The woman who committed the outage gave her name as Mrs. Wood. e belongs to the group of militants called "the wild women." Armed with a butcher's cleaver, Mrs. Wood ap. proached the painting in a casual manner. Opportunity offering she uddenly dashed forward, produ.ed the cleaver from under her cloak and was succesful in slashing it a num per of times before bystanders seized and stopped her.

Mrs. Wood was accompanied by a nan who attempted to impede tthose ersons who restrained her. Spectaors of the incident turned on him and gave him a good beating with heir fists. When the police appeared on the scene Mrs. Wood was anded over to them.
