As usual the most effective agitation is emanating from the secret revolutionary publishing houses of St. Petersburg and Moscow. The Moscow center is preparing to introduce to

manifesto, reading: "Liberty lovers, take notice! His Imperial Majesty the Czar practically concedes our claim that the Russian people are victims of organic political and social wrong. He condemns the autocratic machine as destructive of the progressive idea and uses language that justifies the masses, although not definitely invited to do so, in co-operating with the supreme head of the state in accomplishing reforms.

"This manifesto issued by the Czar is important because of its admissions and not because of any reality in the measures of emancipation to which it hazily points. The promised religious toleration gives no right to the orthodox Russian to adopt any other Christian creed. Hereafter as formerly apostates will be liable to deprivation of civil rights and deportation to Si-





Says That Germany Will Renew the Dreibund

And Will Not Pursue an Active Policy in Balkans.

Berlin, March 19. - In the Reichstag should not be mixed up with the re-newal of the Dreibund. Reference has been made here to my remarks that the Dreibund is no longer absolutely necessary to us. Even the German papers, which should have known better, drew false conclusions from those words. With that utterance I did not damage the prospects of a renewal of the Dreibund or render it difficult, but, on the contrary, I facilitated it, even substantially, against elements that wanted to prevent its renewal. I only meant that Germany did need an alliance more than any other power. The foreign press last year repeatedly asserted that the Dreibund had lost its significance. That is an innocent pleasure, which we must leave to those who were disappointed at its renewal. They were weeping tanners whose hides a freshet has carried off. The Dreibund will have the same weight in the scale of politics as formerly.'

The chancellor then touched on the Macedonian question. "Germany," he said, "adheres to the fundamental principle not to pursue an active policy in the Balkans, and agrees with every measure leading to actual im-provement in the situation, without shaking Turkey's territorial integrity. Russia's and Austria's proposal met these requirements skillfully. We shall never refuse our co-operation where a question of the maintenance of peace is involved."






