### **ALLIES TO SEND EMPHATIC NOTE** TO RUMANIA

Evasive and Unsatisfactory Reply From Bucharest Displeases All.

MUST LEAVE HUNGARY

Sir George Clerk Reports the Hungarian Political Situation Much Improved.

Parls. Nov. 13.-The supreme council to escape the crowd. today discussed the note to be sent to Rumania in response to Rumania's recent note. The allied reply, it is forecasted, will be very firm in tone, the Rumanian note being regarded as evasive and unsatisfactory-notably so as concerned the demand for evacuation of Hungary by the Rumanians. The allied note was not completed today, but it will be put into shape very shortly, and forwarded to Rucharest within two days.

The report received from Sir George llerk, the allfed commissioner to Buda-Clerk, the allied commissioner to Budapest, was considered as showing that political conditions in Hungary were much improved, and that there were indications of a coalition government being organized shortly in Budapest with which the conference would deal. Another subject taken up by the council was the elections recently held in Silesia. A note to Germany was framed, advising it to disregard these elections. ### **VALUATION OF STREET** RAILWAY WILL BE SECURED BY COUNCIL

Hydro Power Commission Asked to Commence Valuation Immediately.

NO COST TO LONDON

Railway Committee Apponted by Council Discharged by No. 1 Committee.

Valuation of the London Street Railway Company will be commenced Monday by the hydro-electric power commission. Following a meeting of No. 1 committee of the city council last night, Mayor Somerville wired the com-mission to make preparations for the work immediately. This action must be confirmed by the







WASHINGTON AND THE COAL MINERS. The decision of the heads of the coal miners' unions to call off the strike, as ordered by the United States Government, should not be interpreted as a victory for the operators. or as a defeat for the miners. 





The prince also was enrolled formally as a member of the American Red Cross during the day, paying a dollar for the honor during his visit to Red Cross headquarters. The badge of membership was pinned on his breast by Mrs. Farrand, wife of Dr. Livingston Farrand, chairman of the Red Cross central committee.

Canada's war measures act declares that a state of war started in 1914 "and shall be deemed to exist until such time as the governor-general in council shall, by proclamation in the Canada Gazette, declare is to be at an end."

The act does not specify the nations with which Canada is at war, but, technically, it is held that a state of war would be deemed to exist until such time as peace was proclaimed with all the enemy nations, since Canada has undertaken to be a signatory to be a signatory of the state ada has undertaken to be a signatory of all the treaties made herewith. It is not exactly clear however, why Canada, for purposes of her own, should continue to adhere to her war measures act and restrictions until such time as Bulgaria, Turkey and the Far East have simmered down to peaceful pursuits. The telegram was in response to a request for a ruling made by the board, which set forth that it was receiving numerous applications for the importation of white sugars from countries like Brazil, the lowest prices being 14c and tion of white sugars from countries like Brazil, the lowest prices being 14c and 15c a pound, duty paid. The maximum price that American refiners are allowed to charge for sugar purchased from the board is 9c a pound.

Imported sugar, the board explained, was readily saleable to manufacturers in order to keep their plants going and

It was not so much a matter of price, it said, as the disbanding of their working forces, which would necessitate their closing their plants.
