## Canadian Shipping Has Increased by 5,000,000 Tons in Year

OTTAWA, Jan. 5.-Exclusive of ships engaged in the coastwise trade, but inclusive of those engaged in traffic on in-land waters, the total tonnage of ships entering and leaving Canadian ports during the fiscal year ending March 31, 1921, was 54,-648,650 tons, as compared with 49,493,533 during the previous year, according to the statement on navigation and shipping just issued by the department of cusssued by the department of customs and excise. During 1921 the total tonnage engaged in the coastwise trade entering and leaving Canadian ports was 56,-225,509 tons as against 60,552,653 tons in 1920.

During the 1921 periods tons of shipping constructed in Canada amounted to 95,838, while 188,915 tons of shipping was registered in Canadian ports. During the 1920 period 164,076 tons of shipping was built and 237,022 tons regis tered.

During 1921, 34.623 tons ping, with a value of \$8,456,573, was sold to other countries. In 1920 the tonnage sold to other countries was 53,407. The value

Dublin, Jan. 5.—The astonishment roduced in the Dail Eireann by Eamon De Valera's sudden production of his alternative proposals to the peace treaty and his announced determination to move them as an amendment to the treaty at today's session, has turned into anxiety over probable effect of this move on further proceedings in the Dail. Mr. De Valera's right to move his proposals as an amendment has been challenged and it is possible that a critical division today may occur on the motion to enable him to carry out his plan. His opponents declare he must reserve his alternative proposal until the Dail has given a direct vote

on the treaty.

Supporters of ratification express themselves as deeply chagrined at the turn affairs have taken. Some see in De Valera's action an attempt to rally he extreme Republicans to his side. while other profess to regard it as the last desperate effort of a leader wh sees his power slipping from his grasp.
