

SOLIGNUM.

A Remarkable Test! Locally made by Messrs. W. & G. RENDELL.

To test Solignum as a preservative for Wood against the attacks of Worms, we tried a piece of 2 x 4 Spruce, about two feet in length, by painting one-third with Solignum, leaving the balance clear wood, this we suspended by a wire through the centre, in the water about one foot from the bottom, immediately over a pile of stones the remains of a sunken wharf (which is the place where our Wharf Shores are eaten off first) for Three Months. On taking it up at the end of that time we found some half-dozen small holes only a very short distance in the clear part of the wood, which shows the liquid had penetrated through the whole piece and the worms had hardly begun boring before coming in contact with it.

Last year as a test of some brands of Copper Paint we handle, we had a similar piece of wood treated at both ends, leaving the centre third clear; this was in exactly the same place as the piece for the Solignum test for Three Months and Three Days, when taken up the painted ends were perfect but the centre was riddled with worm holes.



I was introduced to Miss Grimes at table.







Household Notes.

Matches can be made waterproof by
 dipping them in very hot melted par-
 affine.

 A delicious sandwich is made of
 brown bread, cut very thin, and

 Some housekeepers prefer a piece
 of ordinary screening to all else for
 cleaning a flat iron.
 A luxury in the shape of a hot-
 water bag is the one which comes
 provided with a silk cover.
 Before putting away a plush gar-
 ment it is well to clean it by sponging
 it over with gasoline.
 The chantecler has invaded the
 kitchen; the cookie cutters in the
 shape of roosters are available.
 To remove a scar make an ointment
 of 40 grains of boric acid and one

U. S. Fisheries.

Interesting information regarding the fisheries of the United States has been gathered and collected by the U. S. Census Bureau.

"Cod ranked third in value of the fishery products in 1908, reaching \$2,903,000, of which the Atlantic furnished 93 per cent., and the Pacific Coast 7 per cent."

The value of the crab fishery in 1908 was the largest on record and was worth \$938,000.

Flourishers, excluding turbot, were valued at \$588,000. 1908 holds the record for quantity.

"The catch of hake, often called 'boneless fish' was in value \$464,000 in 1908, a record year. Massachusetts and Maine furnished all but 1 per cent of the total.

In 1908 the main catch of halibut was taken on Pacific Coast, principally from Washington. The Atlantic catch has greatly decreased in quantity.

"The herring catch in 1908 amounted in value to \$796,000, a considerable increase over previous years, 96 per cent was taken by Maine and Massachusetts fishermen.

Lake herring or cisco were worth \$989,000 in 1908 and came principally from Lake Michigan and Lake Erie. Lake trout, principally from Lake Superior, fetched \$800,000.

The lobster fishery was worth \$1,931,000. Maine furnished 66 per cent. of this. Mackerel fetched \$848,000, of which Massachusetts reported 90 per cent.

Mullet was worth \$908,000, Florida contributing 70 per cent.

Mussels form an important fishery, mostly the fresh water variety which

are taken primarily for the shells and pearls. The salt water variety were worth \$12,000, but the fresh water variety ran up to \$682,000.

The oyster fishery ranks an easy first and was worth \$15,713,000 in 1908.

Pollock brought \$408,000. The sounds are made into glue, the livers into oil and the tongues are sold fresh.

Salmon was valued at \$14,018,000. Nearly \$11,000,000 came from Alaska and the rest from the Pacific coast of the States.

Shad fetched over \$2,000,000. Shrimps \$494,000. Snappers \$651,000. Weakfish \$1,775,000. Sturgeon, \$228,000. Whaling \$497,000. Whitefish \$524,000.

A Filthy Place.

The immediate attention of the Health Inspector is drawn to the insanitary condition of the public lavatory in Woods' dock. No words in the English language are strong enough to describe the filth of this place. There are about 100 men working fitting out fishing boats close to this standing menace to health, and about 50 feet west Clouston's fresh fish factory is in operation. This place should be attended to immediately.

MARINE NOTES.

The Maggie B., Skipper Brazil, arrived from Renew's last night. The crew report fish scarce there in traps.

The schr. Carrie E. is being fitted up at Bishop's wharf for Redman's herring fishery in S. W. Arm.

The boat Maggie, Capt. Parsons, arrived at Pernambuco yesterday after a run of 36 days.

The Florizel left New York at 11 a.m. Saturday and is due here Thursday.

The s.s. Almeriana arrived here from Halifax at 9 a.m. to-day after a run of 33 hours. She brought 150 tons cargo and a few passengers, including Mr. M. Power, of Jas. Baird, Ltd. She had fine weather on the run here.

ETHEL SAILED.—The Ethel sailed from Monro's this morning for Halifax with 2,550 qts. of fish. Capt. Norman Herald is in charge.

INLAND FISHING.—R. Beal, a tourist staying at Tompkins Hotel, caught a ten pound salmon on Saturday at Rendell's Pool. Greg. White is his guide.

CAPT. DELANEY RECOVERED.—Capt. P. Delaney was able to get down to his office this morning. His many friends will be glad to know that he is all right again.

WENT TO CAPE BROYLE.—W. D. Reid, by auto this afternoon for Cape Broyle. He will inspect the railway work between St. John's and Bay Bulls Big Pond before returning.

THE STEPHANO LEFT.—The new Red Cross Liner Stephano left Liverpool Saturday for New York in charge of Capt. Clarke, and on arrival will immediately take up the New York, Halifax and St. John's service.

Sullivan, last evening to the effect that Russian pedler named Aaron Siddell, aged 23 years, had been found hanging in a stable at Upper Island Cove yesterday morning. The circumstances point to suicide. A doctor examined the body and pronounced death due to strangulation. There were no external marks on the body. He had ninety odd dollars in cash on him, and this sum with his effects is in the hands of the police. Messrs. I. F. Perlin & Co. received a telegram from Harbor Grace this morning in connection with the suicide from the police authorities there, asking for his advice about the disposal of the body. Siddell boarded at the house of Mr. Clarke and went to bed Saturday night in his usual good condition. Sunday morning not finding him in his room, Mr. Clarke and his family went to the stable and found him suspended, dead. A piece of horse's trace had been tied around his neck. He was about 22 years of age and Mr. Perlin thinks he was born in Russia. He arrived in the country about two years ago, and was in the city about six weeks ago. Mr. Perlin said that he was a very quiet young fellow and had no financial troubles. He is at a loss to understand why he should do this rash act. The Messrs. Cohen on Bell Island are friends of his and came from the same town in Russia. It is likely that they will take charge of the body.

The Late Alfred

J. Tuckwell.

George Prowse, the Judge's eldest son, who was summoned to Winnipeg about the Banatone School, to which he has been appointed Headmaster, and also about the Provincial Board for the examination of teachers, for which he is a member, sends a long obituary notice of Alfred J. Tuckwell, a younger son of Rev. Henry Tuckwell, master of Bishop Field's School, St. John's, and Curate of the Cathedral. Native of England.

BERLIN, June 11.
Germany's aggressive attitude in connection with the Moroccan situation is manifested in a plainly worded official announcement in the North German Gazette, that the Empire would consider itself released from the obligations of the Algeiras agreement, and would assume full liberty of action in case of the occupation of Fez by the French. This pronouncement has been received with great coldness in two unexpected quarters, Austro-Hungary and Russia, both nations having given unmistakable intimations that they will not countenance any attempts to embarrass France in her present activity. The attitude of Austria is particularly unwelcome and surprising, because of the supposed indebtedness of Austria for German support in the Bosman crisis. The German patriotic press is commenting bitterly on Austrian perfidiousness, without being able to urge away the facts, which will deeply affect Germany's future policy.

FISHERY PROSPECTS BRIGHT.
—Mr. Ellisha Button, who arrived here from New Melbourn on Saturday, reports that the fishery prospects at that locality are very bright. Mr. Button, who is here selecting goods for his firm, is looking well after the winter; he will be leaving for home to-morrow.

A DANGEROUS CUSTOMER.—For several days past a large iceberg has been aground just off the Narrows, and a dangerous customer it should be for vessels making port in thick fog. Large sections of it fell off Saturday and there was a string of broken ice left out in the bay, which it was feared would damage nets.

A REMARKABLE OCCURRENCE.
—A report relating to a very remarkable case comes from Spaniard's Bay. It is to the effect that an old man named Jewer, aged 88 years, who had been blind for six years past, was suddenly returned to sight from some unknown cause. We give the rumor for what it is worth, but if the incident is correct it goes to show that the age of miracles is not past.

Smith's Strange Story.

PAID FOR MEALS FOR HIMSELF AND GUESTS ON TRAIN.

Henry J. Smith, who arrived here on Thursday's express, had but two cents left in his pockets when he arrived at the station in this city. He lost his cap shortly after leaving Port aux Basques, and was supplied with a hat by the police after reaching this city. In conversation with passengers who came on the train with him, Smith said that he was hired at Akron, Ohio, by a man who gave him the name of E. M. Rice. Smith also says that he worked in Akron for the Harrison Engineering Co. and received a salary of \$36 a week and expenses. Rice, he says, offered him \$40 per week and expenses to come to Newfoundland to erect presses and install machinery for a pulp mill in which Rice was interested. On the 25th May he received a letter at Akron enclosing a through ticket to St. John's, and the letter specified the terms under which he was employed by Rice. He says that Rice had been corresponding with him for some time from one place and another before he (Smith) agreed to accept his terms. He describes Rice as a man of about 35 years of age, about 5 ft. 10 in. in height, of dark complexion with dark mustache trimmed straight across, with drawn features and wearing dark brown clothes, tanned shoes and a quiff hat with a dark band. On receipt of the ticket he took the train at Akron, proceeded to New York, thence to Springfield, Mass., where he remained for two days; then proceeded to Boston and met Rice there and had a controversy with him as to sending him a second instead of a first class ticket. Rice, he says, claimed that this was a mistake on the part of the ticket agent, and the matter was amicably adjusted. He says that Rice also refused to give him a return ticket, which he asked for, so that he might return if the work he was hired for was not up to his expectations. He says that he drew from the bank in Boston \$179 and then came along with Rice, and on arrival there he and Rice went to Sydney Mines, but for what purpose he refused to state. While at Sydney they put up at the King Edward Hotel. After coming on the Invermora though he travelled second class from Port aux Basques, he took his meals in the diner and on several occasions in coming over the line he invited guests to dine and breakfast with him, seemed to be well supplied with money and paid for his own and his guests' meals. A young woman has supper with him and another breakfast in the dining car. These meals were elaborate and consisted of poultry and the best viands enumerated on the menu cards. He paid for these without hesitation and undoubtedly had considerable money in his possession. The fact that he arrived here with only two cents left on him would seem to give color to the assertion that he was relieved of his funds. He was seen to be the possessor of considerable money when he paid for the sleeper on the train. He was heard to say on the train also that he paid \$10 for the going he wore. He said also that the old apparel in his valise constituted his working clothes. He also told some of the passengers on the train that he acted for a while in the capacity of a private detective, especially in connection with the divorce case of Lewis and Evans. His father and mother, he says, are alive and live at Malden, Mass., and the police will likely have the Boston police communicate with them. Smith was respectfully dressed, and from the technical manner in which he speaks he seems to be a mechanical engineer. Another peculiarity about Rice, he says, is in the fact that he has a gold filled tooth on either side of his mouth. Both train bands and passengers who saw him do so, say that a

man answering to the description of Rice given by Smith got off the train at Whitbourne, and at least one lady on the train knew him and made the remark that he was a "bad egg." This man gave out that he had been left the country since he was 6 years old and came to see his father. When Smith last spoke to Rice they were at breakfast, so Smith says, just before they arrived at Whitbourne. If Rice is not a mythical personage, then it seems strange that he should pay for his own and Smith's passages through from Akron, Ohio, to rob him of \$150. The game would not be worth the candle. Again, it would hardly be probable if Smith was trying to escape the consequences of some criminal act abroad that he should put himself in communication with the police here. He tells a straight story, seemingly, and did not deviate anything under a rigid cross-examination on the part of the police here. His action in shamming sickness here Friday morning is strange, and the circumstances surrounding the case seem to be complex and mysterious.







Episcopal Dispensation

The following Episcopal Dispensation was promulgated in the Anglican churches of the city during Divine service yesterday:—

"I desire to intimate to the clergy and laity of the Diocese that inasmuch as the Coronation festivities are likely to be held in the city of St. John's and other places not only upon Thursday, June 22nd, the day of the Coronation, but also upon Friday, the 23rd, which in the Prayer Book is ordered to be observed as a day of fasting or abstinence, and is also the Eve or Vigil before St. John the Baptist Day—so far as any power of the kind is vested in me, in virtue of my office as Bishop of the Diocese, I hereby relieve the members of the Church in the Diocese from any obligation which such order imposes upon them, so that they may share in the festivities appointed for Friday, the 23rd, without considering that they are thereby infringing the rules of the Church. Maria Montessori Rediscovered

The Ten Fingers.

(Josephine Tozier, in McClure's Magazine, New York.)
At the very root of Maria Montessori's method lies what may be called the rediscovery of the ten fingers. Put on the track by Seguin, who realized that the sense of touch, the basis of all the other senses, was the great interpreter of vision and guide to accuracy of perception. It was at the same time the earliest developed of our faculties and the first to be dulled if left uncultivated. She found that the finger-tips of young children are almost unbelievably sensitive, but that, in the absence of careful training, they begin to lose this sensitiveness after the age of 6. The first step in her method, then, is to teach children to "see with their fingers," and thus to cultivate a delicately sensitive muscular memory. Not only is this a desirable end in itself, but it has the further advantage of minimizing the strain placed by ordinary methods of education upon the eyes, and consequently upon the brain. By the cultivation of the sense of touch, reflex actions are set up in inferior nerve centres with which the brain has little or no concern. One of Maria Montessori's chief objections to some of the most popular kindergarten employments is that they involve a harmful effort of the organs most closely associated with the brain—the eyes.

No sooner has a child entered the school than the education of his or her sense of touch begins.
