





Reid Nfld. Company. "The Council regret that they canno give like praise to the Reid Newfound land Company for the manner in which they have conducted their business during the past year. The local trains have arrived late, and in som instances have been despatched from one to three hours after their schedule time of departure. It has been impossible to obtain prompt supplies of cars for carloads of goods. Shippers in St. John's have been much hampered by the delayed delivery of their shipments. 




