It is easy for a man in Mr. Carling's position to talk that way. The worst of it is that these holders of fat offices judge the condition of the people by their own standard, whereas the average farmer, mercantile man and wage-earner know very well that a statement of this kind is wide of the truth. The taxes piled on the people by the present Government have been unreduced while this Administration con-tinues in power. Of course Canadians might be worse off if they lived in a country less richly endowed with natural rees, or if they worked shorter hours which fall to the lot of the rich office-holders, who see everything clothed in such roseate tints. They have a right to demand that the Government of the country shall take steps to enable them to enjoy the full regults of their labor whether in the field or results of their labor whether in the held of in the workshop, and that is not possible while a Ministry subsidized by the com-bines remains committed to the policy of forwarding the interests of the monopolists first and above all things.

THE SUGAR BEET INDUSTRY.

Some interest has recently been awakened in this Province in the manufacture of beet sugar, partly by the visit of a German gentleman representing a firm of plant manufacturers, and partly also by inquiries which have been made by Mr. Skaife, of the Province of Quebec, with a view to establish a factory at some favorable point in Ontario. The latter gentleman has been carrying on operations in Berthier, Quebec, For a short time, but his venture has not s far proven to be very successful, and he appears to be desirous of finding a field where he can depend on getting a larger public life of Canada." and richer supply of roots.

The history of the industry in Europe

shows that many costly mistakes have be made both in the growth of beets and the application of processes for their conversion into sugar, and it seems likely that on this continent we are destined to see a repetition of the same mistakes before the industry es firmly established.

But we are not now without some valuable information on the subject, and men who are intelligent and cautious will not venture large sums of money on new experi-ments without first seeking to know what has been learned elsewhere at the cost of thers. We feel therefor like earnestly recommending to any capitalists who may ly issued by the Department of Agriculture at Washington, prepared by Prof. H. W. Wiley and entitled "Culture of the Sugar Beet and Manufacture of Beet Sugar." is a work of 255 pages and treats the subject historically and scientifically, with copious illustrations. The object of this bulletin is to give the present condition of the best augar industry of the United States, to locate those portions of the country which are best suited for the production of the sugar beet, and to indicate the line of work necessary to the successful introduction and extension of the beet sugar industry in that country. It is largely, however, a compilation of the re-enits obtained in other countries, and in

calts obtained in other countries, and in this respect it possesses much value. But it presents also a large quantity of material gathered during the past year in various parts of the United States.

One special object of the work, as stated at the outset, is to prevent those intending to engage in the industry from going wrong in the beginning, and squandering their money and time in battling with problems which science has already met and overwhich science has already met and over The author does not hesitate to say that

the problem of the control of the co

for many years to come there will probably be found more enthusiasm than knowledge connected with the sugar-beet, and that un ess great care be taken many ventures will be made which may result in financial disaster. The danger is not that mistakes will be made in processes for the extraction of the sugar from the beet, for the best of the sugar from the beet, for the best methods of clarifying the juice, evaporating it and separating the sugar from the molasses are thoroughly well understood, and are no longer legitimate subjects for public experiment. "The great problem in this country," Prof. Wiley says, "is the agricultural one. The selection of suitable soil, the finding of the proper climatic conditions, and instruction in the method of planting, cultivating and harvesting the beets, are all matters of the method of planting, cultivating and harvesting the beets, are all matters of adians. Accordingly a large portion of the bulletin is devoted to those particular lines of inquiry. voted to those particular lines of inquiry, and much valuable information is presented, applicable to Ontario as well as to the United States. But in the following note of warning there is an instructive lesson on the need of caution here as well as in the United States:

Many attempts have been made for the past 25 years to introduce the beet-sugar industry into the United States. Factories have been located in the New England States, notably in Maine and Massa-chusetts, also in Delaware, in Illinois, and in California. With two exceptions all of these ventures have brought with them financial disaster. The factories in New England, Delaware and Illinois, and some of those started in California, have been abandoned. One factory in California has been very successfully operated for a num-ber of years, viz., the one at Alvarado. Another one, viz., at Watsonville, has been in successful operation for two years. From the success of these two it is reasonable to infer that others must also succeed when the proper conditions are supplied. It is well, however, that just now, when there seems to be such an awakening in regard to beet sugar, a few words of warning should be spoken. Any further financial disasters would exercise a most depressing effect upon the advancement of the industry. These isasters are sure to come if attempts are made to erect factories in a short time in localities where the capabilities of the soil and climate are untried, with capital insufficient in amount, and under the direction of those unskilled in all the branches of the industry itself.

To us in Ontario the lesson is to make To us in Ontario the lesson is to make haste slowly. We believe that we have here the climate and soil necessary to secure success in producing the beet, but the wise course for us is to test the country well first by the growing of sample lots and ascertaining their suitability by careful analysts. When that work is carefully done it will be time groups to think of done, it will be time enough to think of erecting factories and devoting large areas to the crop.

-Mr. Price, formerly manager of the Great Western Railway of Canada, has been telling the old country people what he thinks of Canadian railways. Asked as to the Grand Trunk's condition and prospects he said:

Itraveled over the Grand Trunk all the way from Montreal to Hamilton, and then to Chicago. I found the line in splendid order, as you may judge when I tell you that we ran from Chicago to Hamilton, including stoppages, at the rate of 49 miles an hour. The distance is 560 miles. The journey could not, in fact, have been accomplished with greater comfort on our own Great Northern. Passing Sarnia, I saw the work in progress at the St. Clair Tunnel. It was finished a few days later. The success of this tunnel will be a great item to the credit of the Grand Trunk. It will certainly save them 35 minutes in the passenger transit, and probably two or three hours on every freight train. It will enable them to run through without br-aking up from Chicago to New York. The saving of expense and time is, of course, obvious.

-Of late years the theatrical bu has grown to enormous proportions. In the United States alone there are probably something like 300 traveling companies. As the great majority of these con give employment to modern playwrights, it might be supposed that the drama was in a state of growth rather than decay, but a theatrical performance to be successfu must not rise above the head of the averag theater goer. The reproaches bestowed upon the stage may be deserved, but is it because there is a public demand for slang, vulgarity, tawdry sentiment and chear pathos that these things are so abundantly served up? The play which has run 100 nights, no matter how lacking in originality, literary skill, or even intelligent treatment, is a fair reflection of public taste.

—A remarkable piece of glass has just been imported into the States, and is now at the telescope works of Alvan Clark, of Cambridge, Mass. It is three feet four inches in diameter. It was cast in Paris, and is the one success out of dozens of failures. It has been sent to Mr. Clark to be ground by him and made into a lens to go into a telescope to be mounted in the Sierra Madre mountains in South-ern California. If the lens is successfully ground, and the telescope it is to make is successfully mounted, it is expected that much more will be seen sky ward than any telescope has hitherto re-vealed. Even the Lick instrument, with its 36-inch lens, will be beaten, if the new one realizes its projectors' hopes. It is even possible that it may reveal whether other spheres than earth are inhabited, but as to the kind of their inhabitants, or the monuments of their labor, even a 40-inch lens will scarcely be powerful enough to reveal anything. The genius has yet to arise who willinventan instrument that will solve these problems, most interesting though they are. Big telescopes are costly. Mr. Spence, of Los Angeles, has contributed \$70,000 toward the cost of this new one, and \$20,000 for the same object comes from Mr. Freeman, a rich California ranchman
