SEEING THE BRIGHT SIDE.

That there can be a bright side to even the worst events is what the Detroit News seems to believe for it points out that there are some compensations even "in connection with the destructive gales that have ravaged the great lakes during the past week, causing great loss of life, destroying vessels valued at millions of dollars, seriously damaging others and doing heavy damage to docks and shore works." The News says: "The account is not, after all, without its credit items. They may seem paltry beside the heavy entries on the other side of the ledger, but they are by no means to be ignored in any serious effort to fairly balance the book of fate. That the great bulk of this tonnage will be replaced at the earliest possible moment is certain, and herein lie such compensations as it is given to us to see. It means that the lake shipyards will be immediately called upon to provide berths for from a dozen to a score more new boats than were in contemplation before the recent disasters. What that increase in business represents in the way of additional labor in the yards which furnish material it is not easy for those unfamiliar with the business to imagine. Of the loss of life and the suffering occasioned it can only be said that they have furnished occasion for splendid and inspiring exhibitions of heroism, determination and fortitude such as a busy and self-conscious age is too apt to attribute only to past ages. There is some gain, perhaps, in being reminded that our complex civilization is not eliminating the more primitive virtues of the race."

OIL BOOM AT TILBURY

Tilbury, Dec. 6.—Oil has been found on the Kerr farm in Tilbury East, and already there has been a rush to secure leases on this and adjacent property. It looks just now as if the oil boom of a few years ago were going to be repeated, but those who "went in the hole" then cannot see it that way.

The many friends of Public School Trustee Wm. H. Benson, who is relinquishing his duties at the School Board at the end of this year, are urging him to offer himself for aldermanic honors. Mr. Benson would make a worthy member of the City Council and many citizens would be heartily pleased if he consents to run. Mr. Benson has done excellent work upon the School Board and would prove a decided acquisition to the Council's deliberations.

The affairs of the Chatham Public Library were successfully wound up last evening, when the Board held their last meeting for the year 1905. This Board has shown much wise judgment in their management of the important public institution during the past year and they, as well as the ratepayers, should feel proud of their record. They are an able body of men and the various reports show that they are at the head of one of the finest and most up-to-date institutions of its kind in Canada. There was a good attendance in anticipation of an oyster supper from the retiring chairman. Owing to the fact, however, that the election of officers has been postponed until the February meeting, the members will enjoy the hospitality of the present chairman after the January meeting.

There were present at the meeting, Chairman Humphrey, Secretary Twomey, and Messrs. Anderson, Stone, Smith, Charteris and Sheldrick. The following accounts were ordered paid:—

The report was adopted. Mr. Sheldrick reported he had received a request from a ratepayer to allow chess playing and checker playing in the library. Mr. Sheldrick thought the Board should cater to the public. He moved that the patrons be allowed to play chess, checkers and kindred games.

Mr. Anderson:—Would you allow cards?

Mr. Humphrey:—Cards? No I wouldn't allow a card in the place. It was decided to rule out cards and crokinole, the latter game being too noisy. The Library Board will have to furnish chess and checker boards, as the motion carried.

The same magazines ordered last year were ordered for this year. The total amount of the accounts is \$111. They are ordered from Powell & Davis \$28, Geo. W. Sulman \$30, W. J. Kenny \$27.25, and R. Cooper \$26.90. The salaries were ordered paid. The usual amount, \$113.55, will be drawn from the City Treasurer for expenditures for December. The Board then adjourned.

SESSION OF KENT COUNCIL

Members of County Parliament Transacting Business of December Session

Many Matters Dealt With by the Commissioners—Interesting Discussions

WEDNESDAY AFTERNOON.

On resuming, the Council went into committee of the whole on the request of the delegation for consideration of the continuation pupils in the public schools. The Warden invited Mr. Grant to take the chair.

Mr. French asked how many pupils in East Kent were taking up continuation work.

Inspector Colles said there were some 220.

Mr. Ross asked how many in West Kent.

Inspector Park said that there were 505.

Mr. Sturgis asked why, when there was advanced work in Dresden, so many came to the Chatham Collegiate Institute.

Principal Miller said only one was coming for senior leaving work. The others were attending Business College.

Mr. Ross expressed his willingness to give more aid than has been done in the past. He thought the Council should give the matter serious consideration.

The Warden thought the matter should be considered. He thought that if any grant is made all pupils in the county should be put on the same footing. He thought the country boys should also be given a chance. He was in sympathy with the work.

Mr. French disagreed with Mr. Warden. He thought the county pupils should pay an extra tax. East Kent got \$1,500 last year and West Kent \$1,300.

Warden Vester explained that he meant when the school becomes burdensome all pupils should pay the same fee.

Mr. Somers thought in view of the heavier assessment in the towns the boys coming in from the country should pay a fee.

Mr. Sturgis felt like encouraging the idea and suggested that the Council should give as large a grant as possible.

Mr. Haggart was in sympathy with encouraging the continuation.

There are at present 45 inmates, 33 male and 12 female. The houses are rapidly filling up and soon the Council will have to furnish the upper storey. Heaters should be put in the men's ward to heat the adjacent cells. Although there has been a great deal of sickness, all of the inmates now are in very good health. There have been two deaths during the year and the physician made 58 visits.

The report was adopted. Mr. French asked if the man, Storey, who was sent in to the House of Refuge from Dresden had been entered as a county pauper or a pauper from Dresden.

Mr. Chinnick replied that he thought the man was entered from the town of Dresden. If he is a county pauper the town of Dresden should take steps to prove that he does not belong to them.

MOTIONS.

It was decided by motion and by-law to extend the time for the sale of wild and non-resident lands which are in arrears of taxes, one year.

Several by-laws were put through their first readings, and the Council then adjourned.

The commissioners were busy for the rest of the afternoon on committee work.

TOWNSHIP COUNCILS

HARWICH COUNCIL.

A special meeting of the council of Harwich was held on Monday, Nov. 18th, at Court of Revision on Taff Creek and Curtis drains. Members all present. Having taken the necessary declaration proceeded with the hearing of appellants on Taff Creek drain. The appellants present claimed their assessment was excessive, and that an allowance being made on W. J. Hamilton's assessment when constructed the pro rata was now based on wrong amount, they thought a new assessment should be made.

Moved by Campbell and Bentley, that whereas at the Court of Revision now held it appears from statements that certain assessments, in which the pro rata is based, are incorrect, and also serious objection is taken by some of the ratepayers to their assessment on account of their high assessment when drain constructed for straightening, and pro rata based on this assessment. Resolved that the Court of Revision on the Taff Creek drain be adjourned until Dec. 11th at 4 p.m., that the Reeve and Clerk be instructed to advise with the solicitor in regard to the matter.—Carried.

That whereas the council by resolution of Nov. 13th, made an offer to Howard to reduce the amount of their assessment on lands and roads by \$100, and whereas said offer was not satisfactory to said municipality, claiming a larger reduction, be it resolved that the resolution of Nov. 13th be rescinded, and the council of Harwich offer said municipality of Howard a reduction of \$125 from their assessment to avoid litigation.—Carried.

The Court of Revision on the Curtis drain was taken up and appellants heard.

Moved by Campbell and Bentley, that whereas A. P. Stephens appeals against his assessment on Curtis drain on lot 20, concession 2, R. T., for the reason that 16 acres of said lot south of the G. T. Railway had changed hands since previous assessment, and is now owned by Henry Stephens, said ownership being admitted by said H. Stephens. Resolved that the pro rata assessment placed on the \$125 100 acres of lot 20, concession 2, R. T., being \$41.48, be divided and \$29.1 placed on said 16 acres owned by H. Stephens, and the balance on that portion of said lot north of the G. T. Railway, owned by A. P. Stephens, and the Court of Revision adjourned until Dec. 11 at 4 p.m.—Carried.

On resolution regular business was taken up.

A communication was received from Messrs. Bell and McCubbin re Proctor drain and other drainage matters; also from Messrs. Wilson, Elie & Gundy re Taff Creek drain.

POOR SEWERS

Ald. Ainsworth Reports That Manholes and Intakes are Filled With Filth

Ald. Ainsworth, a member of the Board of Works, announced the fact that the manholes and intakes around the city are in a surprisingly bad and disgraceful condition.

For the past two days Inspector Mounter and Ald. Ainsworth have been inspecting the sewer manholes in South Chatham and in nearly every case they found them choked up with filth.

"I was surprised to find the manholes in such bad shape," said Ald. Ainsworth to The Planet this morning, "and at the next meeting of the Council I shall move to have every manhole in the city cleaned out at once. We found matters in a very deplorable condition. In every manhole we inspected in South Chatham we found from two to four inches of filth, and half the sewers are not running at all. On Wellington street the sewer is not working on this account. The catch basins and intakes are also clogged up in the most of cases."

To-morrow we will inspect the manholes in North Chatham, where several complaints have been made. "These sewers will, of course, have to be cleaned out and flushed right away. In many cases we found the bottom of the manholes on a level with the sewers, rendering them useless. These will all have to be deepened to make a catch basin for the sewers."

any members of the local Board of Trade. Present? There were some tariff matters we were to take up if there is anyone here to say anything.

No representative, however, was present.

County Commissioners Surgis, Haggart and Ross, for the County Council, presented the joint petition of Elgin and Essex counties for the same classification and rates for the shipment of beans as prevailed for other grains. Mr. Ross also drew attention to alleged unfair regulations which governed the shipment of live stock.

D. A. Gordon, M.P., in a short address heartily co-operated in what had been said concerning the classification of bean shipments. He pointed out that in this locality wheat raising was largely a thing of the past, and the farmers had to rely on the bean crop. If there were a lower rate the farmer would benefit. Mr. Gordon pointed out that the wheat was ground up and shipped in bags and barrels at the grain rate, while the farmers had the beans picked but got no consideration in the shipment rates.

The commission adjourned until afternoon.

DOWNTRODDEN JEWRY.

Terribly Sad Parade of Afflicted Na-
tion's Sons in New York.

New York, Dec. 5.—One hundred thousand Jews, even wearing a band on their forehead, marched through the principal streets of the east side yesterday, accompanied by bands playing dirges, in memory of the Jews massacred in Russia. Hundreds of women and children, grouped in singing bands, were scattered throughout the long parade.

The procession marched to the plaza in Union square, where it resolved itself into a mass meeting to formulate resolutions. Brief but terse resolutions were read by their leaders to the thousands of paraders. The voting was done orally, with a great shout, in which the resolutions were adopted unanimously. After outlining the Russian atrocities and calling upon the United States to interfere in behalf of the Jews, the resolutions continued:

"To our overwhelming shame, disappointment and sorrow, we realize that eternal vigilance is the price of the Jewish life, and we urge our people to take up arms against their assailants and if need be, to sell their lives most dearly. We call Jews everywhere to the defence of the Jewish people."

GAPON STRIKE BREAKER

Turning Sentiment of Workmen
to Oppose a Revolution.

Former Leader Addresses Many Meetings on the Great Holiday—Socialist Fire-Brand Orators Forcibly Ejected—Public Feeling Grows Against the Strikers—Is It the Turn in the Tide?—Czar Reviews Troops.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 4, via Eydtukhnen, East Prussia, Dec. 5.—The Emperor today reviewed the Silesian regiment at Tsarskoe Selo. Grand Duke Vladimir and Grand Duke Nicholas Nicholasovitch were present. The Emperor drank the health of the regiment. His Majesty appeared to be in good health.

The strike of the Moscow telephone operators, who cut the wires and tied up the poles, has severed the means of communication with the ancient capital. Sympathy with the pay raise and telegraph employees is now turning into indignation against the strikers and all the public is supporting a formidable movement which has been started by all classes to throw off the revolutionaries.

The "Law and Order party" took the lead, which is now being followed by the "Society of Strike Breakers," but the most important movement has been started under the leadership of Father Gapon, the former idol of the workmen, who since his residence abroad has become convinced that Russia is not prepared for a republic and is appealing to his old comrades to cut loose from the revolutionary agitators. The latter already charge that Father Gapon has been bought, and that he is a traitor to the cause of the people. Father Gapon, however, is sincere and his influence undoubtedly is great.

This being a great holiday, Father Gapon attended meetings of eleven of the organizations which he controlled before Jan. 22 (Red Sunday), at which his words were cheered to echoes. At these meetings the Socialist orators were howled and in some cases forcibly ejected. If this movement should grow and an effective split among the workmen be thereby created, it will prove of immeasurable service to the Government in tiding these over until the meeting of the Duma.

CONSPIRACY TO KILL TYRANTS.

The Trial of Mademoiselle Leontiff

Behind Closed Doors.

St. Petersburg, Dec. 3, 9 a. m., via Eydtukhnen, East Prussia, Dec. 4.—The trial of Mademoiselle Leontiff and a dozen others, who are charged with being implicated in a terrorist plot to kill Gen. Trepoft, is proceeding behind closed doors. The evidence developed the existence of a big conspiracy, with ramifications at Moscow and elsewhere, which had for its purpose the assassination of Grand Duke Sergius, already accomplished, and of Gen. Trepoft and other "tyrants." The plot was discovered by accident through a courier who was carrying a message to one of the conspirators in Finland.

Mademoiselle Leontiff is the daughter of Gen. Leontiff, who last spring was appointed Governor of Yakutsk, Eastern Siberia. It is said that she became a convert to terrorism during her stay at Lucerne.

Poland Free From Military Rule.

Warsaw, Dec. 6.—The abolition of the minor state of martial law was gazetted yesterday, and Poland is now completely freed from military rule.

13 MEN ARE DROWNED.

Another Marine Disaster Off Nova Scotia—M. P. P. Victim.

Halifax, Dec. 6.—A despatch received yesterday morning by Leslie, Hart & Co., stated that the steamer Lunenburg was ashore at Amherst Island, Magdalen Islands, and was a total wreck and that 13 men were supposed to have been lost. R. J. Leslie, M.P.P., of the firm, is supposed to be among the drowned. The Lunenburg was on the route between Pictou, N.S., and Magdalen Islands, and was insured for \$10,000.

Monday afternoon five men left the wreck and succeeded in reaching land safely. The others decided to stay by the ship. About 2 o'clock yesterday morning the steamer began to break up and those on board decided to take to the boat. A sea struck the boat when half way between the ship and island and swept all into the sea with the exception of the captain, who held on until rescued by a boat from the shore.

LLOYD GETS 18 MONTHS.

Newmarket Lawyer Sentenced By Judge Winchester For Theft.

Toronto, Dec. 6.—Thomas Hiram Lloyd, barrister of Newmarket, was charged in court with obtaining by theft and fraud various sums, amounting to \$4,687.

His defalcations in all are variously estimated at from \$70,000 to \$100,000. He pleaded guilty and was sent to the Central Prison for 18 months.

Public Works Scandal.

Ottawa, Dec. 6.—The suspension of clerks of the Public Works Department in connection with alleged irregularities in regard to the construction of the city postoffice is causing considerable comment. Mr. Gobeil, Deputy Minister of Public Works, refused to make any statement in the absence of the Minister.

Bernhardt Rotten Egg.

Quebec, Dec. 6.—In an interview Monday evening, Madame Bernhardt made some uncomplimentary remarks about French-Canadians, characterizing them as backward, owing to the undue influence of their clergy. As a result the company, including Madame Bernhardt, were the targets for a number of rotten eggs thrown at them by about one hundred hoodlums last night. A large detachment of police came to their rescue and escorted them to the station.

A Domestic Suicide.

London, Dec. 6.—Martha Graydon, a St. Thomas domestic, killed by a former lover, took carbolic acid last night and will die.

"HOLD-UP" INSURANCE CO.

Eldredge Tells What Mutual Reserve Life Had to Pay to Silence People Who Knew.

New York, Dec. 6.—Instances in which the Mutual Reserve Life paid an aggregate of about \$20,000 in what Vice-President Geo. D. Eldredge of that company called "hold-up" money were related to the investigating committee by Mr. Eldredge yesterday. In one case the company paid \$15,000 to John McDonald, a Philadelphia lawyer, who had been active in organizing the policyholders of the Mutual Reserve into a movement which charged President Frederick Burnham with mismanagement and demanded his removal.

Coon Came Down.

Another instance of a "hold-up," Mr. Eldredge said, was in 1890, when Max Behler, a so-called examiner of the low insurance department, came to New York with his son as an assistant, examined the Mutual Reserve Life Insurance Company and presented to it a bill for \$489 for the examination. Rather than pay the bill the company withdrew its business from Iowa; but a little later paid that bill and another of \$346 to Behler for a verification of his previous examination in order to get permission to again do business in Iowa.

Eldredge also told how he tried to secure a license for his company to do business in Missouri in 1893, and he said he found that it would have to employ W. H. Phelps as Attorney before he could do so. Phelps got the license for the company in three days and was paid \$5,500.

Equitable Gets Decision.

New York, Dec. 6.—The demurrers of the Equitable Life Assurance Society directors and trustees to the complaint of Rowland D. Burford, who sought to have a just and lawful distribution of the society's surplus, were sustained in the supreme court yesterday.

ONTARIO AND RAILWAYS.

Important Conference of Municipal Representatives Criticizes Law.

Toronto, Dec. 6.—In view of the proposed consolidation of the railway laws at the coming session of the Legislature, Hon. J. S. Hendrie called a conference of the parties interested to discuss the subject. The three principal parties are the Railway Act, the Electric Railway Act, and the Street Railway Act, together with minor acts, which sometimes overlap. It is intended to combine all into one general act.

The gathering began at 11 o'clock yesterday morning in the hall of the Ontario Hotel, presided over by Hon. Dr. Reame, while C. C. Robinson acted as legal adviser.

Ask Legal Enforcement.

Mayor Biggar and Frank McKelcan for Hamilton asked for provision that the agreements of cities with street railway companies should be enforced by the courts. They wanted the ambiguity removed which allows one company to grant running powers over its lines to other companies. They claim that the courts should enforce agreements, as they enforce injunctions.

A. J. Drummond, representing the Western Central Railway, criticized the law relating to capital stock and Sunday traffic. Inter-urban lines should be allowed to run on Sundays, being through lines as such as steam lines were. The uncertainty as to Sunday traffic prevented financiers becoming interested.

An Arbitration Board.

Councillor Richardson of Scarborough contended that renewals of franchises should be in the hands of an arbitration board.

J. B. Dow, solicitor for Whitby Township, contended that franchises should stick to the roads. Public ownership was out of the question in rural districts.

J. Lynch Staunton of Hamilton favored appellate tribunal to which grievances regarding railways might be brought.

C-B. NOT READY.

Issues Announcement That New Cabinet Will Be Given Dec. 11.

London, Dec. 6.—Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman saw King Edward at Buckingham Palace yesterday and accepted the task of forming a new Cabinet.

The Duke of Devonshire, Liberal Unionist, and former lord president of the council, was among the callers on the new Premier before the latter went to the palace, and in political circles importance is attached to the visit, as possibly signifying some kind of a working agreement on certain points of policy between the anti-protectionist Unionists, of which the Duke has been the recognized leader since his secession from the Balfour Cabinet, and the new Government.

The following official announcement was made last night:

"Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman informed King Edward that he will be unable to submit his proposed arrangements in connection with the formation of a new Government until Dec. 11."

Crushed Beneath Heavy Load.

Toronto, Dec. 6.—Fred Howard, driver for McKay & Forsythe, lumber dealers, was killed yesterday afternoon that he died an hour later. Howard was driving his team down the grade at Sunnyside, near Hicks' boat house. He was walking alongside the horses and slipped, the wagon, with its heavy load of lumber passing over his chest, crushing him. He died before he could be taken to the hospital.

Girl of 17 Takes Poison.

Aylmer, Dec. 6.—Beatrice Bentley, a young girl 17 years old, whose parents reside at Eden, Elgin County, committed suicide Monday evening by taking carbolic acid at the home of Henry Miller. She left a letter addressed to a friend in which she stated her intention to take poison, as she was tired of life. No other reason can be given for the rash act.

ABSOLUTE HOME RULE

Demand of the Irish Nationalists in Annual Convention.

Dublin, Dec. 7.—The Irish National convention was opened at the Mansion House yesterday under the presidency of John Redmond. There was a good gathering of members of Parliament and delegates from all parts of the country.

Neither William O'Brien nor Timothy M. Healy was present, but their absence did not seem to affect the cheerfulness of Mr. Redmond, as he congratulated the convention on the death of the Unionist anti-home rule Govern-

ment, which he attributed to the blows of the Irish representatives in Parliament. He painted the prospects of the Irish in roseate hues and said the realization of their hopes depended almost entirely on themselves.

The Lord Mayor of Dublin moved a home rule resolution condemning the present system of governing Ireland and continuing:

"We solemnly assert that no new system of government in Ireland will be accepted as satisfactory except a Legislative Assembly, freely elected and representative of the people, with power to make laws for Ireland, and an Executive Government responsible to that Assembly; and this convention declares that the Irish National party cannot enter into an alliance with or give support to any English party or Government which does not make the question of granting such an assembly and executive to Ireland the cardinal point of its program."

The resolution was carried by acclamation.
Wm. O'Brien Outlawed.
Resolutions were passed denouncing the Government of Ireland, outlawing Wm. O'Brien and his supporters unless they sign the party pledges, expressing disbelief in the promises of the Liberals and pledging absolute support to John Redmond, as leader of the Irish Parliamentary party.

The moderates were howled down and their speakers forced to leave the platform.
The convention also passed a resolution condemning the proposed conference of the supporters of Lord Dunraven, Thomas W. Russell, Timothy M. Healy and John Dillon on the ground that it would be interpreted as an abandonment of the claim for home rule.

There is no evidence that the incoming Liberal Government can expect more support from the Nationalists in the next Parliament than the Unionists have received, unless Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman pumps for home rule. The declaration of the leaders and the resolutions passed at yesterday's session mean continued opposition to the Government until absolute home rule has been granted to Ireland.

DOCTOR PRESTON ACCUSED.

Jury Says His Illegal Operation Caused Miss Clarke's Death.

St. John, N. B., Dec. 7.—The coroner's inquest into the case of the death of Miss Clarke and a charge against Dr. Preston of performing a criminal operation, was concluded last night. The jury found that "Miss Clarke's death was caused by blood poisoning as the result of abortion, believed, in view of evidence given by other doctors and nurses, to have been brought on by an illegal operation performed by Dr. Preston."

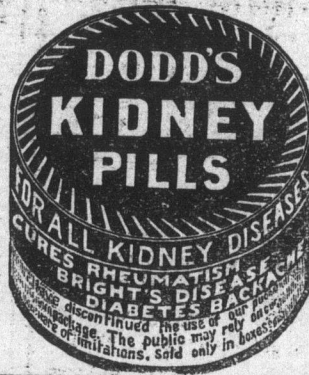
As much of the evidence will be thrown out, it is doubtful if Dr. Preston will be convicted. This is due to the law in regard to ante-mortem statements.

Foreign Affairs Secretary.
London, Dec. 7.—The process of forming a new Cabinet evidently will be a slow one. No appointments have as yet been announced, but there is an increasing possibility that Lord Elgin will be the new secretary for Foreign Affairs, and that Sir Edward Grey will be made secretary for the colonies.

Britain's Representative.
London, Dec. 7.—King Edward yesterday appointed Sir Arthur Nicholson, the retiring Ambassador at Madrid, as the British representative to the international conference on Moroccan reforms, which is to be held at Algiers, Spain.

J. B. Jackson Dead.
Ottawa, Dec. 7.—Josias Barwell Jackson, registrar of copyrights and trademarks, died yesterday morning from nervous trouble brought on, it is said, by the exacting duties of his office.

Meets Jan. 18.
Quebec, Dec. 7.—The Provincial Legislative Assembly is officially called for despatch of business on Jan. 18.



NOBLE WORK

Executive Officer Dr. R. V. Bray's Report is Encouraging and Installs New Energy Into the Society

At the annual meeting of the Kent Children's Aid Society held last week the Executive Officer, Dr. R. V. Bray, presented one of the most complete reports ever presented to an annual meeting in Chatham. It was his sixth annual report and was by far the most encouraging one ever received by the Society, showing that their work is progressing and growing at a wonderful rate.

The doctor in opening his remarks impressed the fact that there is still much work to be done and he hoped that those who have assisted the Society in the past will continue to lend their aid in the work of removing children from bad influences and worse surroundings.

During the year the doctor made 84 visits, investigating complaints and interviewing parents, etc.

One hundred and sixty letters were written, compared with 89 last year, seeking information and assistance and investigating complaints.

Twenty-four cases were reported requiring investigation, embracing 39 children. Of this number 17 cases embracing 28 children were from the city, the rest from the county. The causes of complaints were ill-treatment of child by guardian, neglect and desertion on the part of both parents, children wandering around on the streets, etc.

The doctor had 107 interviews on different cases during the year.

There were 19 boys brought up during the year in the juvenile court charged with various offences.

Eleven applications were received during the year for children. The requests came from all over the county and all of them could not be filled. Two children have been changed in homes.

The doctor made a very complete report on the Charities Conference which he attended as a delegate.

The work of organizing throughout the county, which has been quite successful this year, was made mention of.

In concluding he returned thanks to all who had generously assisted him during the year.

All of which shows that Dr. Bray has not been idle during the year, but has completed a noble work, for which he should feel highly satisfied. The Kent Children's Aid Society feel proud of their earnest, able and energetic Executive officer.
