Eastern Ontario Dairy-men's Convention. A Variety of Interesting Subjects Discussed. BROCKVILLE, Feb. 28.—The following is a list of the proceedings of the Eastern Ontario Dairy-men's Convention at yesterday's evening session.

Prof. WATZBERG, of Boston, Mass., delivered an address on the adulteration of milk and cheese and its effect upon dairy husbandry. The address was listened to throughout with the keenest interest...
