LATEST
From the Front

Unauthorized Expenditure.
In one of the reports of the Auditor General, tabled yesterday in the House of Assembly by the Minister of Finance, the former takes exception to a number of expenditures under Order-in-Council. He says—"I have to report that the following payments for increases in voted salaries, salaries for new offices, and other expenditures for which there is no legislative vote, have been directed by Order-in-Council. All these payments are contrary to the provisions of the Audit Act, and I have declined to pass them." After giving the list the Auditor General remarks: "It will be observed that the total annual obligation incurred for increases to salaries and salaries for new offices is \$26,183.00. This sum forms a permanent annual increase to the expenditure of the Colony." The Auditor General also reports the expenditure of \$48,534.19 during the current year, in excess of the votes made in the Legislature, or on services for which no vote has been taken.
He disallows all these overruns, and they constitute a debt balance against the respective Departmental Letter of Credit Accounts in the Bank of Montreal. Similar remarks, extensions, disallowances occur every year in the report of the Auditor General on Section 33b of the Audit Act. They point to the custom which has arisen of making short votes in the Legislature and then eking them out by irregular Orders-in-Council.

BRITISH CAPTURE HILL.
LONDON, To-day.
Activity prevails along the Western battle line, but it seems to partake of the nature of isolated engagements instead of a general offensive. Artillery duels have taken place and fierce hand-to-hand fighting, which have been the feature of recent struggles along the Meuse near the Lorraine border, but the latter type of combat continues in the Vosges, where official statements of both sides agree that sharp fighting is taking place on German territory. The agreement, however, ends with this fact, the French claiming to have occupied dominating positions here, and Germans declaring the attacks of the British end of the line comes a report, officially issued by the War Office, London, that Hill No. 90, an important point two miles south of Zillbeke, Belgium, was captured from the Germans on the night of April 12. A German communication tells of the driving of the British out of minor German positions, which were occupied by them to the southeast of Ypres. This is in the neighborhood of Hill No. 60.

Mr. Hickman's Resolutions.
We understand that the Resolutions of Mr. Hickman, as tabled yesterday, read as follows:
BE IT RESOLVED:—
(1) That the Importation and Sale of Spirituous Liquors and Wines be prohibited;
(2) That the Manufacture in the Colony of Spirituous Liquors and Wines be prohibited.
This proposal would allow the importation or manufacture of ales, beers, and porters. The suggestion of prohibiting the importation of the latter has been abandoned, as has the creation of a Government monopoly for the manufacture and sale of these beverages.

NO FIGHTING IN POLAND.
PETROGRAD, To-day.
A report of minor successes in the Carpathians shows that fighting has not been entirely suspended near the Passes, but Russian, Austrian, and German officials reports agree that the Spring virtually put an end to all activity along the remainder of the Eastern front. Various rumours are current regarding the Central Powers, Austria, through the medium of Venice is credited with receiving with consternation the news of the extension of the Landstrum service to all classes between the ages of 18 and 50 years, while Rome is the sponsor for a statement attributed to high German authority that the German General Staff has discarded all plans for advance on the French front, deciding simply to remain on the defensive. It is again unofficially announced that operations are underway in the Dardanelles, where the Turks are reported to be building defences with all speed against landing parties, but the news of the breaking up of the ice of Archangel, the only large seaport on the North Coast of Russia, may induce the Entente Allies to be more deliberate in their attempts to unlock the gate to the

Black Sea. The irritation of Holland over the torpedoing of the Dutch ship Katwyk, has been greatly allayed by Germany's expression of her willingness to make an apology and pay an indemnity, if it is found that the sinking of the vessel was due to a German submarine.

MURDERING FISHERMEN.
LONDON, To-day.
The Admiralty has issued the following statement: Yesterday a German submarine torpedoed and sank the trawler Vanilla. The trawler Ferno endeavored to rescue the crew but was fired at and driven off. All the crew of the Vanilla were lost. This killing of fishermen for no military purpose should not escape attention. It is the second murder of this character committed within a week. A careful record is kept of these events.

MINERS THREATEN TO STRIKE.
LONDON, To-day.
A critical situation has arisen among the coal miners. Representatives of Welsh miners have unanimously decided in favor of tendering a fortnight's notice of a proposed strike against mine owners in order to enforce their demands for a twenty per cent. increase of wages. The miners of the Federation of Great Britain will meet on Wednesday to decide what action they will take to compel mine owners to accede to their demand for a similar increase.

11.30 A.M.
JAPS ORDERS WARSHIPS HOME.
WASHINGTON, To-day.
Japan has ordered all her warships in Pacific waters, near American coasts, except those salvaging the wrecked cruiser Asama in Turtle Bay to return to their home stations. Advice to that effect were received from Tokyo at the Japanese Embassy. The Embassy also received word that the cruiser Chitoz was the only vessel, accompanying a repair ship, working on the Asama.

GREAT BATTLE SOUTH OF YPRES—BRITISH CAPTURE A TOWN SOUTH OF YPRES—DRIVE OUT GERMANS FROM TRENCHES AND ADVANCE THREE MILES—GREAT WORK OF MINERS, ARTILLERY AND INFANTRY—FIGHTING AS FERCE AS AT NEUVE CHAPELLE.

LONDON, To-day.
British troops have begun a strong advance in Belgium, south of Ypres. The War Office last night briefly chronicles the taking of Hill, in that region, but a despatch to the Morning Post from the North of France, under date yesterday states the British advance has been pushed forward three miles after fighting fully as fierce as that at Neuve Chapelle. "The fighting I hear was quite as fierce as at Neuve Chapelle. The British advance swept on to a point where there were no trenches and men were exposed to heavy fire, while digging themselves in. It was a case of breaking through the German lines of trenches at a point considerably ahead of the main line of trenches on Sunday morning when the digging whose admirable sapping has been a feature of the campaign, sprang a series of mines of exceptional strength. The British artillery following up the work of the sappers played havoc with the German trenches, and as Neuve Chapelle, the infantry fell upon a foe utterly demoralized. The action is still in progress and the British advances have been uncheckered and eight hundred German prisoners have already come in and everything points to the enemy's losses being greater than those at Neuve Chapelle. Their attitude is one of depression.

2.00 P. M.
PROGRESS VERY SMALL.
LONDON, To-day.
Another appeal to the Government to take the country into its confidence was contained in an editorial in the Times, which points out that except for local successes the war situation has undergone little apparent change in the past five months. The paper declares that changes in the battle line during that period on both Eastern and Western fronts hardly would be noticed by a map maker, while the official statements regarding the Dardanelles operations leave much to be desired. We urge the Government, says the Times, to use every effort to make the nation understand how much is the progress yet attained on land, and how great and manifold are the sacrifices which still must be faced.

TIME LIMIT UP TO-DAAY.
PARIS, To-day.
Italy some time ago fixed April 23 (to-day) as the latest date for the consideration of any proposals Austria might wish to make. According to a report in Rome, says the Figaro's correspondent, Baron de Michio, Austrian Ambassador, already has given notice to Embassy servants who now are paid daily, it is said, and that same is true of the payment of tradesmen's bills for goods supplied the Embassy.

TWO TURKISH DESTROYERS BLOWN UP.
PARIS, To-day.
Two torpedo boat destroyers blown up, says a Salonika despatch, while passing through the mine belt which Russian ships had succeeded in laying across the entrance to the Bosphorus, while the Turkish fleet was cruising in the Black Sea.

FRENCH DROP CHARGE.
PARIS, To-day.
French military authorities have decided to drop the charge of setting fire to the steamer Latouraine, which was preferred against Raymond Swoboda, says the Petit Parisien. The charge of espionage is still against him.

Sobs of Men Left Behind
Newfoundland Heroes' Triumphant March Before Embarking for the Front.
How deeply Newfoundland, Great Britain's oldest colony, has been stirred by the trumpet call to arms is brought to light by a most interesting message which reached The Daily Mirror yesterday.
The best of Newfoundland's sons, writes our correspondent, have already joined the ranks, and the womenfolk at home are giving of their time and money to provide comforts for those who are fighting for the Empire.
Never has such a scene been witnessed in St. John's as on the day the first contingent, representing every class of the community, marched through the crowded streets of the city to board the steamship Florizel.
On their last Sunday in camp the troops, by special request of the patients, marched from church through the grounds of the General Hospital.
Among the patients was a volunteer who had contracted pneumonia and was not sufficiently recovered to go with his comrades. It was a bitter disappointment to him to see them go without him, and as they passed he was heard to sob.
Newfoundland is giving to the Empire sailors as well as soldiers.
A few days ago the third batch of men for the Navy went to England.
Most of them are weather-beaten fishermen who have all their lives been wrestling with the wind and waves, and in the hour of danger none will be found more fearless than they.
Altogether nearly 2,000 out of a total population of 250,000 have answered the call to arms.—Daily Mirror, March 25th.

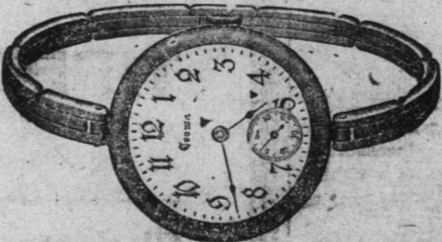
