

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

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,-Friday next, April 23rd, is St. George's Day! I shall be very grateful to you if you will permit me to say through your columns that I shall be glad if Church of England Boards of Education and Teachers will make suitable arrangements for the proper observance of the day.

St. George is the Patron Saint of England. LONDON, April 19. The Governor, Newfoundland:

The Admiralty report that the British submarine E-15 ran ashore while attempting a difficult recon naisance in the Dardanelles. The officers and most of the crew

It fired a torpedo at the Fenno, which forced her seek safety in flight.

BOSTON WARATHON.

BOSTON, April 19. Fabre, of Montreal, won the Boston Marathon to-day; time 2 hours 41% seconds, against a record of 2 ours 21 minutes 18% seconds made by M. J. Ryan in 1912.
