In spite of the command from his chief, Lozon threw a rope around the burning wire, and tried to pull them apart. As he did so the electric light wire gave way and struck him across the fingers. He was immediated death. He fell across the wires, the electric light wire strik.

SAYS THAW IS INSANE

Likely Be Appointed

New York, March 21.—The Thaw trial opened yesterday with a decided surprise, Attorney Delmas, for the defence, withdrew the offer of the letter which he wanted to put in evidence Tuesday afternoon. This letter was written by Harry Thaw to J. Dennison Lyon, a banker of Pittsburg.

prosecution at various stages of the rial. Dr. Hamilton has stated the belief that Thaw not only was insane when he shot and killed Stanford White, but has remained so. He does not appear as an employe of either the state or the defence, he has publicly declared, but has held himself ready to take the stand at any time and impartially give the results of the examinations he made of the defendant shortly after the tragedy. At that time he was engaged by the attorneys for Thaw, but when Judge Olcott left the case, Dr. Hamilton also withdrew.

Dr. Hamilton's Evidence.

Dr. Hamilton, after qualifying as an expert, under Mr. Delmas' questioning, said, that with other alienists, he had seen Thaw soon after his incarceration.

"Was there any medical or physi-

incarceration.

"Was there any medical or physical examination at that time?" asked Mr. Delmas.

"There was a medical examination as far as it went," replied Dr. Hamilton

"What was that examination?" "What was that examination?"
Mr. Jerome at once objected. "This is a re-opening of the whole case," he argued. "Dr. Hamilton's evidence has no place here. It belongs in the case in chief and not in rebuttal. Dr. Hamilton has been here all the time and could have been called at any time."

"The district attorney," replied Mr "The district attorney," replied Mr. Delmas, "has on several occasions called your honor's attention to the fact that he is a quasi-judicial officer. He has no right to come in here now and attempt to shut out the truth."

"That is not so," broke in Mr. Jerome. "If the objection is made on that ground I will withdraw my objection. I am periectly willing to re-open this whose case and let all the truth go in."

"We have no right to be trying this defendant in a court of law."

"So bitterly do I feel about this," he continued, "that I have served notice on counsel that if they have knowledge of facts I believe to be in their possession, I will call the matter to the attention of the appellate division of the Supreme Court."

Justice Fitzgerald said he would institute an inquiry before himself and not before the jury as to the present mental state of the defendant.

Jerome said he would lay before Justice Fitzgerald all the information he had and which he believed would result in a halt in the trial.

Thaw a Paranoiac.

Mr. Jerome told Justice Fitzgerald his own experts had informed him that Thaw is a paranoiac.

Jerome said the state's experts, while saying that Thaw knew tho nature and quality of his act, thought that he is unable to advise his counsel as to the conduct of his case. When a prisoner is in that condition, the court should not proceed further.

Mr. Delmas asked if District Attorney, Jerome intended his application to be for a commission in lunacy. "I make no application. I say to the fourt that I can prove the defence. I leave the matter with the conscience of the court."

There also are provisions for limiting the amount of a sportsman's bag to ten grouse or prairie chickens for one day and 100 for the season, and forbidding the use of dogs in hunting doer

Salaries of Judges.

Regina, March 20.—A resolution passed in the Legislature here yesterday provides that judges shall be paid \$500 yearly as judges of Surrogate courts by the Provincial Government. A Surrogate judge will also be district judge and in that capacity will receive \$2,500 a year from the Dominion Government for first year of service, and after that \$3,000 a year.

I had often no-ticed that if one put a little bit of string, a large button or any strange object among breadcrumbs the spar-rows would not touch the bread. They feared a trap. Starlings are less sus-picious in this way. If they care about the bread at all, they are more

So I put a long piece of apple peel among the bread. It looked quite good to eat, but might be taken by a very suspicious bird for something of the nature of string or take which sparrows. WITCHES AND PLANTS.

The common ragwort is well known as the "witches' horse," the tradition being that they mounted rank growths of that species of weed and "rode the skies," just as the dame with the pointed hat rides the broom in the familiar picture. In Germany and throughout northern Europe it is the belief that witches float from place to place on beds of hay, comp largely of witches' blossoms and "devil spikes," this last being a species of dwarfed slough grass. St. John's wort, which is now so popular for shoulder and buttonhole bouquets on St. John's eve, was formerly worn for the express purpose of averting the crafts and subtleties of the witches, bogies, ghosts and spirits which the European easantry believed walked abroad on "that night of witching mysteries."-London Spectator.

THE UNEXPLORED.

Many Regions of the Earth Still Re-

Many years will elapse before any other continent is as well mapped as areas have much territorial extent.

In the Amazon basin, for example three of these regions are each much larger than all of our New England One unknown area in northwest Alaska is nearly as large as New England, and the Sahara has two areas in black that are each twice as large and another three times as large

John Bull Prefers to See a Blaze In Open Grate.

According to London papers, Englishmen are up in arms over a threatened invasion of what they regard as one of their inherent rights, the right to keep their houses uncomfortably cold. At a recent meeting of remonstrants resolutions were passed condemning a rumored attempt to supplant open fires with furnaces. The British husbands and fathers assembled agreed that home would be anything but attractive had it always an atmosphere reminiscent of the House of Commons, or, worst still, of the reading room of the British Museum. There is reason to believe that the

There is reason to believe that the house that is reason to believe that the house that is improperly heated possesses a number of advantages over the house that is thoroughly heated, although it is impossible to persuade people on this side of the water that any change is desirable. It costs much less partly to heat a house—to heat the ends of two or three rooms—for one thing, and that is an important consideration, surely, when coal goes up whenever the temperature goes down. Again, given an armful of logs piled near an open fireplace, and almost anybody can keep a fire going, whereas it is a very different matter to descend to the cellar and fix a furnace. The trouble with most furnaces is that they are located in the cellar.

Then, too, if callers call at all at a house in which their teeth chatter they remain only long enough to "pay their respects": they do not accept invitations to be seated and rock the hours away chatting about nothing in particular while the members of the family on whom they are calling are

hours away chatting about nothing in particular while the members of the family on whom they are calling are waiting for an opporunity to go to bed. It isn't surprising that Englishmen are opposed to warm houses, but why they continue to cling to open fires is a mystery. The open fire is more or less ornamental, it is true, but it merely serves to accentuate the general chill and gloom which pervade the average English "living room."

POET OF THE PEOPLE

CENTENARY OF LONGFELLOW'S BIRTH CELEBRATED.

Inherited the Poetic Temperament From His Mother-Was Influencedby His Early Residence Near Sea -Was the Greatest Scholar of Modern Times - His Shorter Poems Were the Most Liked.

Just a century ago, on Feb. 27, 1807, in the seaport town of Portland, Maine, was born of cultured parents one destined to become, not the greatest, but perhaps the best known and most loved poet of any age—one skilled to sing of time and of eternity—a "poet of the people," Henry Wadsworth Longfellow. From his mother, who was fond of music, poetry and nature, the boy probably received the romantic and imaginative side of his nature; from his father, a much-respected lawyer, he no doubt inherited his integrity and habits of industry, for he was throughout his life a hard worker, and from early youth cherished "noble longings for the strife."

The fact that he grew up in a sea-Just a century ago, on Feb. 27, 1807,

port town had much to do with the influence of the sea so noticeable in his poetry that he is often called the "poet of the sea."

Throughout his life the haunting "secret of the sea."

Throughout his life the haunting "secret of the sea" remained with him and never failed to inspire him with fancies romantic and tenker. Surrounded from youth to age with a happy environment of friends and artistic possessions, he might well think his lot the especial favor of Heaven. Appointed to a professorship at 19, sent across the sea to study foreign languages and later given a chair of literature in Harvard, with leisure for literature work, what more could heart desire? He was less tried in the furnace than poets are wont to be, and therefore was not a "poet of passion or of pain"; no erratic genius such as Shelley or Poe, Byron or Swinburne, but a calm, finely-poised soul, with a mind highly gifted by nature, and well nurtured and disciplined by habits of study. He lived in a spot where he had all the delights of country life and the advantages of cultured Boston.

Longfellow occupied a unique place in American literature. He was the greatest modern scholar of the times, scholar in spirit as well as in letter. Both by his verse and by his teaching he made familiar the culture of modern languages, bringing from Europe whole literatures, and by his translations of the stories and legends of European history putting the American bely the hest vocan ever written be

south.

His longest and best poem, probably the best poem ever written by an American poet—the flower of American idylls, known in all lands, and his masterpiece and favorite among the longer poems, is "Evangeline." This poem had a rapturous welcome from the public when it appeared, and for the first six months after publication sold at the rate of a thousand copies a month. Wherein lies the charm of this poem? Why its universal popularity? It presents the most

"Old and yet ever new, and simple and beautiful always; Love immortal and young in the end-less succession of lovers."

In this exquisite character study the figure of the devoted Evangeline stands invested with a beauty as of angels.

Longiellow's home at Cambridge became a Mecca for countless pilgrims because the poet lived and died there, but numerous Cambridge scenes have a place in Longiellow's verse for their own sake. Every hamlet in the land has its smithy,

classmate of his who was about to commit suicide, when he was deter-red by the reading of this poem. "Ex-celsior," "Resignation" and many of his minor poems belong to the same class, and have gladdened many sad and weary livas

class, and have gladdened many sad and weary lives.

Longfellow was genuinely religious, but his religion was so broadly human that he could not confine it to the narrow creeds of any of the various sects. He leaned toward Unitarianism, but his belief may be sumimed up in a single line of his own, "Heart within and God o'erhead."

He was certainly not a Shakespeare, nor a Goethe, nor yet a Tennyson or a Browning, but he will be remembered and loved quite as long as they. His place as a strong pillar in the temple of American literature is secure. The cathedral bell has tolled, and the twilight closed in, but through it still comes the tender voice in poems that are a priceless possession of the human spirit. that are a priceless possession of the human spirit.

VICTIMS OF INDUSTRY.

Enormous Number of Non-Fatal Industrial Accidents In Britain.

Cup That Cheers.

Man is not the only animal fond of intoxicating liquors, says The Baltimore Sun. Birds, insects, even fishes, have been known to become drunkards at a suitable opportunity.

A remarkable case of bird inebriation occurred during the course of a homing pigeon contest in France. Four hundred and twenty-nine birds were taken from Tours to La Bohalle, and the toss took place at the latter town. Out of all this lot only forty birds found the way home; the others were too intoxicated.

At first the owners of the pigeons were mystified at the non-appearance of their little racers. Then the forty wearily dribbled in home in a decidedly sorry condition. They were in a shocking state of inebriation, but they gave a clew to the absence of the others. dustrial Accidents In Britain.

Last year no fewer than 110,762 in non-fatal industrial accidents were reported in Great Britain, compared with 99,546 in 1905. Fatal accidents numbered 1,116 against 1,063. Only 27 of last year's total were females, and 107 were young persons. The largest number of accidents in any one industry was 145 in the construction of buildings, as against 117 in 1905; 143 fatalities occurred in docks, and 118 in metal foundries. Mechanical machinery accidents were responsible for 362 of the deaths; 15 deaths were due to electric shocks, and 371

ible for 362 of the deaths; 15 deaths were due to electric shocks, and 371 were caused by "persons falling." Hoist fatalities numbered 36, and cranes were responsible for 89.

Origin of the French Title as Applied to a Fine Cook. Boston.

The Order of the St. Esprit was created in 1587, was suppressed by the revolution and was revived by Louis XVIII. in 1814. To speak rightly, Louis XVIII. considered that the order had ever ceased to exist, for he had given two collars during his exile, in 1810, the one to Francis I., king of the two Sicilies, and the other to his brother, the Prince of Salerno, the father of his brother's wife, the Duchess d'Aumaie.
The ribbon of this order was a light

blue color. It was worn around the neck in the reigns of Henry III. and Henry IV., but was changed by Louis XIV., when it was worn across the chest. The Chevaliers of the St. Esprit were always known under the name of Les Cordon Bleu, and this was the su-preme honor during the monarchy of France. It was from this that the title of "cordon bleu" was given to a first class cook. A gentleman one day declared after a good meal that he who had cooked the dinner had proved him-self a "cordon bleu" among cooks—in other words, the master of his art. The title became quite the rage and is now always used to designate a good cook without the persons who use it knowing what it means or still less the origin of the title.

Make English Navy Futile?

When airships can travel faster than railway trains now move Great Britain, the professor says, will be deprived of the present strategic advantages of her geographical position. The British navy will be reduced to comparative insignificance. The Hima-layas will no longer protect India

parative insignificance. The Himalayas will no longer protect India from land attack.

The professor admits that England and America may build aerial navies that, ship for ship, may be quite as good as those of Germany, but they will have no armies fit to cope with Germany's highly trained legions with which, conveyed by aerial transports, she will overwhelm hostile countries. The narrative of events which the professor relates takes place between 1913 and 1930. Germany adopts an improved form of the airship invented by Count Zeppelin, who thus far has merely succeeded in spending a large fortune in abortive attempts to conquer the air. The Zeppelin air-ship consists of a wigar-shaped balloon, with an aluminium deck, and loon, with an aluminium deck, and fitted with powerful motors and steer-

apparatus. His Airship Dream Weird. In the death dealing, perfected form it takes in Prof. Martin's book form it takes in Prof. Martin's book the balloon has a capacity of from 60,000 to 100,000 cubic meters, is divided into something like 150 airtight compartments, carries 600 men on its aluminium deck, and, smong other weapons of destruction, is provided with 400 or 500 aerial torpedoes. The professor predicts that by 1916 Germany will have 2,000 of these fighting airships in commission. Without armament, he figures it out that they will cost only \$75,000 each — about what it now costs to build a torpedo boot.

In addition Germany is to be sup-plied with aerial trains, consisting of four airships linked together, the front airship alone being supplied with motors, and towing the other three after it at a prodigious rate of speed. Each train will suffice to transport 1,000 fully armed and equipped German meddiers.

Suvaroff gets himself proclaimed Czar of Russia under the name of Michael, and sets about preparing to subjugate the rest of the world.

The imagination of the most lurid dime novelist never depicted such awful battles as take place between the flying warships of Germany and Russia. From dizzy heights they drop destructive bombs on hostile armies. Russia. From dizzy heights they drop destructive bombs on hostile armies. They riddle one another with shells, they ram each other in midain, and, the wrecks, falling from heights of 10,000 feet, are snashed to smitherens. The combatants are provided with parachutes in lieu of life belts, and thus many of them, after their airships are destroyed, succeed in reaching terra firms safely and remew the struggle there.

One scene describes the raid of a Russian air fleet in Berlin, led by the usurper Michael, who pulverizes the German capital by raining bombs of tremendous explosive power upon it and destroys thousands of German troops.

But, of course, the new Napoleon ultimately meets his Waterloo through the superior courage and skill of the German warriors of the air, and Rusaia has to accept the terms of peace dictated by the Kaiser. Then, having walloped Russia, the Kaiser proceeds to make himself master of the world. England, stripped of her colonies becomes a mere dependency of Germany.
