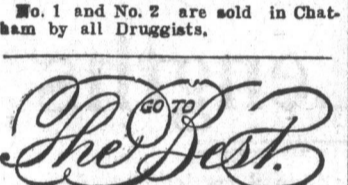

ADMIRAL WITHOFT BLOWN TO PIECES BY JAP SHELL

Other Officers and Many Men Killed on the Flagship Czarevitch, which is Severely Damaged and the Rudder Smashed Beyond Repair

(Special to The Planet.)
St. Petersburg, Aug. 13.—1 p. m.—Rear Admiral Witthoft, who was in command of the Russian naval forces at Port Arthur, was killed during the engagement Wednesday.

The emperor has received a telegram from Tsingchow signed by Capt. Matousevitch, the rear admiral's chief of staff, reporting that Witthoft met his death aboard the flagship Czarevitch. Both his legs were blown off.

Capt. Wamoff, of the Czarevitch, Commander Samoff, and several officers, besides the rear admiral were killed.

The battleship's rudder was damaged. Her rudder was broken beyond hope of repair.

Capt. Matousevitch did not report as to the whereabouts of the other vessels, but the dispatch adds that the protected cruiser Novik has left Tsingchow.

Tokio, Aug. 13.—11 a. m.—Admiral Togo reports that five Russian battleships appear to have been heavily damaged in the engagement of Aug. 10. The Pobeda lost two masts and one of her heavy guns was disabled. The Retsizan, which was hit several times at a distance of 3,500 yards, seems to have sustained the greatest injury. The damage inflicted on the Russian cruisers was comparatively slight. The Bayan has not appeared since the engagement.

The damage sustained by the Japanese vessels has been temporarily repaired.

London, Aug. 13.—A despatch to a newspaper from Tokio to-day says: "Another sign that a general assault on Port Arthur is imminent is found in the fact that the emperor of Japan has not fed Field Marshal Yamagata, chief of the general staff, of his desire that non-combatants be allowed an opportunity to leave the fortress. The chief of staff consequently instructed the Japanese commander at Port Dalay to accord the necessary facilities for their removal.

Further details of the naval engagement of August 10, indicate that Admiral Togo's main attack was directed against the Russian battleships and that this was going on the speedier Russian cruisers succeeded in getting away.

According to another despatch from Tokio, the Russian torpedo boat destroyer Ryeshitani, which was captured by the Japanese at Che Foo, is being taken to a Chinese port.

A despatch from St. Petersburg to a news agency says the machinery of the Russian battleship Czarevitch was so knocked about during the fight that most of it was worthless. She lost 210 officers and men killed, and had 60 wounded. Rear Admiral Witthoft was on the bridge of the Czarevitch when a shell exploded there blowing him to pieces.

Then followed a very handsome presentation to the Rev. Mother and Sister from all those whose privilege it was to have spent some days at St. Ursulas of "The Pines."

OUR INVESTIGATORS ABROAD.

Ontario Railway Commissioners Have Reached the Quaker City.

Philadelphia, Aug. 13.—How to equalize taxes on railroads is the question which the Commission of the Ontario Government has been investigating in this country for a month, spending yesterday in Philadelphia. H. J. Pettypiece, chairman of the Commission, stated that Canada was getting no taxes at all out of a great deal of railroad property. Their tax was simply based on the same value as the land through which the roads run.

They have been interviewing railroad commissioners in nearly all the United States and find many systems. Michigan taxes on the whole value of the railroad property. Connecticut takes one per cent. of the capital; Minnesota takes three per cent. of gross earnings; Pennsylvania combines three systems, but the average of all the States amounts to \$154 a mile on 200,000 miles of railroad. In Canada it is about \$50. In Massachusetts it is \$1,100 a mile.

The Commissioners are meeting railroad tax experts as well as state officials wherever they go. They will next go to Baltimore, then to Washington, to Albany and home. The scope of their investigation takes in telegraph, telephone, express and like business.

These letters had the effect of sending us a few more young men for our Shorthand Department last session than we usually have, but still the number that acted on our suggestion was so far short of the number required, that with your kind permission, I shall again bring the matter before your readers by giving a few facts regarding last year's students.

than ever, and so urgent were many of these calls, that many young men were sent out to fill vacancies, who were still far short of the graduating point.

When I say, that, for the reason just mentioned, we were not able to hold a single male student for graduation during the whole year, it will give you a further idea of how strong the demand is.

The last four positions we have just filled were worth \$700, and the position filled previous to these four was worth \$600 per annum, and not one of these filled by a city young man.

The outsiders are securing the plums. The city young men seem to prefer some course of training that they can get for nothing, or nearly so, and spend three or four years in the getting of it, and then perhaps not be able to command more than \$5 or \$6 per week when they get through. Why they follow such a course, is more than I can tell; yet they do it. It is certainly a "penny wise and a pound foolish" policy, but they must be the judges.
