It was this weakening which gave the German contingents the opportunity at a critical moment to pass forward between a portion of the army on the north and that on the line further south.

Now began the double exposure of the southern force to fire in the front and on the flank, which required a steady falling back until the entire army was in movement toward the newly established positions further newly established positions further west. During this prodigious movement of the main front and the rearguard, which can only be sketched in the broadest outlines, some sections sustained sbocks of exceptional intensity. The commanding height of Monte Nero, which the Italians had occupied after deeds of great valor was defended against onslaughts from three sides, which gradually developed to envelopment.

A Surprise Blow.

Added to this was the suddenness of the surprise blow from the north, which developed into a turning fire before the southern armies, and also on their extreme flank, gradually extending to their rear. Under such circumstances any army would be tried sorely, and it was to extricate the troops from this situation that the retirement began all along the extended advanced position occupied by the retirement began all along the extended advanced position occupied by the Italian army within Austrian territory. This line stretched roughly from Piezzo (Flitzch), in the north, southeastward through Gorizia to Monfalcone on the Adriatic. The second army occupied most of the front above Gorizia. Heaps of Enemy Dead.

The Germans encountered stubborn resistance on the Bainsizza Plateau, and heaps of enemy dead mark the lines of their advances. Around Globp Ridge, a Bersagieri brigade, outnumbered five to one, held back the enemy while the main line had an opportunity to get their retreat in motion.

One of the mountain passes was taken and retaken eight times during the desperate artillery, infantry and hand-to-hand fighting.

Gorizia Shelled.

Gorizia was shelled heavily, and what remained of what the correspondent saw there just a week ago today was fruther reduced to a mass of debris. One of the main bridges from Gorizia across the Isonzo, was blown up by the Italians, and the enemy movement thus was further impeded.



Scorching Arraignment by President Watters of Government and War Profiteers-Sir Joseph Admitted to Stupendous Profits in Shell Industry - Should Conscript Wealth.

Montreal, Nov. 2. — An unmeasured arraignment of the Union
Government was delivered by J. C.
Watters, president of the Dominion
Trades and Labor Congress, addressing the trades and labor council last night. The partiotism of
the Government, said Mr. Watters,

Mr. Watters declared that war had been a source of profit to many employers, while workingmen had spilled their blood at the front with-out hope of personal gain. On the other hand, whenever workingmen at home endeavored to get a slight increase in wages they were branded as unpatriotic





#### **CIRCULATION AT** PUBLIC LIBRARY **GROWS STEADILY**

Last Month's Circulation Was 23,000 Volumes.

A circulation of 23,000 volumes at the Public Library during the past month was reported at the monthly meeting of the board held last night. About 100 delegates are expected and among the speakers will be 4r. W. O. Carson, provincial library inspector for Ontario; Dr. E. A. Hardy, Toronto, secretary of the Ontario Library Association, and Mr. J. D. Barnett of Stratford.

During last winter there were a number of lectures on backyard gardening given in the public library building under the auspices of the London Horticultural Society. 



## The Next Step

HE Proclamation, which issued October 13th, calls for men of Class One to report for service or claim exemption on or before November 10th, 1917. This call includes bachelors and widowers without children (not otherwise excepted) who were 20 years old on the 13th October, 1917, and whose 34th birthday did not occur before January 1st, 1917.

It is pointed out that no man will be called to the colors until about December 10th, by which date it is expected that most, if not all, applications for exemption will have been dealt with. So that, it is obvious no one will gain any advantage by delay in reporting for service or claiming exemption.

## Registered Letter

THE REPORT FOR SERVICE or CLAIM FOR EXEMPTION should be made on the forms obtainable at every Post Office in Canada, and handed back to the Postmaster. who will issue an official receipt and will transmit the form itself to the Registrar.

The man reporting for service, or claiming exemption will thereafter be notified by registered letter regarding what is further required of him.

Men who REPORT FOR SERVICE and on whose behalf no claim for exemption is received, will, if not already medically examined, be ordered to attend at the nearest Medical Board Centre for medical examination, and will be furnished with return transportation and also with subsistence.

EACH APPLICANT FOR EXEMPTION will be notified of the number and address of the tribunal by which the application will be considered and the date upon which it will be taken up, and he may thereupon submit in writing to the tribunal the facts upon which reliance is placed to support the application.

While applicants may await the day named in the notice and appear personally before the tribunal, this course is not recommended and will result in serious inconvenience and delay.

Remember all Reports for Service and Claims for Exemption should be made at once but must be made not later than November 10th, 1917.

HOW TO ADDRESS MAIL TO SOLDIERS

The following correct method of addressing troops has been assued by Dr. R. M. Coulter, deputy postmaster-general. In order to facilitate handling of mail at the front, and to insure brompt delivery, it is requested that all mail be addressed as ollows.

(a) Regimental number.
(b) Rank.
(c) Name.
(d) Squadron, battery or company.
(e) Battalion, regiment (or other unit), staff appointment

or department.

(f) Canadian Contingent.

(g) British Expeditionary Force.

(h) Army Postoffice, London, England.

Unnecessary mention of higher formations, such as brigades, divisions, is strictly forbidden and causes delay.

SENDING PRESENTS BY PARCEL POST

(Cilp This Out for Reference.)

For the information of those sending parcels to soldiers in England or at the front, The Advertiser publishes the rates of postage: To England, the rate is 12 cents a pound or any fraction thereof; limit weight on parcels to England is 11 pounds. To France or Belgium, the rate is 24 cents for parcels any weight up to three pounds; from three pounds to seven pounds (the limit), the rate is 32 cents—not 32 cents per pound. but 32 cents for any weight from three to seven pounds. Any letter or parcel for any soldier in the hospital (even if this hospital is not known to the sender), having the word "hospital" marked across it will be delivered. A customs declaration must be attached to each parcel, for which application should be made at the stamp window of the postoffice.

Mr. McPherson expressed surprise at some of the revelations, and said there was nothing which could not be remedied. He will take the steps necessary to have this done.



REFORMS NAVAL OFFICE

Personnel Will Be Increased and Young Blood Added.

Is poorer and the number of German submarines which do not return is increasing.

"Since April, the highest month for British losses, they have steadily decreased, and latterly to a marked degree. September was the most satisfactory month; October was only slightly worse, and better by 30 per cent than any other month since unrestricted submarine warfare began. The net reduction in tonnage in the last four months is 30 per cent less than anticipated in the estimate prepared for the cabinetearly in July.

"For the present I have come to the conclusion that the submarine warfare is going well for us. The enemy has done less damage than he hoped, and less than we estimated. He has done it with a serious and heavy loss to himself. At present we may be justified in feeling that his attack on our trade is held and is being mastered, and we are justified in looking to the future with courage and determination, confident that he will fall."





## CERENSKY SAYS **ALLIES SHOULD**

Claims Russia Did Her "Bit" By Standing the First Shock.

RUSSIA IS PLAYED OUT

Nation Is Still In the Struggle, But Weakened As a Military Unit.

Petrograd, Thursday, Nov. 1.-Rus ala is worn out by the strain of war, and must have help, Premier Kerensky told the Associated Press today. He said that Russia claims as her right that the other alles now should shoulder the burden which she has berne.

that the other alies now should shoulder the burden which she has been.

Russia, the premier declared, has been fighting eighteen months longer than England, and Russia has fought her battles alone, and is fighting alone.

An Economic Revolution.

The world must not lose faith in the Russian revolution, because it is an economic one. No one, the premier added, has the right to feel dislilusioned about it because it takes years to develop a stable government.

America's most useful way of helping Russia is in sending boots, leather, iron and money. Premier Kerensky said it would be impossible for the United States to send troops because the difficulties of transport would be too great. Russia is not out of the war. Premier Kerensky said in answer to reports to the contrary.

Says Saved Allies.

"Russia has fought consistently since the beginning. She saved France and England from disaster early in the war. She is now worn out by the strain and claims as her right that the allies now shoulder the burden."

Thus Premier Kerensky explained Russia's position to the correspondent. The premier was seated in the library of the former private office of the emperor in the Winter Palace. The correspondent called attention to widely contradictory reports on Russian conditions, and asked the premier for a frank statement of the facts.

Still in the Win.

"It has been said by travelers returning from England and elsewhere to America that onlinion among the people not officially but generally, is that Russia out of the war?" Premier Kerensky laughed. "That," he answerded, "is a ridiculous question. Russia is taking an enormous part in the war One has only to remember history Russia began the war for the allies. While she was already fighting England was only preparing, and America was only observing.





DELIVER GROCERIES "A LA JANE."

It is just as we suspected, cheery, breezy, original Jane Wiggins has been up to the eyes in "stone-ageing," and that is the reason we haven't been hearing from her. But back she has come again in answer to a challenge, bringing along with her a wonderful idea of systematizing delivering of merchandise, and thus saving money and overlapping. Jane is nothing if not efficient, and what is more, she never offers a criticism without having an improvement to suggest. Jane has two plans for revolutionizing the delivery wagon system, She

Dear Miss Armstrong,-How charming of you! Your challenge summoned me, not from the vasty depths of Death, but from the cellar, where I was canning cannily in Canadian cannisters. This is certainly the stone age—it is so hard!! (to get through!) And then, ask for a peach and receive a stone. Do you crack the stones of peaches and put the kernels in your jam? It's very good that way— But!—

words. This is what Mrs. Wiggins has to say this week:

I saw some imaginative lady advising folks through the press the other day to take the skins off squash and pumpkin seeds, and use the inside as a substitute for nuts. That lady must have lived in a clock factory, where they make time. Nuts cost from 40c to 90c a pound. And any woman in the world (who has the use of her limbs), can make \$1.25 (and upwards) per day. By the time one had shelled enough squash seeds to equal a pound of shelled nuts—I wouldn't do it "not for nuts." Why doesn't someone censor these absurdities or put them on the Sporting Page? The world is almost as short of labor as of food. And we women, who are asked to double our daily output, should be as careful of our time as of our money, and not spend it uselessly-

Which brings me to the subject of saving money by being your own delivery boy. There's a butcher in town who advertises a reduction of 8 cents per pound on all meat that the buyer carries home. Mr. Finn, district representative of the department of agriculture, tells us that if we bought our potatoes, etc., direct from the farmers, and did our own delivery, we should get things at almost half price. I beg to differ.

If you go to a farmer five miles from town and buy from him there (instead of at the market), I am afraid you will be charged market prices. Perhaps you may get your things for a little less. But how are you going to get them? You really can't walk five miles out, and carry home a sack of potatoes on your back! Motor? You will certainly use more than the difference of cost in gasoline. If you just pick up these things on your pleasure trips through the country, well and good. But the people who do motoring for pleasure at present are not the people most vitally interested in getting the lowest possible price on potatoes.

Now suppose I want two pounds of beefsteak, and take the car down town to get it. I save six cents on the meat and spend nine cents on carfare, and it will take me one hour of time at least. If I walk it will take me twice as long. If I can take these things "in my stride" as it were, well and good. But I haven't time to go to town more than twice week, and I could not carry home all I need for a family of six, on those two trips.

I have two suggestions to make: 1. Why shouldn't the house order early in the morning, have the parcels neatly packed, and let the house-father call for them on his way home from shop or office? The vomen are not afraid or ashamed to turn in (or out) to help the men these days. Let us have reciprocity!

2. Why not a co-operative delivery system? All telephone orders given before 11 a.m., will be delivered that afternoon. All given later will be delivered next morning. If this were an iron rule, everybody would fall in with it, as naturally as people do who spend the summer on an island—they think ahead and plan accordingly. And townspeople could still run out to "the little shop 'round the corner" for the things they forget. At 1 o'clock the co-operative delivery carts would call at the grocers for those afternoon delivery orders. Everything for London East, West, North, or South, etc., would be routed out together—A. & Co (on Dundas, between Richmond and Park avenue), would not go out to the exhibition grounds with a pound of butter for Mrs. B., while C. & Co. (next door to A. & Co.), were delivering 25 cents worth of sugar to Mrs. D. (who lives opposite to Mrs. B.)

Surely one-third of the men and money now used in operating de-liveries might be saved in this simple manner. In the early, pearly morning all the orders of the previous afternoon would start out to their

I planned this system my very own self, and will be pleased to work It out in detail for the city-or any co-operative company that likes to take it-I have actually drafted most of the particulars. But yesterday I saw that "my" scheme was already in working order out West. I inclose an account of it, which may interest you.

#### SOARING "ON GENERAL PRINCIPLES."

A subject which will probably receive the attention of the local food conservation committee in the near future is the unjustifiable advance in cost of certain commodities. While a logical reason can be found on investigation for good many of the advances, others seem to come about without rhyme or reason, and solely owing to a peculiar sensitiveness to discord developed by present conditions. When a certain number of articles have gone plunging upwards in cost there seems to be an impression that it is necessary to send all the rest sky-larking after them for fear of destroying the harmony of the advanced scale of making people pay for things. Quite often a few questions reveal the fact to the startled housewife that there is perfectly good reason why, say a broom, should cost her a third as much again as it did awhile ago. But there are other times when the ways of merchandizing are past finding out.

Not so very long ago rumors were heard that there was to be an immediate advance in the price of tea. The editor of this department asked reliable grocers, grocers of known integrity, who one and all stated they had heard there was going to be an advance. On top of that statement a man thoroughly in touch with the tea situation told the self-same Consumers' League editor on not one, but two, separate occasions on two different days that there could be no reason. but two, separate occasions on two different days, that there could be no reason for advance in the price of tea until the end of this year, excepting on the ground that the merchants cannot replace their present stock at the price they paid for it. There has been an advance at the shipping points in India, Ceylon, and so on, but these shipments will not reach Canada until well on to the spring. In the meantime Canada has as large a stock of tea at the former advanced prices as it has ever had at this time of the year. The edvance in price will consequently not be due to the fact that it cost the dealer any more. Lo, the

Apropos this subject of what may be termed, "unjustifiable advance," reader has sent in the following complaint:

"Why should I and a lot more people like me be called upon to pay new leather prices on old leather boots? I have seen identically the same boots take a big jump in price within a week. Do you call this justifiable advance? In the case to which I refer it was exactly the same stock boots. I am hard to fit, but that pair fitted me exactly. I was getting something else at the time, and the boots were shown to me. I didn't really need them just then, so I decided not to take them. Thinking it over after I went home I came to the conclusion it would be hard to get so well fitted again, and that I had better get them and have them ready. When I went back I was told they had been advanced in price \$1. I asked why, and the answer was that all leather goods in price \$1. I asked why, and the answer was that all leather goods

In view of the imperative need of leather for boots for the fighting men, perhaps there may be something in the excuse that while the goods didn't cost any more they cannot be replaced at the same price. The higher prices have a tendency to make people of moderate incomes take better care of their boots. Still this doesn't reconcile the consumer for advances in goods "on general principles."

#### SHUN THAT CUP.

A prominent Women's Institute worker of this district commented a few days ago on the way the honor roll of "hygienic sinners" is lengthening out, as added to week by week in this page. She had one of her own to tell about as follows: "Sometime ago I was at the C. P. R. station waiting for a train when my attention was attracted to a beautifully dressed and refined looking woman and her winsome little daughter. The little girl wanted a drink, so the mother led her to the tap, where a most repulsive-looking man was drinking from the cup. Immediately after the mother picked up this cup, rinsed it out slightly with the cold water, then gave a drink to the babe from it and took one herself. It amazed me to think that a woman who evidently enjoyed the opportunities the appearance of that one would indicate should do such a stupid thing. Individual drinking cups cost so little and take up so little room it is surprising a woman traveling with a child would go away without one. A cup can be easily made from a clean piece of paper, and thrown away immediately after using. If a cup takes too much room a few sheets of note paper might be carried for this purpose."
