Hon. Mr. ANDERSON: Perhaps cutting down and burning off the timber will be the worst feature I see in the bill...

Hon. Mr. GORDON: I think his honor has just spoken in quite right. There should be some restriction to prevent parties from committing waste by cutting down and selling more timber than they would require...

Hon. Mr. PALMER: I concur in the opinion expressed, that there should be some restraint imposed to prevent parties from committing waste...
