

4 NOISEMAKERS ON CAMPUS

Three aspiring UNB students are attempting to emulate the pattern of success of New Brunswick's dynamic young Premier in his surge to political fame last June. Fred Eaton, Bob Gauthier, and Derek Oland are vigorously vying for the Presidency of the 1961-62 Students' Representative Council. One need only stop and look and listen on campus to become aware of the high-pitched and spirited fervor of the Presidential campaigns. Multi-coloured posters, sweeping banners, and "person-to-person" type discussions have been prominent about the campus this past week. With the SRC elections only five days away, the candidates for the various positions are bringing their campaigns to an exciting climax.

The Brunswickan, in an attempt to acquaint the students with the Presidential candidates assigned three reporters to interview them. Following are the views and opinions of these three young gentlemen with regard to the forthcoming election:

Fred Eaton, a third year Arts student from Toronto has been active in several campus organizations. When questioned about his SRC election platform Fred departed from the ancient custom of wild promises and rash statements of reform and turned to a more realistic qualification for such an office as SRC President — that being **experience**. Two years on the SRC, two years on the Constitution Committee, one year on the LBR House Executive, combined with experience in almost every phase of University activity, have provided Fred with the necessary scope of vision required to understand and recognize the needs of the student body and have provided him with the ability and general know-how to guide and supervise the governing body of student affairs — the group whose actions affect every one of us in this expanding university.

In his interview with the Brunswickan, Bob Gauthier, a fourth year Civil Engineer from Montreal had the following to say:

"As some of the students already know, I have been holding bull-sessions with groups of students throughout the campus, and have left myself open to questioning of any sort with regards to the SRC. I feel that it is in the best interests of the student to meet the candidates who may represent him for the coming year. The public discussion and debate, where questions from the floor will be handled by the three candidates, should provide the voter with the opportunity of assessing the merits of each.

"Since it is in their own interest that they choose wisely, I am willing to meet any question that may come up at any time. If I cannot pass the test while face to face with the people I would like to represent, then I'm not the man for the job.

"As to experience in the SRC, both of my opponents are well-trained. If we want an SRC like the one we had this year and the year before, then one of these is the man to elect. **But if we want a dynamic type of representation, where everyone knows what is happening, then... you know the rest.**"

Derek Oland stated his views about the coming election. Questioned about a variety of aspects of the election, he gave the reasons for his offering as candidate, what he felt the role of the President should be, and answered questions about his personal background. Mr. Oland is from Rothesay, N.B. and is a third year Business Administration student with two years experience on the SRC. With regard to his views on the structure of the SRC he said, "I feel that it represents too small a group. I'm not making nasty cracks about anyone, but I feel that the Council should include representation from every part of the student body. The decisions and the work should be spread around more."

Concerning the role of SRC President... "I think that the President should act as a coordinator, having some knowledge of all student activities. He should lead, to a certain extent, but not try to impose his ideas on things outside his jurisdiction."

In concluding, Mr. Oland said... "Groups like **Radio UNB** deserve a lot of credit and all the help we can give them to expand. However, **the only real issue in this election is the efficient running of the Council for the best interests of the students.**"

Robichaud Advises: Choose Reps. Carefully

"To what degree is the citizen of today meeting his responsibility in our complex society?" This was the question Premier Louis J. Robichaud asked a group of interested students and officials in Loring Bailey Hall, Wednesday night. He stated that a strong balance of reasoned responsibility must be maintained by dedicated parents, teachers, religious leaders and all citizens because a breakdown at any level could destroy the structure of society.

The Premier denounced those who "damn all things political and all those who participate in public affairs". He strongly emphasized that it was the duty, not the privilege of every citizen to be well informed of affairs at every level of government and to choose their representatives carefully.

Premier Robichaud stated that it was the obligation of the members of the government to provide the highest level of service at the lowest cost and the obligation of the opposition to offer bonafide criticism and alternative constructive policies.

In conclusion the Premier urged the students in the forthcoming Model Parliament election to consider carefully the policies of each party and to vote accordingly in preparation for their future responsibility as the voters of the country.

Chairman for the evening was Ed Bell, president of the UNB Liberal Club, who sponsored the event.

UNB Debates Tonight

This weekend will be the busiest ever for the UNB Debating Society, with four intercollegiate debates to take place. Tonight, UNB hosts Acadia in the Tartan Room of the Student Centre at 8, and at the same time and place tomorrow night, St. Thomas will have two debaters battling their wits against UNB.

The four UNB debaters will be JoAnne MacArthur, Terrence McCluskey, Nick Mulder and Harry Scott. Judges have been picked from the faculty and from downtown Fredericton. It takes a tremendous amount of work to prepare a debate of this nature and an equal amount of nerve to deliver it. It is hoped that our students will come to the debates and lend moral support to the debaters.

On the away-from-home scene, Jim Anderson and Ed Bell debate against Dalhousie University in Halifax tonight. Leaving Halifax at 1:00 a.m., they have a night-long journey to Memorial University in St. John's, Newfoundland for a debate tomorrow night.

PRESIDENT WANTS \$\$\$\$

Dr. Colin B. Mackay, president of UNB, appeared before the Fredericton City Council Tuesday with a request for a grant of \$400,000 from the city.

This money, to be used for construction of a new residence, would consist of annual \$20,000 grants over a 20-year period. The new building would be named Fredericton House and would form part of the quadrangle in which Aitken and Neville House stand.

Dr. Mackay stated that during the present academic year the more than 2000 people at work "up the hill" and the university itself would spend \$2,845,000 in Fredericton.

The request was turned over to the finance committee for examination and recommendation.

Gamblers Threaten Campus!

The appearance of Baron von Schnockeldorf is uncertain but Blackjack Bernie will be sure to have a table.

To attract the maximum number of patrons there will be dancing adjacent to the casino; full details about the gambling den will be announced as soon as the contract with the syndicate has been completed.

Party Platforms

Model Parliament elections take place next week in conjunction with the Students' Representative Council voting. The platforms of the campus political parties contesting Model Parliament has been published on the inside pages of this issue. Four platforms have been published and it is anticipated that the platform of a fifth party, Maritime Monarchists, will be printed next Tuesday.

What is the significance of these platforms? What is their value? Are they simply fanciful pieces of proposed legislation that may never be enacted by a government? Are these platforms merely a reflection of federal political party lines or have they been designed to specifically appeal to the students of UNB?

To digress momentarily, the success of a political party depends on two tangible abilities, their leadership and their proposed legislation. Legislative platforms promise what they will do if elected, while the leadership attempts to convince the voters that his party is the best tool to implement that legislation. Strong, forceful leadership can conceal or over-ride an uninspiring party platform while the opposite also holds true.

This year, party platforms and leadership action reveal that a great deal of work and energy has been expended in an effort to present each parties' side of the picture. On a strict platform digest basis it is difficult to judge one performance over another.

Many voters, whose sympathies lie with a certain party on the provincial or federal level, will cast their ballots for the same party in a student election. These people devote little consideration to the leadership or platforms of the students political parties.

Within this lies a great potential evil. To ensure the complete success of Model Parliament, all platforms should be considered on an individual basis with party affiliations remaining in the background. As one party leader told me, "Read our platform and there will be no doubt in your mind as to how you will vote." We have read all the platforms (with one yet to come) and think that the decision made next Wednesday will be very significant.

Our final counsel on this subject; read the platforms, evaluate them and then pronounce judgement on them. Pronounce judgement by casting your vote for the party presenting the platform that appeals most to you.

The UNB PC Party submits the following platform:

Foreign Affairs

1. A complete examination of Canada's relationship with the United States of America.
2. The creation of a diplomatic corps training centre administered by the Department of External Affairs.

Defence

3. A thorough review of our present defence policies.

Public Works

4. The construction of a Maine Corridor Road, with the Department of Public Works giving preference to the Faculty and Students of the University of New Brunswick in designating the construction staff.

Health and Welfare-Social Justice

5. A federal program of Alcoholic Rehabilitation, administered free to all university students.
6. An educational offensive to demonstrate the power of beer as an agent for the combat of cancer.

Finance

7. A policy of fluctuating interest on bank loans from one area of the nation to another, to ensure that interest rates on bank loans may be lower in those sections of the nation suffering high unemployment.

Electoral Act

8. Amend the electoral Act to provide every university in


Canada having in access of 1500 full-time registered students (thus excluding the "Marshrats") with a seat in the House of Commons, giving the vote in all those constituencies to all full-time registered students over 18 years of age.

Northern Affairs and National Resources

9. To warm the climate of our North by providing that there be one woman for every man, both in the Arctic and in all logging camps.

10. In the event of the nationalization of Canada's Sewerage System, steps be taken to ensure that the "MOOSE" of New Brunswick be provided with more accessible outlets.

The following platform is what we, the members of the UNB LIBERAL CLUB, think would be of most benefit to UNB students. We realize that this is model legislation and that the actual federal government is not likely to put it into effect at once (at least not until after the next federal election), but we believe that by giving it our support in this election, it will be brought to the attention of the general public and government leaders, giving them positive indication of the needs and feel-

ings of university students. With this in mind, we offer the following platform for your support:

I — With the rising cost of university education, we will legislate to provide the following benefits for university students:

- 1) University students in summer employment will be given complete exemption from income tax and will not be required to pay Unemployment Insurance Premiums.

- 2) Parents supporting dependents in university will receive a \$2000 income tax exemption, this figure being much closer to the actual cost of a university year than the \$500 now offered.

- 3) Married university students and their wives (husbands) will receive further tax exemptions, depending upon the number of children and the wage-earning ability of the working partner.


- 4) A system of bursaries and scholarships will be established for students who show the need and merit. These loans and scholarships will be made available to all students, including those of average standing, thus giving every student an opportunity for university education to ensure their future and that of our nation.

II — Realizing that the preceding measures will be expensive, and that it would be virtually impossible to pay for them at the present level of unemployment without severe taxation, we will bring into effect the following points; in order to (1) increase government revenue without burdening the wage-earner, (2) combat unemployment and (3) revitalize the present economic condition of Canada's depressed areas.

- 1) A capital gains tax will be levied, to remedy profit without taxation by business sources with capital.

- 2) Gambling in limited forms will be legalized and controlled by federal statutes, and taxes levied from gambling will be used for the system of university scholarships.

- 3) New or expanding industries will be encouraged to build in depressed areas, promoting more employment and a gradual raising of the standards of living there.

The following is the New Party Platform:

1. Recognition of China and her admission to the UN.
2. A foreign policy dedicated to the principles of the UN Charter and independent of either the U. S. or the U. K. whenever the policies of either or both of them are in conflict with the principles of the Charter.
3. A complete reappraisal of Canada's defence policies.
4. Refusal to permit nuclear weapons on Canadian soil or in the hands of our forces anywhere.
5. Increased research into and development of nuclear energy as additional source of power.
6. Financial assistance to hospital, medical and research centres in the application of nuclear energy to the diagnosis and treatment of disease.
7. Retraining and relocation programmes for displaced workers.
8. Development for new industries, public as well as private.
9. A policy of public planning and democratic control of investment and production to meet the post-war challenge of automation, foreign control of the economy and threatening Communist competition.
10. Establishment of democratic public agencies, such as Investment Board, Development Banks and Export and Import Boards, responsible to Parlia-

ment, to:

- (a) control the volume of investment.
 - (b) channel investment to the most socially desirable projects.
 - (c) decrease reliance on and need for foreign capital.
 - (d) inaugurate financial and credit policies to facilitate both public and private investment in accordance with social needs and to control the effects of inflation.
11. Encouragement and assistance to the development of co-operative enterprise and credit unions, and the establishment of a Ministry of Credit Unions and Co-operatives.
 12. Planned development and conservation of natural resources.
 13. Legislation to protect small business against unfair competition and against exploitation by monopolistic interests.
 14. Revision of old age pensions.
 15. A nation-wide health insurance plan to provide comprehensive health care for every man, woman and child and to include medical, surgical, nursing, dental, optical and similar care as well as hospitalization.
 16. Revision of taxation system to:
 - (a) eliminate inequities in application of income tax.
 - (b) abolish special privileges and exemptions now provided for corporations and recipients of corporation dividends.
 - (c) increase rates on higher incomes and corporations.
 - (d) increase personal exemptions for lower income groups.
 17. Substantial financial assistance to the provinces, without encroaching on their jurisdiction over education, to ensure:
 - (a) that every child in every part of Canada has an opportunity to develop his capacities to the full;
 - (b) that every community has adequate school facilities;
 - (c) that all teachers receive salaries commensurate with their responsibilities and status;
 - (d) that all able students may go on to University or other institutions of higher learning without cost and without other financial worries;
 - (e) that adequate facilities are available to train the teachers, researchers, and all other professions in the humanities, social and natural sciences that Canada urgently needs.

18. Protection for all bilingual and bi-cultural rights within the Canadian nation and of the official status of the English and French languages.

19. A distinctive Canadian flag and national anthem.

20. Power in Canada to amend its own constitution, subject to entrenched clauses concerning basic human rights and minority guarantees.

Beavers Tackle McGill

After fourteen undefeated years of swimming, the UNB Varsity Beavers have finally stuck their collective necks in the noose. No, this reporter is not from McGill but that's the way the cards are stacked.

For the Beavers to pull off a win this afternoon, they will need more than their impressive past record. Three years of positive wins over all other Quebec Colleges and Universities have left them with only one choice, swim against the powerful McGill Redmen of the big four college circuit.

Why the Beavers should want to tackle such a power laden crew can be answered with the emulation of the President of UNB — "Progress". Three years ago, the Beavers set sail into the unknown and came back victorious. In order to advance one's position in this society of ours, one must take chances. That is what the Beavers are doing.

Prime movers behind this action can be found in the persons of Preston Thom, Gil Leach, Herb Mitton, Wayne Barry, Steve Jones, Al Bene, and Coach Amby Legere. All other factors being equal, these seven individuals collectively and singularly will be out to perform at the maximum level that their five long months of training have given them.

McGill has the services of Olympic swimmer Richard Pound who coupled with Peter Rutherford hold three existing nation-wide records in the freestyle and butterfly respectively. No swimmer in Canadian history has undercut 50 seconds in the 100-yard freestyle but their boy Richard has done it. Only two years ago, UNB swimmers set their sights on 60 seconds for this event. It takes about 12 seconds to swim the length of McGill's pool, need we say more!

Amby Legere is not placing all his eggs in one basket; however, and six other Beavers will board the TCA aircraft for Little Paris. Diver Ken Westrup, Paul Brodie, the Sullivan brothers, Charlie and Dave, Jim Hayden and Bruce McDonald, will round out UNB's hopes.

Heavy reliance is being placed on Preston Thom's recording of a new 100-yard freestyle mark for the Maritimes. Also Herb Mitton is expected to live up to his selection as the best swimmer in the Winter Carnival meet. Wayne Barry, last year's Beaver helmsman must live up to his four year record on the team as does Steve Jones, this year's co-Captain. Charlie Sullivan and Gil Leach are the only other two swimmers with the squad who have competed in Quebec this year and both are undefeated to date.

We dare not venture more than a 'slightly lost' prediction. Dim hope may be gleaned from the knowledge that University of Toronto eked out a win over the Redmen two weeks ago, but little solace remains as U of T is next on the list should the Beavers pull this one off.

Falcons Take Second Place

Last weekend at the Colby College Winter Carnival Ski Meet, the UNB Red Falcons came a strong second in competition with U of Maine, Colby College, St. Michael's and Bowdoin.

After a poor start on Friday morning in the down hill the Red Falcons, by an excellent team effort came second in the slalom beating the third place team by 27 points, to climb to second place from fourth which they had occupied after the down hill.

On Saturday, the Falcons came second in the cross country, thus strengthening their lead over third place Colby.

In the jumping UNB dropped to fourth place but by such a narrow margin that they easily retained second place in the over-all standings. Throughout the meet, UNB displayed excellent team spirit being more concerned with the team standings than with individual glory.

On the whole the results were very good, the team was not disappointed with a second in the meet as U of Maine's team is of senior A calibre bolstered by two of last year's USA Olympic squad.

Individual honors go to Norm Crutchfield, second in the slalom; Grant MacKenzie, third in cross-country and Jerry Lemon, a fourth in jumping. Also competing were: Gord Page, Dave Burstow, Bjorn Jacobsen, Hans Anvik and Ove Samuelsen.

Final team standings were: Maine 392.3, UNB 349.4, Colby 327.3, St. Michael's 319.5 and Bowdoin 281.1.


