A Field Day in the House of Commons.

Clarke Wallace's Fire-Eating Utterances Create a Scene.

Supporters of the Government Repudiate Their Colleague's Statements,

And Disregard the Crack of the Party Whip.

Finance Minister Foster Vainly Attempts to Quell the Storm.

"Faithful" Accuse Each Other of Falschood-Davin Compares Wallaco to a "Dirty Little Worm"-Dawton's Amendment Consuring Wallace Defeated-Twelvo Conservatives Voted Against the Cov. ernment.

OTTAWA, March 21. - The liveliest sitting of this Parliament was held to-day, when a faction fight, commingled with a Government divided against itself, furnished the spiciest reading of the session. Mr. Clarke Wallace's speech at Kingston was the subject of the entire day's discussion.

On the motion to go into supply Mr.

Casey rose and read from the report of the speech made by the Controller of Customs speech made by the Controller of Customs at Kingston a week ago Friday as follows: "We find to-day in the old country that brethren, the descendants of the heroes of 200 years ago, are perhaps facing difficulties of a similar character to those which their ancestors had to face in 1688—that the men of 1893 are threatened with a rule which is accountry to the control of the country that the men of 1893 are threatened with a rule which is accountry to freedom, there, to men of 1893 are threatened with a rule which is antagonistic to freedom there, to the liberty which they have always enjoyed as citizens of the British Empire. What is proposed is not only to shake off their allegiance to Great Britain—the bonds of love that bind them to the Empire—but to put them, forecoth, under an alien and hostile government. We have their (the Home Rulers') public declarations of what they would do if they obtained power—that they would never cease agitating until the last link that bound Ireland to the British Empire is severed. That is their the last link that bound Ireland to the British Empire is severed. That is their object to-day. They are trying to take the loyal men with them, but our Iriends over there say they will never submit. Britain may cast them out, but if she does so she has no right to say what may be their nay cast them out, but if she does so she has no right to say what may be their future allegiance. Our friends in that land are proparing and have asserted their un alterable determination never to submit to that home rule which Mr. Gladstone and his Government have laid out for them. I am sure that in their efforts they will have the sympathy of the Orangemen of Canada—more than sympathy, they will have our active aid, if that active aid be necessary. We should not be worthy descendants of the herces of 200 years ago, we would not be worthy of our ancestors of old, if we failed in our duty in that respect. I believe we are not unworthy descendants of the men who, driven from Dublin; stood at the men who, driven from Dublin, stood at bay at Enniskillen and at Derry."

back a single word. The record of Orangemen was one of unimpeachable loyalty. All who were lovers of free institutions should be prepared to submit to the rule of the majority, and in the United Kingdom rule, in obedience to which Mr. Gladstone had introduced his bill. If it passed and became law it would be the passed and and introduced his bill. It it massed and became law it would be by the sanction of her Majesty supported by the Parliament of Great Britain. Was it, therefore, a proper thing to say that if the bill became law her Majesty would have up right to say what should be the future allegiance of the men of Ulster? He believed the principles of the Orange order had been cutraged by Mr. Wallace's speech. There was nothing in the Orange constitution which contemplated rebellion against her Majesty and her authority. Mr. Dawson concluded by moving an amendment as

Clarke Wallace in expressing sympathy with and holdingfout the hope of active aid to those who threaten to levy war in Ireland against her Majesty is deserving of the severest censure at the hands of this House, and if allowed to pass unnoticed would expose Canada to the slanderous imputation of being disloyal to her Majesty, the very reverse of which is the case.

"And further it is the duty of this House promptly to repudiate said utterances of said N. Clarke Wallace, lest his political connections with Parliament and the Government, might lead the public to the erroneous conclusion that his views so expressed were shared in by this body, a conclusion which would give additional influence to such utterances, and the more endanger peace and good government throughout her Majesty's dominions."

They did not complain of Mr. Wallace's British politics. They did not complain of the action of the Controller of Customs, in saying what Canada would do in threatening that Canadians would cross the water and take up arms against her Majestv and against the constitution. If Mr. Wallace crossed over to fight the Queen in her old age he would go alone. (Cheers.) "The honorable gentleman." exclaimed Mr. Devlin, "calls himself loyal." "A rebel," interjected Dr. Landerkin. "To be loyal," continued Mr. Devlin, "one must be loyal to the constitution." (Hear, hear.) The utterances of the Controller of Customs were calculated, in Mr. Devlin's opinion, to keep Irish Catholies from going with any confidence to the Department of Customs.

Mr. Kenny (Conservative member for Halifax) characterized Mr. Wallace's con duct as injudicious and unconstitutional. He entirely disapproved of it, but as the amendment was a motion of want of confidence in the Government he could not vote

Mr. Mills pointed out that many motions in amendment to supply had been adopted by the House and not viewed as motions of want of confidence. He charged Mr. Wallace with violating his oath of commission by threatening to take up arms against the imperial authority.

Mr. Foster began by suspecting the motives of the gentlemen supporting the amendment. It was a mischievous party amendment. It was a missine party motion for the purpose of embarrassing the Government. He charged Mr. Mills with unfairly stating that the Controller of Customs was prepared to take up arms against home rule. He did not threaten armed resistance. The Minister of Finance declared that Mr. Wallace in that speed did not bind the Government, nor were they responsible for it. One of the leaders of a great party in this country had threatened to shoulder his musket and fightagainst the volunteers of Canada, yet no one considered it a subject for a resolution in the House. Mr. Wallace had on this occasion spoken in his private capacity, and probably meant by extending active aid simply taking up subscriptions to aid the Ulster party in its warfare on home rule. He hoped the resolution would be withdrawn.

THE TELAUTOGRAPH.

Success of the Machine That Transmits Handwriting by Telegraph.

Handwriting by Telegraph.

Chicago, Ill., March 21.—A number of newspaper men and invited guests witnessed an exhibition of Prof. Elisha Gray's telautograph this afternoon. The telautograph enables one to transmit instantaneously by wire a fac-simile of his handwriting to a distance. An ordinary pen or pencil is employed. As it moves, a pen at the other end of the line moves simultaneously and forms the words and letters in precisely the same way. Whatever is written at one end of this line is reproduced in fac-simile at the other end. The tests this afternoon were entirely satisfactory. Musical notation and stenographic characters afternoon were entirely satisfactory. Musi-cal notation and stenographic characters were transmitted with equal fidelity. The tests were made through artificial resist-ances, representing many hundred miles of wire. It is expected that the telautograph will be generally used as an adjunct to the telephone and for business purposes gener-ally where private wires are employed.

REBELLION INDORSED.

Not for many years has a member of the Dominion Government found himself in so unenviable a plight as did Mr. Clarke

Wallace, Controller of Customs, last night. The Minister was charged with having, at a public meeting in Kingston, declared that if the measure for granting local selfgovernment in Ireland passed the Imperial Parliament, he and his associates would aid their friends to forcibly resist its operation.

Now, if the bill to grant Ireland a far nore restricted measure of self-government than we in Canada possess ever becomes law, it must be indorsed by Parliament and law, it must be indersed by Fariament and signed by Queen Victoria. Any threats of rebellion, then, by whomsoever uttered, must be absolutely disloyal, and tend to the fomenting of civil war, with all its dreadful

Mr. Wallace, while ordinarily posing at a loyal subject, bent on upholding the dignity of the Queen and Crown and obeying the decrees of her Majesty, expressed him-self ready to aid in rebellion against this constituted authority the moment a measure distasteful to him is put on the statute book.

At first it was thought that Mr. Wallace attered the reprehensible threats in the heat of partisan animosity, but as he ad-hered to his statement in the House of Commons, it was a proper thing for Parliament to repudiate the views of a man who had so far forgotten his oath of office as a Minister of the Crown, to say nothing of nis duty as a professedly loyal citizen.

Mr. Foster, however, came to the rescue of the belligerent Minister, and to the astonishment of the House demanded that the motion denouncing the proposed appeal to armed resistance against constitutional authority should be regarded as a vote of want of confidence in the Ministry! This attitude on the part of the leader of the Liberal members, but of a number of independent Conservatives as well; and in the subsequent discussion some remarkable secrets were laid bare. One was exposed by Mr. Davin, Conservative M. P. for Assinibois, who not only asserted that he had no confidence in this man "who was given to him as leader," but went behind th sufficiently far to reveal Mr. Wallace's character as a parliamentary sycophant. He told the House that Mr. Wallace, while voting against the Jesuit Estates Bill with the "noble thirteen," had urged his brother Orangemen to vote the other way. "I heard him address his fellow-Protestant men bers," said Mr. Davin, when the Minister Christian Union, are not in a position to be as outspoken as the laity. There ought to be at least a federal union, right off, for large common purposes; with denominational home rule, if party! Mr. Davin's characterization of Mr. Wallace as "a dirty little worm, who, commencing at the bottom of the tree, commencing at the bottom of the tree, crawled to the top, yet remained a little worm still," was one of the most stinging remarks ever applied to a member in the House of Commons. Mr. Wallace has himself to blame for this severe comment, for he has forced the Government to take him into a position which he fills neither with credit to himself nor the people of Canada. But what shall be said of the loyalty of a man and of a Government prepared to enourage the taking up of arms against constituted authority the moment a minority finds it cannot have its own way? That is the attitude assumed by Mr. Clarke Wal-

lace, indorsed by Mr. Foster and by all but wo members of the Cabinet. If there is bloodshed in Ireland over the stablishment of local self-government, the Canadian Government will have to share the responsibility.





THE POLICY OF A PARTY.

[Toronto Mail.]

What is the history of the Conservatives in relation to the tariff? Our highest tariff prior to Confederation levied a duty of 20 per cent. When Sir Alexander Galt became per cent. When Sir Alexander Galt became Finance Minister he dropped it to 15, with a view, as he explained, to the promotion and improvement of our trade with the mother country. Here was a reduction made by the Conservatives in 1886 on the very principle and for the very principle and for the very purpose mentioned in one clause of Mr. McCarthy's motion. In 1870 Sir Francis Hincks levied the agricultural duties, but in 1871 these imports by a Conservative vote were withdrawn. Later on there came a demand for higher tariff. Mr. Thomas White, then a prominent member of the party, asserted drawn. Later on there came a demand for higher tariff. Mr. Thomas White, then a prominent member of the party, asserted that the 15 per cent. tariff "ought to be sufficient for any industry suited to the sufficient for any industry suited to the country; and as to others it would be unwise to attempt to sustain them by fiscal props." So far, then, the prophets were not in favor of so high rates. When, in 1876, a move was made towards protection it was of a cautious character. Mr. Haggart assured the country that there would only be a readjustment of the tarift, and Mr. Colby declared most emphatically that under the tariff which he favored rings could not possibly be formed. "It is," said he, "impossible to get up monopolies in such manufactures as boots and shoes furniture and agricultural implements." As an earnest of his antagonism to combinations, he moved against the coal oil duties, on the ground that a monopoly had been favored every Conservative member voted with him excepting Mr. Bowell, who if infavor of combinations now can certainly boast that although wrong, he remains consistent. Sir John Macdonald, who never was a great lover of tariffs, justified his demand for protection by an appeal to John Stuart Mill, who had said that in new countries it might be desirable for a limited

time to afford assistance to rising industries that could ultimately flourish there without State help. The entire tenor of the argument, therefore, was that the policy when adopted should be moderate; that it should not provoke combines, to which the party, Mr. Bowell excepted, was opposed, and that it should do its work, not in 500 years, but in a very brief period. Everybody knows that the original scheme has been departed from. The iron schedule was a tremendous step beyond the National Policy idea.

You are a very fortunate young man in escaping so lightly. Still, if you don't reform in five years, no term of imprisonment will cause you to do so."

Julius Scott, a Slave to Drink, is Touched Prayer and Resolves to Become a Better Man—A Brilliant Carcer Wrecked by Dissipation.

Career Wreeked by Dissipation.

The other night, just as the weekly prayer meeting in a Richmond street church was about to conclude, the door slowly opened and a man paused on the threshold. He was well dressed, and though the signs of dissipation and illness were stamped on his face and form, there was in his manner and appearance something which suggested a native gentility—a finer nature not wholly faded. The paster asked him to step in, and encouraged by the kindly tone of the words of welcome the stranger advanced and took a seat. It was evident by his unsteady gait that he had been drinking.

The congregation was dismissed, and the visitor was invited to an aftergathering in the Sunday school room. He accepted, and in a broken voice asked if he might be allowed to speak. "If there is anyone here who has had trouble, that is the one I want to talk to," he said, as the tears welled to his eyes. "Christ said that 'even as ye do it unto the least of these ye do it unto me! If ever I am saved it will be through God speaking to my heart." The poor fellow broke down completely. Getting down on his

speaking tomy heart." The poor fellow broke down completely. Getting down on his knees he asked the prayers of the pastor, whose hand he took and kissed and bathed

knees he asked the prayers of the pastor, whose hand he took and kissed and bathed with tears.

As afterwards related by himself, his career was a sad lesson on the evils of intemperance. Julius Scott—such is the stranger's name—has been one of the foremost actors on the American stage, and is known from the Atlantic to the Pacific. His father was a Presbyterian minister, and in early life Julius was left a fortune of \$25,000. He joined the theatrical profession, and in the gay whirl of a fast life his money soon melted away. He had great natural ability, however, which insured him success if he chose to be true to himself. Unfortunately he became a slave to drink. In vain he tried to throw off the chains of his captivity: but he had been forging them too long. He grew from bad to worse. For nine years Scott had been the leading man and most capable supporter of Thomas W. Keene, the eminent tragedian. During this season Scott had been on an almost continuous debaunch, but because of long association and personal friendship and admiration Keene was loth to part with his trusty licutenant, who generally managed to sober up for each night's performance. When Keene visited London and admiration Keene was leth to part with his trusty licutenant, who generally managed to sober up for each night's performance. When Keene visited London recently Scott was so drunk that he was unable to appear in his usual role of the Duke of Buckingham in "Richard III" and he was discharged. He remained in the city and continued his spree until his constitution could stand the abuse no longer. He became seriously ill and was removed to St. Joseph's Hospital, where for several weeks he lay in a critical condition. Kind friends attended to his temporal wants and money was sent him by wealthy relatives. By tender care and nursing he was restored to something like health, though but the shadow of what once he had been. He was warned that a return to his old habits would prove fatal to his shattered body. He struggled hard to overcome the terrible appetite which had been his curse, but it regained its mastery over him, and one night while under its influence he strayed into St. James' Church. Perhaps it marked the turning point of his lite. It so affected

him that he then and there pledged himself to lead a new life. To a few who pleaded with him afterwards he opened his heart. He had been happily married and was adored by his wife and two children, from whom he had concealed the knowledge of his con-dition. His wife is a professional, at he had concealed the knowledge of his condition. His wife is a professional, at present playing with "The County Fair." His children are with his sister in Satina, Kan. He showed letters from the latter filled with loving words of advice and Christian counsel. "With God's help I will be a better man," said the actor. "I will go to a place where the oursed stuff will not be in my way." He refrained from touching the glass by a supreme efforts, and receiving a ticket left a few days since for the prohibition State. He vowed with all earnestness that he would strive to regain his manhood He vowed with all earnestness that he would strive to regain his manhood once more.
