
## GOVT. SUBSIDY FOR A Big Bunch of Ballots for Electors in January

Bill to Aid Establish Plants Six Bylaws To Be Voted On—Mayor Judd to Run for The Town of Clifton, Arizona, Second Term-Mr. Screaton to Retire From the Hospital Trust.

> The electors of London certainly have! their work cut out for them on the 7th of January.

In addition to the ballots for mayor, aldermen, school trustees, hospital trustees and water commissioner, the voters will find themselves confronted with no less than six bylaws upon which to pass judgment.

The bylaws are: 1. The expenditure of \$575,000 by

the water commission to extend the waterworks system by the Komoka 2. To give the city council power the Niagara power commission. 3. To give the city council power to issue \$50,000 debentures for the extension of the main trunk sewers

of the city, and also to reconstruct the Dundas street sewer, between Wellington and Adelaide streets. 4. To fix the assessment of the Wortman & Ward Manufacturing Company at \$25,000 for a period of ten years.

5. To fix the assessment of the London Canning and Evaporating Company at \$4,000 for a period of ten years.

6. For establishing public swimming baths in London at a capital cost of \$4,000, and yearly maintenance of \$1,200.

May Confuse Voters

Some fear is expressed that so many bylaws and so many other ballots will confuse the public and that bylaws which certainly should be carried will be defeated.

If there are no elections by acclamation, there will in addition to the bylaws, be at least 30 names before the electors in January, from which they will be compelled to choose a mayor, twelve aldermen, five school trustees, one hospital trustee, and one water commissioner.

Bisbee, Ariz., Dec. 5. - One of the worst floods in the history of Clifton came down the Arizona River, and Chase Creek, Monday night. The principal business section of the town was almost completely ruined. From seven to twenty persons is the report of the loss of life. Mrs. Joseph Throm, with her husband and children, was caught in a falling building and killed. The other members of the family had a narrow escape. One of the saloons which was washed away carried several men into the torrent. They are

believed to have been drowned. A woman and a child were lost in small restaurant, which was dashed

## WORK REDUCED TO EXACT SCIENCE

Productivity of Skilled Mechanics.

New York, Dec. 5. - Frederick W. Taylor, president of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers, at the opening of the annual meeting last productivity of skilled mechanics, and workmen in various lines of industrial activity.

The experiments were undertaken to obtain a part of the information necessary to establish in a machine shop a system of management, the central ideas of which are to give to each workman a definite task, and an exact time allowance for each element of the work, to pay high wages to those who perform their tasks in the alloted time and ordinary wages to those who take more than their time allowance. The experiments of Mr. Taylor and his associates have been conducted in

the works of the Midvale Steel Comvany, the Bethlehem Steel Company, and other large concerns.

The idea was to bring the elements of machine shop practice into the domain of exact science. Their experi-"art," and obtained mathematical formulae, which express these laws. They developed a slide rule, by means of which the ordinary mechanic can double the output of a machine previously run by a first-class mechanic, using




