





Hasten Slowly.

The Board of Trade at its annual meeting yesterday acted wisely in walking warily in the matter of Customs bonds. Instead of passing the resolution which was embodied in the report, they decided to instruct the Council to go over the matter again carefully, and consider it in all its bearings. There are undoubtedly abuses to be remedied, but it is unwise to create a greater evil in the course of remedying an existing one. This action of the Board was brought about largely by the testimony of Mr. E. M. Jackman, who gave the members the result of what he had experienced and learned as Minister of Finance and Customs of the Colony during some nine years. Most of those most anxious in moving for the original resolution, after they had heard his speech, were desirous to re-commit the resolution to the new Council to consider the whole case again.

Board of Trade Annual Meeting.

The annual meeting of the Board of Trade took place at the Rooms, Water Street, last evening. There was a large attendance. Hon. W. C. Job, the President, having taken the chair, Mr. G. C. Fearn, the Hon. Secretary, was called on to read the Report for the year just closed. The report will be found in another column of this issue.

It is an interesting and cleverly compiled document and well worth perusal. The accounts for the year also laid on the table showed an expenditure of \$3,880. There was a small balance to credit after all bills had been paid.

Mr. W. C. Job, the President, then arose and made a graceful speech in which he praised the Secretary warmly for the splendid service he had done the Board of Trade the past year in giving his time and talents for nothing. Mr. Fearn would not even accept an address from the members of the Council. Mr. Job then proposed a vote of thanks to Mr. Fearn. This was seconded by Mr. W. G. Gosling and carried by acclamation.

Mr. A. F. Goodridge endorsed what Mr. Gosling had said in praise of Mr. Fearn and his work and moved that the Report be adopted. Mr. Fred Moore had seconded the motion when Mayor Ellis arose and made a strong protest against the passing of that section in the Report referring to the City Council. It was, he said, misleading and intended to convey the idea that the laws were not carried out. He concluded his remarks by asking that his name be taken from the sub-committee.

Mr. W. G. Gosling, Chairman of the Committee, said that he himself was responsible for the Report, and now wished to assure Mayor Ellis that no reflection on the City Council was intended.

Hon. John Harvey expressed the opinion that the section under discussion was unfortunate, to say the least, and he suggested that it be passed over without further discussion. All recognized the difficulties that the Councilors had to contend with. He did not believe that any reflection was intended.


The clause in the Report referring to the abolition of the system of passing duties by Bonds was attacked valiantly by Mr. E. M. Jackman. He said that the Council had no right to make such a recommendation which aimed at destroying the rights of membership. It was also a move against the general public welfare, and a very large sum in interest would be lost to the Colony. Having had nine years experience of the Custom House as Finance Minister he was in a position to say that while during all that time several millions had been collected under Bonds system not a dollar had been lost. A public instrument of credit that facilitated and increased the trade of the Colony was now to be destroyed at one blow.

The election of officers followed Mr. Jackman's speech. Hon. R. Watson and Mr. A. Pindlater acting as Secretaries.

The officers for 1912 are:—President, W. G. Gosling, Esq.; Vice-President, M. G. Waters; Asst. Vice-President, G. C. Fearn. The Council was made up by the election of Hon. W. C. Job, A. F. Goodridge, E. M. Jackman, Hon. John Anderson, R. G. Rendell and G. J. Carter.

After the election the debate on Mr. Jackman's protest against the abolition of the Bond system. Mr. Fearn and Mr. J. Browning spoke in favor of the abolition which they contended put the Government in the position of a lender which was properly the province of the Banks or of individuals. Admitting that these refused to lend money had the Government any justification in doing so? Besides it put the Government into a position where they could not possibly help discriminating.

Messrs. Jackman, Harvey and Anderson put up strong arguments on the other side and showed that the Bond system was as much in the interest of the Government and the general trade of the country as it was for the individual. The debate grew very ardent and was brought to a close by Hon. J. Harvey proposing and Hon. John Anderson seconding a resolution that the new Council be instructed to consider the paragraph relating to Bonds. This was carried and the meeting closed.

The exports to Brazil up to the end of November was 41,812 quintals, excess of last year, and to 11,548 quintals in excess, while other all other countries have more fish at higher prices than last year. The prices which have been reached since a figure of freight and the import duties by foreign countries are added make the price almost prohibitive.

Board of Trade Report for 1911.

At the third annual meeting yesterday, the Secretary, Mr. Fearn, read the report for 1911, the features of which we have summarized. The report opens with congratulatory references to the Coronation and the Jubilee, and proceeds to give a review of the Festival of Empire held last summer in London, and of the Newfoundland exhibits at the Crystal Palace.

As to trade conditions, the spirit of unrest in Spain and Portugal had been disquieting to shippers of fish, but happily it had now abated. "So serious was the position in Spain that the Trade Commissioner for Newfoundland, then residing at Alicante, wrote saying that cables which had been sent to his former address at Malaga had been delayed in transmission to him three or four days, or longer, because the wires had been cut, and in the whole of Spain there was not one spot quiet excepting Alicante."

"The cholera in Italy at one time threatened to assume very grave proportions, and this was another cause for anxiety to our merchants; but above all these, was the unfortunate misunderstanding between Germany, on one side, and France and Great Britain on the other, which threatened to break out in a war of gigantic proportions at any moment."

Fortunately these perils, which would have meant more or less ruin to the Colony, have passed, and prosperity prevails in the Colony.

With these conditions, the short catch in Nova Scotia brought about boisterous weather and large numbers of dog fish, the failure of our own squid voyage to realize even an ordinary voyage, and the purchase of green fish by Gloucester firms, as well as the short supplies of French fish, have all contributed to create a demand for Newfoundland fish, which was much in excess of the supply, resulting in a rapid and almost unheard of advance in prices; the consequence of which was a brisk and satisfactory fall trade and the payment of fishery accounts to a previously unequalled extent.

Owing to the defeat of Reciprocity in Canada, that issue is no longer a live question.

The French Catch and Labrador.
The failure of the French to deliver the fish contracted for owing to the shortness of catch (the exports from St. Pierre from the 1st January to the 31st October, 1911, being less than that of the same period of 1910 by about 20,000 quintals of dry and about 135,000 quintals green), as well as the inferior quality of their last season's make, enabled the shippers of Labrador to realize their cargoes without loss, and although the market threatened on several occasions to break, it is pleasing to know that although the profits realized from shipments of this grade of fish have been small, yet no actual losses have occurred."

With a small outfit, the Labrador catch was 150,000 quintals greater than last year, while the price paid advanced from 50c. to 70c. per quintal.

The Shore and Bank fisheries are expected to yield 40,000 to 50,000 quintals more than last season.

Brazil.
"The exports to Brazil up to the end of November was 41,815 quintals in excess of last year, and to Italy, 25,548 quintals in excess, whilst Spain and all other countries have taken more fish at higher prices than last year. The prices which have prevailed for this article have been unprecedentedly high, and indeed they have reached such a figure (when freight and the import duties imposed by foreign countries are added) as to make the price almost prohibitive to

a large proportion of the consumers abroad."

Lobsters.
The number of lobsters used now per case averages fully 100 less than it did three years ago. While the catch has been larger by 4,912 cases than last year, the prices realized by the packers have also been better to the extent of \$1.50 to \$3.00 per case, mainly owing to the brisk demand created by the Coronation festivities in England."

Canned Salmon.
"Owing to the numerous complaints which were made of the quality of salmon, the Council made representations to the Government on the matter, and requested them to place the canning of salmon under the same rules and regulations as the canning of lobsters. This they are pleased to say the Government has done."

Whaling.
"The whales caught this year are 337 as against 354 last year, and about 500 for 1909. The yield of oil is about 8,237 barrels this year against 10,420 last year, and the yield of guano 445 tons against 618 tons; the total value of this year's product being estimated at \$145,000.00."

Sealing, Etc.
The sealfishery was a successful one, but the young seals were unusually small, yield less oil, and inferior at that. The skins were small and realized less. The increasing of the crews from 203 to 270 did not meet with the approval of most of the owners, and their general opinion is that it is inadvisable to continue this increase.

"Cod oil has reached an extremely high figure, owing to the short supply in 1910, followed by a still shorter supply of 1911."

"The prices obtained for herrings have been much in excess of the previous year."

"Cod liver oil has been produced to some extent and is thought to be unremunerative."

"The crop of berries this year is very small."

Labrador Banks.
"The Council has called the attention of the Government to the desirability of at once making a thorough survey of the Labrador coasts, and banks, as they believe that, as a result of such a survey, the extent of the fisheries of Newfoundland would be largely augmented."

Squid.
"The reports of squid for food purposes did not result satisfactorily. There is unquestionably a good demand for this article in foreign markets at fair prices, but it would seem that before the cure of squid for food purposes can be carried out in a systematic manner, the Government would have to legislate so as to permit of their being caught for food purposes (exclusively) by net, trap or seine."

The Council recommended the appointment of a pisciculturist, and endorses the employment of Mr. Simonsen, the cod liver oil expert.

Inspection.
"The inspection of fish in casks for export, which was established by the Board of Trade last year, has given considerable satisfaction, and the Council have found it necessary to engage a second Inspector in the person of Mr. N. Callahan for the busy season, to help Mr. Thos. Mundy in his duties. It is pleasing to note that the inspected fish has almost invariably given satisfaction to the buyers, while in many instances shipments have been bought on the stipulation that the fish should be inspected by the Board of Trade, so that there is

no doubt that the inspection is being recognized as of great value."

Cullers.
"That it is of great advantage to the Trade cannot be doubted, as the Cullers employed in selecting fish for the respective foreign markets are thereby educated in these matters, and are so enabled to successfully deal with fish when being landed from crafts."

Reference has already been made to the efforts which the Council successfully made to have all cullers employed licensed. The Council believe that this should be done in a most thorough manner, so far as the law provides, in order to guarantee fair play between all parties concerned in the sale and purchase of fish."

Reference is also made to the efforts made by the Council to get Newfoundland fish admitted into Portugal on terms as favourable as fish from other countries.

Regret is expressed at the inability of the Council to obtain reliable fishery statistics, such as are published in Norway and France. The United Fisheries Company of America, formed by Messrs. Trefethen and Lord expect to operate soon.

Cure of Fish.
"The Council deplores deficiency in the cure. The foreign markets have been clamouring during the whole of the season for Prime Merchantable Fish which the merchants have found it impossible to supply. That the method of buying fish (salmon) has much to do with the decline in the good cure of fish, cannot be questioned, since it does not differentiate between the fish which is of good quality, the result of great care and labor, and that which is indifferently attended to. It seems as if some drastic measure were necessary, not only to enable the man who cures his fish well to obtain adequate remuneration for his labour, but also for the sake of the Colony's welfare, and apart from the suggestions above mentioned, it would seem that a system of inspection to be established throughout the Colony by the Government (the carrying out of which should be delegated to some independent body entirely outside the pale of political influence) might achieve the result, and so improve the prices of fish, benefiting at once the fisherman, the Colony and the consumer."

Bait.
"The Council are of opinion that the catch of fish might be largely augmented if proper supplies of bait, in the shape of frozen squid, could be obtained, and so have for some time past been making enquiries into the matter with the object of reporting to the Government thereon, and, if possible, inducing them to take up a comprehensive scheme, which would be calculated to furnish a supply of bait at such points as it might be required. The opposition which was shown by the fishermen proceeding to Labrador to travelling has entirely disappeared by reason of the experience they have had with this method of fishing on that Coast."

Trade Commissioners.
"Certain members of the Board of Trade have, during the past two years, made successful efforts to improve the usages of trade with foreign countries. Mr. George Hawes has been at work in Spain for over two years, with the result that many abuses of the Trade have been eliminated. . . . selling

contracts, defining the rights of seller and buyer, have been put in operation."

Other members of the Board have sent Mr. Hugh LeDesarrier to Italy to work on similar lines to those of Mr. Hawes. Both these gentlemen have been appointed Trade Commissioners for Newfoundland by the Newfoundland Government. Their engagement by the Fish Exporters has made it possible to do this without expense to the Colony, and they are there always on the alert to look after the Colony's special interests. Other members have appointed Signor G. T. da Fonseca-Abrujo as their special agent. . . .

The Newfoundland Agency has been established in Alicante this year with a capital of \$100,000. . . . The business of this Agency is the selling of fish and other Newfoundland products on commission. Its operation has been eminently successful this year, for it has succeeded in maintaining the market prices which would otherwise have given away. . . .

The unjust claims which were often formulated against shippers here (which individual shippers found it impossible to contest owing to the large expense and inconvenience) have been met by the formation of the Fish Exporters' Defence Association. The object of this Association is to contest every claim which on examination is thought to be unjust. . . .

Reference was also made to the inspection of herring instituted last year, which the Council considers beneficial. The Council is now considering the establishment of the inspection of cod liver oil for medicinal purposes. As to the inspection of berries, owing to the small crop only 2,229 barrels were inspected as against 5,882 barrels last year. The inspection guarantees to the buyers that each barrel contains 20 gallons of good merchantable berries, and that the package itself is suitable to carry them."

Direct Steamers.
The shipment by direct steamers to the Spanish and Italian markets has enlarged the trade, put fish 2 or 3 weeks earlier in the market, and put the fish on the market in good order. Better communication with the West Indies and Brazil would tend in the same direction and enable Newfoundland

land merchants to obtain in the West Indies the prices obtained by the Halifax men. Red Cross Line between St. John's and New York was very satisfactory to passengers, and shippers last year. But exception is taken by the importers of fruit to the trade done by some of the officers.
The Black Diamond Line steamers from Montreal to St. John's also gave good service, except at the end of the season owing to large quantities of goods being unexpectedly offered.
Reid Nfld. Company.

"The Council regret that they cannot give like praise to the Reid Newfoundland Company for the manner in which they have conducted their business during the past year. The local trains have arrived late, and in some instances have been despatched from one to three hours after their scheduled time of departure. It has been impossible to obtain prompt supplies of cars for carloads of goods. Shippers in St. John's have been much hampered by the delayed delivery of their shipments. The facilities for receiving and delivering freight at St. John's have been inadequate (during the fall months) to deal with the traffic. Passengers who ought to have arrived here at 9.15 p.m. have frequently not arrived until after midnight. Large quantities of freight have accumulated at Sydney awaiting removal by the Reid Nfld. Co. The complaints made to the Board of Trade by shippers and passengers have been quite numerous and energetic, and for these reasons the Council appointed a sub-committee to investigate the matter. The committee invited Mr. W.D. Reid, President of the Reid Newfoundland Co., to confer with them on the various matters, which invitation was accepted. Mr. Reid gave assurances to the committee that the various matters which had been brought to his notice would be remedied, particularly the late arrival of local passenger trains in St. John's, the late despatch from starting points, notably Placentia, and he stated that by an improved method of handling freight, which they had adopted, the arrival of the local trains would be much facilitated. Mr. Reid also stated, in reply to questions of the committee, that their company were increasing their rolling stock by building a box car a week, which they hoped to increase to two very soon. They were also constructing a number of engines. There can be no doubt at all but that one of the great difficulties with the Reid Newfoundland Company is the insufficiency of their rolling stock to meet the traffic which has been offered them, and it would seem as if the provisions which they have now made will also prove quite inadequate in the coming year if their business shows such an increase as it has done during the past two or three years. Mr. Reid assured the committee that the freight had now been removed from Sydney, and that there was no delay, and he hoped with the advent of the new Bruce that there would be none during the winter. Next spring there would be at least two trains a day from St. John's across country, one a freight and accommodation combined, and the other an express, which he felt confident would carry all the traffic offered, and would certainly prevent any similar delay to those which had occurred this year. The Council wish to impress upon the Reid Newfoundland Company that the matters herein referred to are of vital importance to the Trade of the Colony, and they anticipate with pleasure that the promises of Mr. Reid made to the sub-committee will be carried out to their full extent."

Marine Insurance Co.
Reference is had to the institution of the Nfld. Marine Insurance Co. Ltd., with a capital of \$150,000 and also the construction of the Marine Dock at Harbor Grace.

Bonds.
On Dec. 30th, 1910, the subject of the acceptance of four months bonds against duties was discussed, and on Jan. 21st, 1911, a letter was sent to the Premier advising their discontinuance on certain specific articles, and in view of recent events the following resolution was submitted:

RESOLVED—That it is the unanimous opinion of this meeting of the Council that the acceptance of bonds payable four months after date for Custom duties is detrimental to the general interest both of the Colony and its trade, and ought to be abolished.

The Council also recommend that the present method of registering chattel mortgages be amended to place all creditors on an equal footing. Some reference is also had to manufacture, Agriculture, Lumbering, Consumption, the importation of a powerful dredge, the mooring of schooners, the utilization of post, telephones and boats.

The sub-committee on Municipal Affairs had met. No resolutions were passed and no findings made by the Committee, but it was evident from information obtained that the condition of the town would be vastly improved if the laws at present on the Statute Book, especially in regard to water and sewerage connections and house inspection, were rigidly enforced. Convicted of Assault.

By last night's train W. T. Gilmour, the cable operator recently convicted of indecent assault at Bay Roberts, arrived in town, accompanied by Constable Sheppard, to serve out his sentence of 4 months. This was accompanied with the option of a fine of \$66. Notice of appeal has been given and the preparatory steps in that direction are being taken. The case was heard at Bay Roberts Thursday last before Judge Oke. Const. Sheppard of Bay Roberts prosecuted and Mr. W. J. Higgins, of St. John's, defended. The complainant was one Bessie Mercer, who alleged that between 6 and 7 p.m. on Friday, the 21st December, after leaving the cable office, where she had been delivering a message, she was followed by a man in his shirt sleeves, who pursued her for some distance and suddenly attempted to assault her. She screamed for help and a stranger passing at the time made her assailant depart. The stranger then saw the girl to her home. Accused absolutely denied the story, stating that at that time he was at his hotel, that he was off duty at 2 p.m. that day, and that he had no knowledge of the occurrence. The stranger referred to by complainant could not be located and the many witnesses examined were all, as to the evidence, independent of the actual occurrence. The case attracted much attention at Bay Roberts and the local feeling over the matter was naturally very intense.

Suffering From Epilepsy.

Shortly before 9 o'clock last night, a lad named Donnelly, of McParlane Street, who suffers from epilepsy, became ill on Duckworth Street, opposite the City Hall. He was found by Messrs. Coughlan, Bush and Murphy, and brought into the building where Dr. Rendell attended him. He was unconscious for quite a while and after recovering was driven to his home by cabman W. Howell.

Schooner in Danger.

The Schooner "Vendetta" arrived here from Halifax last evening after a run of 8 days, with a new spar carried on deck, 12 new dories and 6 tons of coal. The vessel left Halifax for Lousburg to load coal for Fortune Bay on the 7th inst. but could not make Lousburg and had to anchor on the coast. The vessel anchored in the vicinity of the place where the Schr. John Harvey came to grief, and was over-taken by the storms which have prevailed both here and in the provinces for the past few weeks. She had a particularly hard time of it on Thursday last in a blizzard which raged for hours and her two anchors which were out, parted at the chains and destruction seemed inevitable to all on board. By skillful seamanship, however, the vessel reached off the coast and in the weather which continued she received a hard buffeting with her anchors gone there was nothing to be done but to run her for the nearest port for shelter and she reached the narrows just before dark yesterday. When she anchored here yesterday all were delighted on reaching a haven of safety.

Special to Evening Telegram. LAWRENCE, Mass., To-Day. Riots among foreign operatives brought out the militia. Several shots were fired and a dozen operatives injured. On Friday infuriated mobs stormed the mills. The uproar was caused by reduction of wages owing to shortening of time that women and children can be employed under the new law.

Police Court.

To-day two boys up for stealing a pair of rabbits from the store of W. E. Beards. Saturday, were released under suspended sentence. Should they come again before court they will be severely dealt with.

A drunk and disorderly in the house of Mr. M. Neil was fined \$5 for 14 days.

In the Central District Court the case of F. McNamara vs. N. Walsh, Catalina, for breach of contract, occupied the attention of the court all the forenoon. Plaintiff claims \$100 damages. Plaintiff's steamer was chartered to tow defendant's schooner or Drummers' Tax to Catalina, but the vessel sailed there without the aid of the ship. Messrs. Gibbs, K.C., and Jas. Mr. Warren, who was one of the Colony's representatives at the great event, had no doubt many opportunities of observing the interesting doings of that time, and it is expected the lecture will be both interesting and instructive. Admission is free.

No report of the s.s. Invermore up to noon to-day. She was supposed to have left Port aux Basques for Placentia direct with mails and passengers (196) at 10 o'clock last night. All the expresses are cancelled. Capt. Taylor will go in the Glenoe and Arch Blandford in the Invermore.

A train arrived from Carbonear yesterday afternoon. The local also arrived from Carbonear at 2 p.m. to-day. The morning train went out at 9.45 a.m. to-day.

City Council Special Meeting

Yesterday a special meeting of the Municipal Council was held. Mr. W. R. Warren, acting on behalf of Bowring Bros., it was announced by the Mayor, would hand over Rae Island to the city to be used as a park. The matter was discussed, but before definite action was taken it was determined to hold a meeting on the matter to be participated in by Mayor Ellis and the representatives in the Legislature of St. John's East and West. Mayor Ellis also informed the meeting that Mr. Furlong, K.C., solicitor for the Reid Ntd. Co., requested that the company be relieved from their contract of levelling the snow on the streets traversed by the street cars, and that the Council do the work at a figure to be approved of by both parties to the matter. It was

Wireless Telegraphy.

Transmission Over Ten Thousand Miles. The progress of wireless telegraphy has just been marked by the installation of a station at Coltano, in Italy, which is capable of transmitting messages to and from ten thousand miles or more. It is the most powerful station yet constructed, and upon the fact that the Trans-Atlantic station at Clifden, in Ireland, which has a considerably lower power, recently succeeded in communicating a message to Buenos Ayres, 7,000 miles distant. The importance of the development is emphasized by the prospect that high-power stations are shortly to be opened at Cadiz, Barcelona, Tenerife, and Las Palmas, at which both internal Spanish telegrams and external telegrams will be worked, and that these stations will immediately open services with Italy and with England and other countries. Thus the gradual co-ordination and world-wide efficiency of wireless telegraphy is approaching completion. The Coltano station was inaugurated under the personal direction of Mr. Marconi. Its available power is 1,000 kilowatts, as compared with Clifden's 500 kilowatts, and it is expected that the projected South American stations will be in communication with it. An interesting incident prior to the opening of the Coltano station is reported. Mr. Marconi desired to communicate with the Marconi stations at Clifden, in Ireland, and Glace Bay, in Canada, and accordingly sent telegrams to those stations requesting them to tune up and be prepared to communicate with Coltano at a given hour. Later in the day, however, a telegram was received by Mr. Marconi informing him that his telegrams had been received but was unintelligible owing to the storm. Whereupon Mr. Marconi decided to call both Clifden and Glace Bay by wireless, and at four o'clock sent a message from Coltano to Clifden, and received the immediate reply: "Your signals are strong and readable." With Glace Bay (Canada) equally satisfactory communication was at once established.—The Standard, London.

Special to Evening Telegram. LONDON, Jan. 15. Home Rule excitement is growing, particularly among the Unionists of Ulster, where a vigorous campaign is in progress in the hope of creating sentiment in England against the promised bill of the Asquith ministry. It is expected that the bill will be introduced into the Commons in March, but the plans of the Unionists contemplate keeping up the agitation far into the spring. The greatest demonstration is expected in April, when Bonar Law, the Unionist leader in the Commons, will address a Unionist rally at Belfast. The Unionists are making the most of the Pope's decree, forbidding Roman Catholics under pain of excommunication from bringing ecclesiastics into court. Their contention that an Irish Parliament would be overwhelmingly Catholic, and would therefore be dominated by the Pope is combated by Archbishop Walsh, in a communication to the papers. Irish anti-Catholic newspapers call on the Archbishop to say definitely whether the decree applies to Ireland, as to which some doubt is expressed. Nothing is known of opposition newspapers about differences between Asquith and Redmond over giving the Irish Parliament control of the Customs. Details of the Home Rule Bill are closely guarded. The ministry hopes to be able to withhold disclosures of the provisions until the Bill is introduced into the House of Commons.

PEKING, Jan. 15. The inauguration of the Republic was quietly celebrated here to-day by a reception held at the residence of President Sun Yat Sen, which was attended by all the officials who have been appointed since the formation of the Republican cabinet. Heavy movements of troops, north of the river continues all along the line. Within a few days all the old national assembly, which elected Dr. Sun Yat Sen President of the Republic will be dissolved. Another will then be convened, consisting of three representatives for each province, each of whom will have a vote. A quorum is settled at thirty-three. Twenty senators have already arrived here.
