The fact that orders for disinfectants and medicine have been received by German firms, which the trade is unable to meet, adds to the alarm in Russian official circles. One firm alone has received an order for 60,000 kilogrammes of carbolic acid from the Czar's physicians in ordinary, but they have been already exhausted from other parts of Russia.

Dr. Cream Committed.

London, July 18.—Thomas Neil, alias Dr. Cream, was arraigned before Sir John Bridge in the Bow Street Police Court today on the charge of having murdered Matilda Clover by administering strychnine to her. The court room was crowded and a number of extra policemen were on duty. Neill looked well and his face betrayed no trace of anxiety or trouble. He asked to be furnished with writing materials, and when they were given him he made copicus notes of the proceedings. C. F. Gill appeared against the prisoner on behalf of the Troasury. He said he would prove thecircumstances under which Matilda Clover was murdered, and he asked that the prisoner be committed. Mr. Gill added that he would have to refer to the deaths of three other girls who were killed in a manner precisely similar to the Clover girl. The court granted Mr. Gill's request, and the prisoner was remanded.

It now appears that the man Patterson who was thought to have been in the wreck has turned up all right and was not on the train at all. The water was drawn off the mill-race sufficiently to ascertain that no bodies were under the cars that were thrown there. Peter Welch, of Port Dalhousie, who sustained severe injuries, died at the hospital this morning, thus making four deaths in all. The names of the dead are: Sayers Chapman, of Port Dalhousie, engineer of Boyle's train; David Hunt, baggageman on the boat train; A. Vanslyke, of Buffalo, passenger on the boat train, and Peter Welch, brakeman on Boyle's train, Port Dalhousie (who died this morning). The injured are progressing favorably. The two newsboys, Wolfe and Clarke, of London, are at the hospital. Conductor Boyle has been removed to his home at Port Colborne. W. Spratt, fireman on Boyle's train, whose foot was badly crushed, had it amputated yesterday. The injuries of the rest are not as serious as at first reported. The inquest will be resumed at Merritton this afternoon.



The dreadful catastrophe, by means of which probably over 12,000 human lives were destroyed, has not awakened much interest, as the island was inhabited by interest, as the island was inhabited by Malay Indians, who have little intercourse with civilized nations.

If there is a Liberal convention it is to

be hoped that its time will be devoted to the transaction of business. There is no occasion for banquets, for long-drawn-out periods of eating and drinking, that merely afford time to a few men to talk and talk and say but little that is important or perand say out little that is important or per-tinent to the convention. A business con-vention, made up of earnest, thoroughly representative men, devoting their time to business first and pleasure afterwards, is what is required.

Professor David P. Todd, of Amherst College, will describe in the August Century an ascent of Fuji-san, the sacred mountain of Japan.
