeant.

In the thick of the awful fighting of last August, when the Allies were in the heat of their great advance, when they had staked their all for final victory, Sergt. Good performed the act of valor which won for him the Victoria Cross. He was no sluggard, no quitter. The Canadians were advancing in the face of an awful fire.

The Germans had three machine guns that were giving them trouble. Those guns were taking many good men. Sergt. Good made up his mind that that sort of thing should stop. Alone he dashed forward, killed several of the men operating the guns and made prisoners of the remainder. He took back his prisoners, but did not stay back long. Into the fight he went again and this time he encountered a battery of big guns that threw a shell more than five inches in diameter. He was alone.

Did he hesitate? Did the point blank range that the guns had on him frighten him? Did he run, or fall flat on the ground? This is what he did: he called to three of his section who were near, to follow him. The four of them, with Good leading, attacked the big gun crews, and one of the firecrackers of the great war was performed. Those

four men captured the whole of the gun crews, of the three guns of the battery. So was the V. C. won by Sergt. Good.

POWERS DECIDE TO ADMIT AUSTRIA. To Membership in the League of Nations When She Has Responsible Government. Paris, July 9.—Austria will be admitted to membership in the League of Nations as soon as the Allied and Associated Powers consider that she possesses a responsible government with both the will and power to fulfill its international obligations. The Austrian peace delegation has been so informed in a reply by the Supreme Council of the Peace Conference to an Austrian plea for immediate admission to the league. Sympathy with the idea of the League of Nations, and an expression of willingness to be satisfied with taking the role of a participating member in that organization and enjoy its protection was expressed in the Austrian reply to the Allied peace terms. The reply was dated at St. Germain-en-Laye, June 27, in the form of a communication from Chancellor Renner, head of the Austrian peace delegation, to Premier Clemenceau as President of the Peace Conference. The reply set forth that the delegation recognized that German-Austria note names the nations, could not take part in the problem of creating the League, "which by its very nature remains in the hands of Great Powers," but will be glad of its protection "without taking an important part in the rights and obligations entailed by membership in this League.
