



FURS SHIPPED.—A hundred and fifty cases of fox and marten skins and fifty boxes of various furs, which were brought from Hudson Bay stations on the Labrador by the S. S. Adventure, were shipped on the S. S. Stephano to New York on Saturday.

A GOOD TRIP.—The first arrival at Bay Roberts from Labrador occurred last week when Skipper Reuben Roberts came from Labrador with 3000 qtls. He is generally high liner and is a most fortunate man. He has been "trolling the fanny deep" for over 40 years.

EPWORTH LEAGUES MEET.—Tonight in the basement of Cochrane St. Church a united missionary meeting will be held by the Epworth Leagues. The meeting will commence at 7.45 and addresses will be given by Rev. J. W. Bartlett and Miss Ida Horwood. Special singing will be in evidence during the evening and a collection will be taken up for the Forward Movement Fund.

OBJECT TO SIZE LIMIT.—At the session of the Shell Fish Commission held last Wednesday at Charlottetown, P. E. I., evidence was taken relating to the lobster and oyster industry. The lobster men were unanimously opposed to fixing the size limit. Opinions differ regarding any alterations in the traps, and it is contended that the season should be shortened if more protection is needed.

DANCE FOR DISASTER FUND.—On Wednesday night a dance will be held in the British Hall, the proceeds of which will be devoted to the Marine Disaster Fund. Considering the object of the affair should be largely patronized. The C. C. C. band will supply the music and this in itself ought to prove an attraction. During the course of the dance teas will be served. This part of the programme is being looked after by a number of philanthropic ladies.

BETTER FOR CURING.—Capt. Barbour of the Fogota reports that since Friday the weather north has been fine and every lake, beach and lawn was filled with cod being dried under the rays of the sun. To cure the catch was the main point watched last week and little attention was given to fishing. As over the country a deal of fish had been spoiling but a continuation of present weather conditions will save the situation.

I am inclined to think that if she were sharp and cross occasionally, he'd be a little more careful how he picked on her. But if she is always an angel of patience, why shouldn't he be a devil of unlovableness when he feels like it?
Angels make devils sometimes, I think, and goodness and badness are contemplatory to a greater degree than we realize.
If you will look about you, you will see that the world is full of people who are cross and folks who let people be cross to them; children who are disorderly and mothers who patiently pick up after them; husbands who are overbearing and wives who are under spirited; wives who are out-

rageously extravagant and husbands who indulge them; folks who are eternally selfish and other folks who help them to be so by their self effacement.
Now, do these sufferers deserve as much pity as they usually receive, so long as they help maintain the cause of their sufferings?
Probably most of them would tell you that nothing they could do would have any effect on the offenders. I think they are mistaken.

Household Notes.

If you spill tea on a tablecloth, cover it with common salt and leave it on for a while. When the cloth is washed all stains will have disappeared.
The great secret of frying is to have plenty of fat and to have it boiling hot when you drop things into it, so that the inside cooks without absorbing the grease.
To keep a pet palm in order, the leaves should be sponged carefully every week. Don't water palms too often; let the earth become dry, then soak it liberally.
The revolving breakfast tray is a comfort which American women would do well to borrow from their English cousins. It makes it possible to do with less service.
Keep breadboards and other wooden utensils clean by scrubbing with soap and lukewarm water, to which household ammonia or common soda has been added.
A good simple dessert is baked apples, cored and with the cavities filled with cinnamon and sugar. Cover bot-

tom of pan with boiling water and bake in hot oven until tender.
To make cucumber juice, crush the sliced cucumbers while fresh and strain the juice through cheesecloth. To eight ounces of juice add one ounce of alcohol and a few drops of benzoin.
Save the time and trouble of lugging an ironing board around by having it attached by hinges to the wall. When not in use it can be held fast against the wall by a piece of picture wire.
In packing children's lunches for school, always wrap the sandwiches in oiled paper. Meats for the filling are best chopped. Cream cheese combined with nuts make a good filling for a change.
Never throw away pieces of stale cake. They are good for puddings. If you do not wish to use them directly, dry them thoroughly in a cool oven, crush with a roller and put them in a glass jar until wanted.
The all-wool Ingrain carpet called filling makes an excellent furniture covering for the amateur upholsterer to deal with. Its texture is like canvas and the colors are admirable grays, browns, reds and blues.
In a house of small closets much space can be economized by having long rods of wood or metal, over which clothes hangers can be hooked. In a china closet you can set in half shelves to save space—shelves five inches wide to be used for jelly glasses and small dishes.
A good scheme of disposing of kitchen rubbish is to have a rubbish chute in the kitchen at the top of the cellar stairs. It opens by a trap-door, and into it all rubbish can be thrown, to land in a big wire basket in the cellar. When full, the contents are burned in the basket.
Fresh, sweet suet is a great resource for winter cookery. The suet should be freed from all loose skin and flesh, then chopped fine and thoroughly coated with flour. To each quart of suet allow a cupful of flour and a teaspoonful of salt. It should be packed in glass jars and set away in a cool dry place.
To make pickled cauliflower, break the heads in pieces, wash and boil in salted water for five minutes, drain and throw into cold water, then drain again. When the cauliflower is dry,

MORRIS'S
DUPLICITY.

On Friday last, we drew attention to the contemptible conduct of Sir Edward Morris in reference to the Dubois-Crane prosecution at a meeting at Bay of Islands recently.

This conduct is on all fours with that pursued during the elections of 1908 and 1909, when he tried to defame Bond for legislation and acts of administration to which he has been a party from the spring of 1906 to the he had increased taxation.

For instance the Morris Party gave as a reason in 1908 why Sir Robert Bond should be defeated that during his administration from 1900 to 1908, he had increased taxation.

That was his contention in 1908. Now what was his contention in 1907? In the course of a speech delivered in the House of Assembly in March of that year, he said:—

"The Government has been able to reduce taxation annually to the extent of \$250,000, and increase public service to the extent of \$300,000 including grants for extension of coastal service, light houses, etc., that the people have lived better, and have been able to put away in the Savings Banks of the country something like five millions of money, not to talk of the amount they put away in their own homes. What has brought about this prosperity? There has not been more fish caught than there was forty years ago when there was one third less population than there is to-day."

How was it then that the people would live better, have more comforts and save more money with one third more population, if it were not for the new industries started as the result of the development policy of the Government?

"As a people, we are better off and one of the reasons for this is the policy of the Government of to-day." In fact, his conduct at Bay of Islands was only consistent with his inconsistencies during the last two election campaigns.

His conduct was precisely similar in respect to what the Tories call the Secret Letter. It was similar in regard to the project known as the Fog Free Zone ocean and land proposition.

THE WRECK OF OPPORTUNITY—THE MODEL FARM.

I suppose that it is almost a universal failing of the species that in the works of our mind, which are not in full sympathy with our idea, we recognize more or less the works of the Evil One. That because we dislike one thing about them, we dislike all things.
 Strong indeed is the mind that will praise an enemy, or give him credit for a good action, and how good it is to find one who will do that; that can so overcome an antipathy, and rise above himself.
 In politics, alas! we seldom find such a mind. What a wreck of a good policy the present Government has made in demolishing the Model Farm scheme of the late Government, the present admirers of this Ministry seem only fond of mushroom schemes that come up in a night, make a big show, but are apt to disappear quickly, like a "bright exhalation of the evening."

If this Farm School idea had not been tried by any other country, if it had not been tried in the States, where, if it had not proved the success it has in Canada, Australia, Germany, England, and other places—then the might be some excuse for the Government destroying all vestiges of the work that had been started, thus making the initial expenses of the Farm a heavy loss.
 But when we find that almost everywhere these Farm Schools are recognized as one of the most important educational institutions, and serve to give the millions that must turn to the land for a livelihood, what excuse can our Minister of Agriculture give for the act of vandalism in rendering useless such advantages that the Farm presents.

They say that the land is no good. A sufficient answer to this is that it has been sold to a young man who is not likely to pay between ten and twenty thousand dollars for nothing, and I have spoken to a practical farmer who says that the land is of common sense and elbow grease!
 I thought it a good remark in the editorial last week that, we should profit by his remarks, and give authority on agriculture says that there is a new science of agriculture which makes its own soil and modifies its climate. He says that it is not the Nature, has given to the Belgian soil its present productivity, and that there are men whose ambition is to have as many six crops from the same plot of land during the twelve months. They do not understand about good or bad soils because they make the soil themselves. This may sound like a fairy tale to us but anyone who reads of the wonderful creations nowadays of seedless oranges, seedless apples and so forth must feel that there are many things in agriculture that we do not know.
 The best way in which this knowledge could reach us would be through an experimental farm, and it makes one hot to think that opportunities of this sort should be wrecked to satisfy the personal ends of politicians.—Trinity Enterprise.




