## ITS PUBLIC BUILDINGS, PARKS, \&C.

1ALIFAX is the Capital of Nova Scotia, and next to Bermuda, the principal naval station in America. It is situated on one of the finest harbors of the Atlantic coast. It was founded in 1749, and was first called Chebucto, but changed afterwards to Halifax, in compliment to Earl of Halifax. An expedition, under command of Lord Cornwallis, landed on the 21st of June, and selected the site of the Capital City of Nova Scotia. Its population in 1881 was 36,100 . The city occupies a picturesque situation on the east slope of the peninsula (of 3000 acres) between the Bay, the N. W. Arm and Bedford Basin; and looks out on a noble harbor, spacious enough to hold all the navies of Europe, and with fortifications strong enough to successfully resist the encroachment of any belligerent. The city has a copious supply of water from the Chain Lakes, twelve miles distant. There is a fire-alarm telegraph, and an efficient fire department, with several steam engines, and a protection corps.

The city lies along the shore of the harbor, and is two and one-half miles long and three-quarters of a mile wide. The plan is regular, and the streets, as a rule, are well laid out. Hollis and Granville streets contain several elegant and substantial buildings, but in some portions of the city the dingy appearance of the houses might be improved by a little outlay on paint.

Approaching Halifax by water, the traveller's attention is first drawn to Cape Sambro on the western coast, on

which there is a light house, to warn the approaching mariner of impending danger. Light houses and strong fortifications are seen at every prominent point as you enter the harbor. On the west shore Herring Cove is passed. Two miles from Herring Cove you pass Salisbury Head, and run between the Martello Tower on Meagher's Beach and the York Redoubt. Passing McNab's Island the steamship soon runs by Fort Clarence and the fortress on George's Island, and drops anchor opposite the Deep Water Terminus:

If the traveller comes by the Intercolonial, or Windsor and Annapolis Railway, he has a fine view of picturesque beauty, as the train glides past the shores of Bedford Basin, which is 5 miles long and from 1 to 3 wide. It is from 8 to 36 fathoms deep, and contains about 10 square miles of secure anchoring ground. The village of Bedford, 10 miles from the city, is prettily located, and has several summer hotels, and quite a number of handsome suburban villas, where the merchant princes rusticate during the summer season.

The I. C. R. Depot at North Street is one of the finest in Canada. It is two stories high, and mansard roof, with tower and dome. It measures $113 \times 50$ feet. On the ground floor are waiting rooms, I. C. R. and W. \& A. ticket office, telegraph, news agent and Superintendent's offices,' which are all heated by steam, The passenger car shed is 400 feet long and 87 wide.

On arriving here the usual babel of hackmen's tongues greets the weary traveller, and if he is fortunate enough to survive he is soon rolling along to the Queen, Halifax, or some other fashionable caravansary.

A pleasant ramble on a fine balmy morning may be onjoyed by wlking up to the Citadel. At the summit charming view of the harbor and the City of Dartmouth is obtained. Dartnouth is directly opposit: Halifax, and is

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accessible by steam ferry boats, wh th run regularly every fifteen minutes, until eleven o'clock at night. There are several fine private residences belonging to Halifax merchants, and about half a mile from the town is the Mount Hope Insane Asylunt, a long granite building, from which a grand view of the harbor call be obtained. Visitors are shown through the institution on Tuesdays. Dartmouth has 4300 inhabitants, and has several factories and foundries. The Skate and Cordage factories give employment to a large number of operatives. A large Sugar Refinery was built some years ago, but not proving profitable, has ceased operations. Cow Bay, one of the finest natural watering places in Aperica, is about ten miles from Dartmouth. The Atlantic rolls in on its long stretch of hard sandy shores, affurding excellent facilities for surf bathing. All visitors to Halifax should visit this delightful summer
resort.

On the ramparts of the Citadel there are signal staffs, and when a vessel is made out at Sambro, information respecting her is telegraphed to the Citadel, and repeated to the citizens by a series of signals. From the Citadel a ponderous cannon keeps us up to time by belching forth at noon and half-past nine at night, which is a warning to "our brave defenders" that they must get home to barracks.

The view from here is varied and interesting. The island from which Meagher's Beach jut: out is McNab's, on which is the military range. It is a popular resort for pic-nic parties. Back of McNab's is Lawlor's Island, on which is the Quarantine Hospital. George's Island, about 1800 feet from the shore, is quite pretty. It was named as a compliment to George III. There is a nowerful modern fortress containing heavy guns. This pi ition is a key to the harbor, and with Fori Clarence, ccui- a cesfully prevent any foe from entering the harbor ifling driwn the

Barracks. The principal powder magazine is close to these barracks. Further south is the Dockyard, about threequarters of a mile in length, and enclosed on the land side by a high stone wall. It contains store houses, machine shops, arsenals, hospital, and officers' quarters. H. M. vessels repair and refit here. Visitors are admitted on application to the Superintendent. The Admiralty House, where the Admiral in charge resides, is on Gottingen street. It is a plain, unpretentious edifice of stone, and has been the residence of many distinguished individuals, and was the first place in which the Marquis of Lorne and his wife the Princess Louise stayed when they came to this country.

Near the foot of Citadel Hill is the Military Hossital, close to the Garrison Chapel, a plain wooden building, in which are many tablets in memory of deceased officers. A little further along Brunswick street is St. George's Church, more familiarly known as The Round Church, from its circular form. On the corner of Brunswick and Gerrish streets stands The Little Dutch Church, erected in 1761 by German immigrants. Further north, on Gottingen street, is the Deaf and Dumb Asylum. The Old Town Clock must receive a noticie, in passant, for though not a "thing of beauty" anchitecturally, it is one of the old landmarks, and the clang of its sonorous tones no doubt reminds yf oldest inhabitant of lovers' meetings in the dim and distant past.

Visitors desirous of going through the Citadel can only do so by applying at the Brigade Office for a pass, and ever then it is evtremely difficult to get one under the new regulations.

the next block the City and Provincial Hospital, and the New Poors' Asylum on South street. The Exhibition Building, on Tower Road, is a fine structure. It is leased by H. B. Clark, who runs it during the winter season as a Skating Rink. A little further north you come to the pride of Haligonians, known as "The Public Gardens," which may be entered from Spring Garden Road, Summer street, Sackville street or South Park street. It contains about eighteen acres, and is, without doubt, one of the handsomest public gardens on this continent. For beauty of design and exquisite blending of colors it cannot be excelled. Frequently during the summer promenade concerts are giyen, and when lighted up in the evening and the strains of sweet music greet the ear it seems like a veritable fairy land.
Taking a hack, a favorite drive is down Pleasant street, past the Esplanade, (a pleasant little lounging place, which at one time was crossed by a bridge called "Kissing Bridge," where youth and maiden plighted their troth), and then passing Steele's Pond you enter Point Pleasant Park with its pretty groves of evergreen trees, threaded by nicely macadamized roads. After a survey of the forts, harbor approaches and many points of beauty, by a turn to the right hand the road to the North West Arm may be followed to the Chain Battery point.

Turn eastward, passing the Prince's Tower and north past the Penitentiary, Public Gardens, Cemetery and Common to the Quinpool road on the left the head of the Arm is soon reached. Keeping north you pass Dutch Village to Bedford Basin. If the left hand road be taken from the Arm head south it will take you to Melville Island and the Dingle, which is a favorite for picnic parties. Another nice drive is coming up from the Park by the Bowery road. On the left as you turn down the Bowery is a road leading to the old Penitentiary, lately used as the Poor House. Before

turning to come up Tower road again you pass the Pine Hill Theological Hall and several handsome private residences. The road to Bedford via Gottingen street is a very pretty drive. Near the Four Mile House is Mount St. Vincent Academy for ladies, managed by the Sisters of Charity. Two miles further is a small building which is known as the Music Hall of the Prince's Lodge. The Lodge, where Her Majesty's father, the Duke of Kent, resided, is among the things that were but are not. The Duke was also the builder of the Round Church on Brunswick St. A nice drive is along the road by the head of the Arm along the shores of the lakes from which Halifax draws its water supply, out to a cosy little roadside house kept by Mr. Wilson, where you can get a first-class meal and enjoy a row on the lake close to his house. This is a favorite resort, as it is retired, quiet and free from bibulous rowdies.

The Parliament building occupies a square, enclosed by Granville, Prince, Hollis and George streets. It is built of brown stone, was commenced in 1811 and finished in 1819. In the north part of the building the House of Assembly is located, and in the south part is the Legislative Council Chamber, in which are some very fine portraits of distinguished individuals, notably that of Nova Scotia's famous humorist, "Sam Slick." Parties desirous of visiting the building can obtain permission from the Librarian.

The Provincial Building, which contains the Post Office, Custom House and Provincial Museum, is on Hollis St. It is built of freestone, 140 by 70 in area, and cost $\$ 120,000$. The west half of the building is occupied by the Post Office department, and the other side by the Customs, Inland Revrque and Finance offices. The Museum is on the third flat. The collections are varied and well arranged. It is opened daily from 10 tó 1 o'clock, and from 2 to 4 . On Saturdays from 10 to 1 only.

The Government House, near St. Matthew's church, on Pleasant street, is the official residence of His Hon. Lieut.Governor Richey. It is painfully plain with projecting wings.
Old St. Paul's cemetery is located opposite Government House. Here rest in silence many of the first settlers of Halifax. A handsome monument is erected to the memory of two of Nova Scotia's heroes, Welsford and Parker, who were killed in the Crimean war.
The Court House erected in 1860 is a fine structure, built of freestone. It is stuated on the south side of Spring Garden Road, near \%. Mary's Cathedral. The County Jail is in the rear of the Court House. The Supreme, Vice-Admiralty, Equity, Divorce, County and Probate Courts, are all held here. The Prothonotary, Clerk of the Peace, Registrar of Deeds, and County Treasurer, have offices on the first floor. The High Sheriff has an office on the second floor. The Law Library, containing a large collection of ancient and quaint old law books, is also on this floor.
The R. C. Cathedral of St. Mary's is on Spring Garden Road, near Pleasant Street. The original building was improved some years ago by the addition of an elegant granite facade and spire, in florid gothic architecture. Archbishop O'Brien resides in the house adjoining, on the corner of Spring Garden Road and Pleasant Street.

The Academy of Music, on Pleasant Street, facing Spring Garden Road, in its auditorium and stage appointments is second to none in Canada. Mr. I. B. Ciarke is the lessee, and the citizens of Halifax are indebted to him for many musical and dramatic treats.
The Orpheus Club Hall, (formerly a Baptist Church,) on Granville Street, is a cosy little hall, and owned by the Orpheus Club, which is composed of the best amateurs of
the city.

The Lyceum, on Starr Street, is a place of amusement, but not considered tony enough for the blue blooded dudes to patronize. A good dime show can draw here like a plaster.

The Salvation Army, which cannot perhaps be properly classed under the head of amusements; has its headquarters in the old Reform Club Hall, corner of Brunswick and Duke Streets. There they make the night melodious with their peculiar variety performances, and think they are doing God service.

The Church Army meet in Trinity Church, corner of Jacob Street and Popular Grove.

The Halifax Club has an elegant house on Hollis Street. It is fitted up in first class style, and only the creme de la creme have an entre to its aristocratic rooms.

The young swells who find the Halifax "too rich for their blood," have one of their own called the City Club. It is located on Barrington Street, near Sackville. Here in insouciant ease they can laugh to scorn a beastly License Act, and solve the mysteries of the relative values of "a flush" and "four of a kind."

The Old Ladies' Home on Gottingen street, was erected last year. It is fitted up to meet the requirements of the poor old ladies who will spend the balance of their days there.

The R. C. Orphanage is located on Brunswick street, and the Protestant Home is on Lockman street. St. Paul's Alms House of Industry, for poor Church of England children, is on Tower road.

The Y. M. C. A. Building is a plain but substantial building on corner of Granville and Prince streets. It has a spacious Reading Room which contains a great variety of papers and magazines. Strangers are always made welcome by Mir. Theakston, the Secretary.

nice place to spend leisure time. Here, also, strangers are kindly treated.

The Masonic Hall, on the corner of Salter and Granville streets, is a fine looking building and centrally located. Its architecture is Italian with Mansard roof. There is a cupola on the dome from the apex of which rises a gilded vane. It is built of brick and is covered with mastic. It is tastefully fitted up inside and it is a building of which the craft should feel proud.

The High School, corner of Brunswick and Sackville streets, is a fine building and a credit to the city.

The Citizens' Free Library is in Argyle Hall, Argyle street. Open from 12 to $6 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. ; Saturdays, from 6.30 to 8.30 p. m.

Halifax is sadly deficient in market accommodation. It seems comical to a stranger to see the streets surrounding the Post Office littered up with "come" groen grocers and loads of hay. The coal pedlar with his dismal monotonous cry of "C-o-a-1!" or "Oh! oh!" or whatever it is, is enough to give one the "jigs." Another relic of antiquity is the wheezy old tin horns blown by newspaper vendors.

The new City Hall, now being erected by Mr. A. E. Milligan on the site lately occupied by Dalhousie college on the Parade ground, will be a splendid specimen of architecture and will be an ornament and eredit to the city. Mr. Milligan is also building the new Dalhousie college out on College Place, which when completed will be one of the finest buildings in the Province.

The large brick building with a tall chimney, down by the water north of the Dockyard, is the Nova Scotia Sugar Refinery. A branch of the railway runs down by the Dockyard wall and terminates at the long wharves and Grain Nhevator at the south of the Dockyard. Here the ocean mail steamers land mails and passengers directly into the rail cars.

The horse railroad cars run from Richmond, where the stables are situated, through the principal strects south to corner of Inglis and South Park streets. Particulars of routes and fares are given in another part of the book. Office on Prince street next to Chronicle office.

The Western Union Telegraph Office is on Hollis street, near the Halifax Club. Rates given elsewhere. The Telephone office is in the Hesslein Building, next Queen Hotel. Non-subscribers can send messages from central office on payment of 10 cents, to any part of city; 15 cents to Bedford or Waverly, and 25 cents to Windsor, Newport and Hantsport.

The Police Station, on Bedford Row, is a dismal, dingylooking building. The Court is presided over by Robert Motton, Esq., who dispenses justice with a smiling face to the "simple drunks" who get "half seas over" in spite of an absurd license law which seys no liquor can be bought by the glass. Stringent laws of this kind fail to carry out the desired end. Our wise-acre lawmakers will find this out to their sorrow.

Halifax tenaciously clings to, and sacredly venerates, its ancient institutions and landmarks, as evidenced by the "cribbed, cabined and confined" old building in which Judge Motton is compelled to inhale sweet aromas. It is certainly not a "thing of beauty." But, notwithstanding the cries of croakers, Halifax is arousing from its Rip Van Winklish state, and with improved hotels, such as the Halifax and Queen, Electric Light, Dry Dock, Grain Elevator, Horse Railroad, New City Hall, and other improvements, shows she is bound to keep pace with the times. We don't like to find fault unnecessarily, but would merely suggest, in closing, that if some energetic city father would inaugurate a street reform in the improvement of̂ sidewaliks and put down asphait instead of the patehwork crazy-quilt combination of broken stone, wornout brick and
