Next Tuesday will be St. Patrick's day.

Prof. Tuck's railway photo. car arrived in Wolfville by the noon freight train on Tuesday.

The weather this week has been decidedly spring-like and from present indications an early spring is assured.

The new Congregationalist church at Kingsport is to be formally opened for public worship on Sunday next.

Mr. J. A. Anlow, of the "Hants Journal," Windsor, spent last Sunday in Wolfville, the guest of C. W. Roscoe, Esq.

Mr. J. D. Chambers left on Monday for his new home at Yarmouth. The best wishes of his many friends here go with him.

Rev. Mr. Denovan is expected to preach in the Presbyterian church next Sunday afternoon, in the absence of the pastor, Rev. Mr. Ross.

The regular monthly communication of St. George's Lodge, A. F. & A. M., will be held this evening. Business, election of officers for ensuing year.

The work of erecting the building at Kingsport Station for the proposed milk condensing factory will be begun at once. Mr. Carleton Nelly, of Kingsport, has the contract.

Mr. R. Pratt is about to add an addition 30 feet long to his store for a store-house, with a view of increasing his business. The work will begin at once and will be rapidly pushed forward.

The steamer Yarmouth, of the Yarmouth line, is again on the route, having been thoroughly refitted during the winter. The Boston will lay up until the missing link is completed.

We understand that it was contemplated to fix the meeting for the 20th inst, but as this would be the eve of the Easter holidays it was thought that there would be no loss of time in deferring the meeting for another week.

He preached on Sunday evening last in the Baptist church to a large and attentive audience. Mr. Daley, of the Senior class, supplied for Mr. Gates in St. John last Sunday.

On Sunday evening last Rev. Dr. Higgins, assisted by Rev. E. M. Keirsteal, administered baptism to seventeen candidates in the Baptist church.

The religious statistics of the miners killed at Springhill are given as follows: Presbyterian, 44; Episcopalian, 28; Roman Catholic, 24; Methodist, 19; Baptist, 2. Remainder unknown.

The directors, managers and employees of the Windsor & Annapolis railway have given \$379.50 to the sufferers by the late Springhill calamity. This is certainly a very good showing, and speaks well for the generosity of our railway men.

The stairway on the north side has been taken out and the shop extended across the whole building, which is twenty-five feet wide. The front will be fitted with large plate glass windows. A new hardwood floor has been put down, and the ceiling covered with matched sheathing. In the rear left hand corner is an elegant hardwood staircase leading to the upper stories, and a small apartment to be fitted up for an office. The shelves and counters are being placed in position, and the new store will be ready for business in a few weeks. This will make another fine store on Main street. "AND THEY HAD NO HELPER." There is a society in Wolfville professing for the prevention of cruelty. In other parts of the world there are humane organizations specially for the protection of the lower animals: but Wolfville left of the "A," so as to devote all her strength to protecting—who? in a peculiar fashion as we shall see—men, women and children, and leaves the "Animals" to look after themselves. This our humble friends cannot always do, because there, not enough liberty accorded them to allow of it, as we shall see from the following: On Wednesday last a team of two fine horses, one of which reminded me of "Black Beauty," their cruel owner to stand fastened from early in the afternoon till the evening without food or rest on one of our village run-sellers, drunkard-making inn, the owner meanwhile being very comfortable and happy (?) inside, guzzling the life, maddening, poisoned stuff there in secrecy retailed. But it has not transpired that any member of the S. P. C. A. interfered or even took the trouble to see the poor horses. Yet the eyes of the horses were not so dull, for in the most expressive and imploring manner they besought any that came near them to furnish food and shelter or at least give them their liberty to go home. As before intimated our Wolfville humane society did nothing for the horses, and I think I can say with certainty that the Temperance society of the village did as little for the owner. And yet the rumseller and the proprietor of the horses were in danger, tho' they were not aware of it for just about the time that the horses were released, one of the inhabitants of the village, not a member of the S. P. C. A., and not belonging to a Temperance society was taking measures to have the law-breakers looked after. The release and departure of the horses stopped the proceedings that were contemplated. Query, what are these humane societies for, except to hold annual meetings?

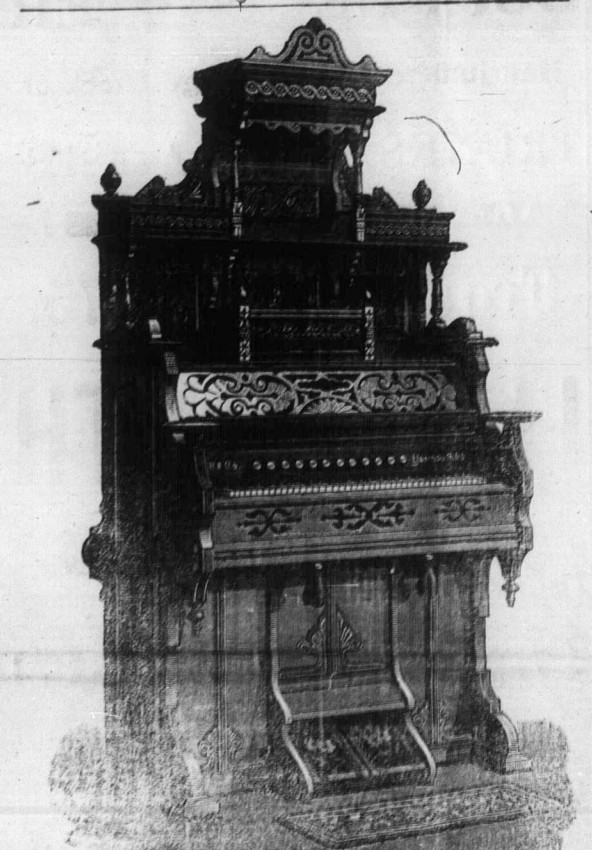
