The Battle of Arras.

Impatience must be satisfied to wait for fuller details of the great British victory that was first flashed over the wires yesterday, and of the progress that we are convinced must have since been made. It is good to note that the first bulletins considerably understated the extent of the achievement and that the reported prisoners, booty and territory captured continues to grow. We are not always placidly content to see good, solid news crowded out of the daily messages by dilated accounts from the pen of some correspondent or other, but these last must be allowed to be exceptions. The vivid description which we print to-day of the taking of Vimy Ridge is not valuable for its realistic language alone, for it epitomises in a few sentences the history of trench fighting since the war began and gives a suggestive indication of its future course. The incomparable British air service, of whose marvellous and heroic work the general-ity of us have not the faintest conception, clear the air of the enemy, methodically, relentlessly and, alas, at the cost of many a brave life; the guns that have for days been leveling the opposing positions into an earthy chaos now under their direction search out every concentration of enemy troops; the British and Canadian infantry advance grimly and stolidly behind the protecting barrier of fire; and position after position of the greatest imaginable strength surrenders to direct assault or is surrounded and cut off. It is a programme, scientifically elaborated in every detail and carried out with mechanical precision, which, given the

guns, the aeroplanes and the men—and we have them all—will reduce any resistance the Germans may oppose. Whether the famous Vimy Ridge possesses the importance ascribed to it by one message yesterday, which said that its retention by the British would compel the retirement of the enemy to the Messines-Mauberge line, remains to be seen; but the cry of "On to Douai and Cambrai!" tells of the first great step towards it.

While Germany sees her army and her prestige smashed thus on the field of battle, matters in the world outside and on at least one other battlefield cannot look any too rosily coloured to her eyes. Brazil has broken with her, and apparently Guatemala also, useful to the Allies as Mexico's watchful neighbour, while Mexico herself is clearly frightened into neutrality. The mischievous activity of Villa and his German lieutenants may even compel her shortly to abandon it to follow Brazil's lead, though this is not likely. Disappointment is expressed that Chili is resolved to remain out, especially as she will probably influence Argentina, whose recent embargo on her exports of meat will in that case be continued. But it is a great help to have Brazil on our side, and to see the crumbling of Germany's overweening ambition in South America, to which it extended as presumptuously and arrogantly as to Asia Minor and the Balkans.

Finally, we have another brief word from Mesopotamia. The bulletins from this quarter come only at intervals of days, but they represent nowadays progress that shows the intervals not to have been idle ones. We may be prepared to hear news of great importance and magnitude from this region before long. Unless the spring floods greatly interfere, the joint operations of the British and Russian troops promise to end in nothing less than the complete capture of the Turkish Mesopotamian army. Once the three-pronged Russian advance has made sufficient headway, there seems to be no open way of retreat to that army except the impassable Syrian Desert, and with its surrender Mesopotamia will pass entirely into the Allies' hands. A campaign of almost equal importance is under way in Palestine, which will certainly involve the capture of Jerusalem and possibly of the whole Mediterranean coast line north to Adana. There is no need to speculate further, for the event is yet far enough away, but it is not too much to say that Turkey's once considerable dominions bid fair before many months have passed to be limited to the comparatively small area of Asia Minor west of Armenia, and even that threatened with invasion unless peace has been meanwhile won elsewhere.

Since the above was written, the news from Buenos Aires that the Argentine Government has officially approved the action of the United States suggests that that country may after all throw in her lot with the Allies as Brazil has done.

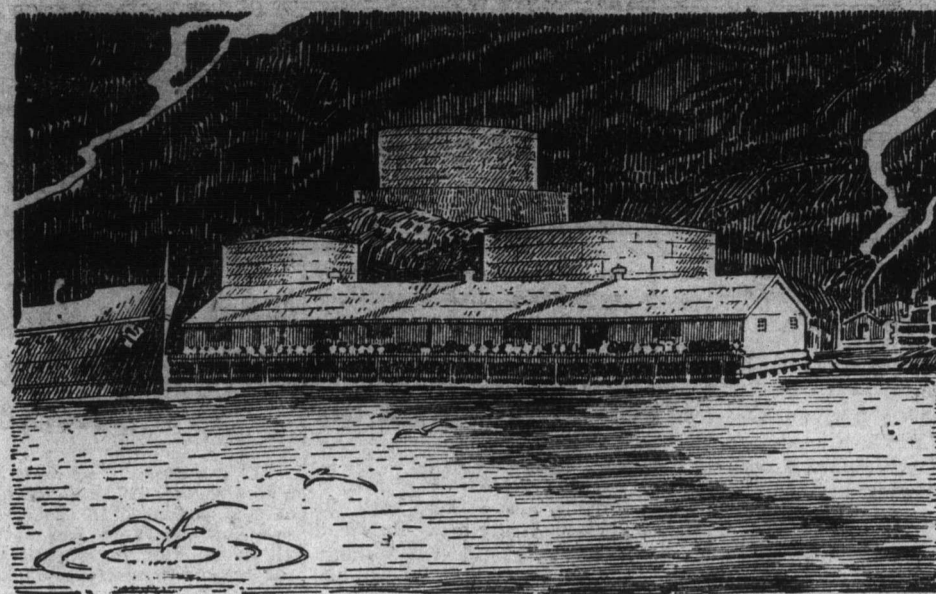
Kitchener's Prediction.

SOUND WORDS.

By RUTH CAMERON.



RUTH CAMERON

We fell into an interesting discussion the other day about words that sound like their meaning. Take for instance the word "murmur." There surely cannot be any doubt that that word sounds like the thing it stands for. The "m u r m u r" of voices," the "murmur of waters," how wonderfully you can hear them in that single word!

"Bubble" is another such word. It seems to me that both the sound and notion of gurgling water are caught and imprisoned in those two syllables. Words can sound The Way Things Look.

Both these cases are cases where the word stands for sound. But the relationship between the word and its meaning is not confined to sound, by any means.

Take, for example, the word "twinkle." Don't those syllables in some nervous way sound just as the twinkling of a star looks?

Then there's the word "stifle." Can't you feel a sense of smother and repression right in it?

Doesn't "Rough" Sound Rough? Or take the words "rough" and "smooth." Isn't there something in the sound of each that suggests the quality it denotes? If you told someone who did not know our language that these two words stood for the two qualities, don't you think he could guess which was which? It would be an interesting experiment.

"Gruff" is another word in which sense and sound are perfectly wedded. Can you imagine "gruff" mean-

ing soft voiced? I certainly can't. And doesn't "silly" sound the way silk feels to you?

Could "leer" ever mean anything pleasant, musical though it is?

Or could that fine old Saxon word "stink" possibly mean fragrance?

Of course the inevitable question pops up—"Isn't it because these words are associated with their meanings that you think there is something in the sound that suggests the sense?"

It is Hard To Disentangle A Word From Its Association.

It is of course, difficult to disentangle a word from its associations but I have been aware of that danger and have tried to avoid it. The element of association may have something to do with a feeling about these words but it is not the whole cause.

I left out several in which I thought sound and sense were allied, because I could not be sure how much association influenced me. My favorite word "serene" for instance; it sounds serene to me but I could not be sure I wasn't prejudiced.

Your Boys and Girls.

After a billious attack or any other kind of stomach trouble when a child cannot digest the yolk of the egg, it is possible to make the needed albumen more palatable by posching just the white, removing the yolk before the white is dropped into the poacher. Of course this can only be done in the transition period after the albumen water (raw white shaken up in water) is no longer strong enough.

Those who have babies generally know how to make albumen water, but for the benefit for those who do not know, the proportion depends upon the age of the child. The usual formula for older children is the white of one egg shaken up in a glass of water, put on ice or served with ice chopped in it. It is, of course, more palatable with a little orange juice if the doctor will allow it.

A refreshing drink for sick persons is the white of egg shaken up in two-thirds of a glass of water, mixed with the juice of a whole orange and half a lemon, with a little cracked ice. The acid cuts the albumen and prevents the stringiness, besides adding a delicious flavor cooling to a fevered throat.

THE SOUTH AMERICAN STATES.
WASHINGTON, To-day.

Much of the uncertainty as to Latin America's attitude towards the war between the States and Germany was cleared away to-day by definite advices that Chile and Mexico will remain neutral and increasing indications that Brazil, Guatemala and Peru will join Cuba and Panama on the side of the United States and the Allies. The decision of Chile, the first of the American Republics, to announce her neutrality caused some surprise among officials here. In many quarters it had been expected that she eventually would break with the Berlin Government, but would postpone the decision until advised definitely of the course of the Argentine and Brazil, the other members of the influential A.B.C. group of South America. What effect her stand will have on the smaller nations of the continent is a matter of much speculation, particularly as there are indications that the Argentine also will take her place among the neutrals. Mexico's decision on the other hand has caused no surprise, and is regarded as certain to have little influence with her sister republics. It is assumed that as a neutral the Mexican Government will take such steps as it is able to protect the oil fields supplying a considerable part of the fuel used by the British fleet. A great part of that field is not now within Carranza's control, but Manuel Palasz, revolutionist, is controlling long strips of territory in South Tampico and has gained the confidence of oil operators by his policy of guarding the high wells against any aggression by enemy aliens. An incident that caused curiosity and some anxiety at the State Department was the taking over by the Mexican Government two weeks ago of the British owned Mexican railway between Vera Cruz and Mexico City. No explanation had been given, but continued investigation by the department failed to show any German influence behind the act or any success for the efforts of German agents working to secure the support of the Mexican Government. It is regarded as possible, however, though not probable, that same headway may have been made by German agents with Villa and other revolutionary chiefs, yet operating on a scale big enough to make them a menace to Carranza. Increased activity of the rebel chiefs, it is realized, might render very difficult Carranza's maintenance of neutrality.

TO OMIT SHIPPING INTELLIGENCE
NEW YORK, To-day.

Through the Associated Press and the Canadian Press, Ltd., Secretary of the Navy, Daniels, has requested the newspapers of America to refrain from publishing the arrival and departure of any ship, coastwise or in international trade, until further notice.

BRAZIL BREAKS DEFINITELY.
LONDON, To-day.

Reuter's Rio Janeiro correspondent announces that Brazil has severed relations with Germany. The Brazilian interests in Germany will be taken over by Switzerland, the correspondent adds.

LOSS THROUGH EXPLOSION NOT GREAT.
CHESTER, Pa., To-day.

The Eddystone Ammunition Corporation, organized originally by interests identified with the Baldwin Locomotive Works and operated by those interests, was taken over last September by a Commission representing the British and Russian Governments. Since that this Commission has been carrying on the manufacture of munitions for the Entente Allies. The financial losses are estimated at less than \$25,000, not including the ammunition destroyed. The work will be resumed to-morrow in all departments, except the box backing and base charging departments. More than 10,000 are employed in the place.

WAR REVIEW.
LONDON, To-day.

"On to the Douai-Cambrai line," evidently is the slogan of the British force fighting in France. Despite strong resistance by the Germans and the added handicap of a heavy snow storm, King George's forces, notably among them the Canadians, have again hit the German line hard at several points for good gains along the front from Vimy southward, and also to the west of Cambrai. Five miles east of Arras the British have reached the suburbs of Monchy-le-Preux, northeast of Arras, and have cleared out the Germans from the vil-

lage of Farbus and Farbus Wood; while to the immediate north of this sector the Canadians in hard fighting took an additional important position on the famous Vimy Ridge, and captured prisoners and machine guns; 10 miles west of Cambrai the British established their line north of the village of Louverval. In two days fighting along the front from Lens to S.E. of Arras the Germans suffered enormous losses in men and guns. More than 11,000 prisoners, among them 235 officers were taken, and 100 guns, sixty trench mortars, and 162 machine guns have fallen into the hands of the British. Some of the larger guns were of 8-in. calibre. The advance of the British over the entire front has been made to a depth of from 2 to 6 miles, the penetration being greatest to the east and southeast of Arras. A Berlin official admits that two German divisions fighting near Arras on Monday suffered considerable losses, stubbornly resisting superior forces. It admits also that the British succeeded in penetrating the German positions, but says they did not break through the line. On that part held by the French reciprocal bombardments continue at various points. No infantry engagement has taken place. Again the British and Russian forces report success over the Turks in Mesopotamia. Along the Caucasus front the Russian forces operating against the Ottomans and in Mesopotamia from the Khaniken district near the Prusso-Mesopotamian frontier have captured the village of Kisil Robot, eighty miles northwest of Bagdad; and to the north of this region have driven back the Turks. In the district of Bahah, which lies about 100 miles east of Mosul, 50 miles northeast of Bagdad, the British troops have captured the villages of Balad and Herbe from the Turks, and made prisoners nine officers and 200 men. Two machine guns and railway material were taken by the British. On none of the other fronts has there been any engagement of great importance. Unofficial advices say that Brazil has severed relations with Germany.

THE NEW YORK'S NARROW ESCAPE.
LIVERPOOL, To-day.

The American Line steamer New York, bound from New York to Liverpool, struck a mine last night when near her destination. The explosion occurred on her port bow. Distress signals were immediately sent out and nearby vessels went to her assistance. All the passengers were taken off and brought to the landing stages here. It was found the damage was confined to the forepart of the ship and was not serious. The New York was able to make the dock under her own steam. The vessel had shipped some water, but her appearance was nothing more than that she was heavily laden. When the New York warped into the dock and moored, a large gang of dock workers immediately began rapidly to discharge the cargo so as to enable the steamer to go into dry dock as early as possible.

CONGRATULATE CANADIANS.
LONDON, To-day.

Anglo-Canadians are rejoicing at the good news of the capture of Vimy Ridge. Sir Robert Borden has sent a congratulatory message to General Byng, who commands the Canadian forces. The entire press sings with the exploits of Canadians as when they did battle at Ypres, but with more jubilation.

GREAT ACTIVITY IN ARRAS REGION.
LONDON, To-day.

Describing the extraordinary volume of activity developed in the Arras battle, Reuter's correspondent at Army Headquarters in France says the constant stream of troops advancing throughout the day all along the front betokens the weight the British are throwing into the offensive. In one village this afternoon he counted within half an hour seven battalions, each headed by a band marching as though to review instead of battle. Tanks have been in action at various points. An interesting incident was the capture of a pair of heavy howitzers mounted on the bank of the River Scarpe by a cavalry squadron. They charged the gunners in fine old style, cutting down those who resisted. They put the guns effectively out of action and

lil they could be brought in. On the whole the day has been devoted to consolidating the important gains of Monday, clearing up spots which were still resisting. Our casualties thus far have been extremely light. Our airmen are still baffled by wintry weather.

FOUL PLAY SUSPECTED.
CHESTER, Penn., To-day.

In a signed statement Samuel Vauclair, President of the Eddystone Munition Corporation, last night said, regarding the terrible catastrophe which happened at Eddystone yesterday: "We are unable to account for it in any way other than as the acts of some maliciously inclined person or persons."

NORWAY'S SHIPPING LOSSES.
LONDON, To-day.

The Norwegian Shipping Gazette gives the total of Norwegian losses to March 24 as 312 steamers, tonnage 493,143; and 80 ships, tonnage 65,357, sunk as the result of submarine and mines. The number of men and women who have perished is given as 12, missing 25.

CAUGHT BRINGING AMMUNITION TO MEXICO.
SAN DIEGO, Cal., To-day.

An ammunition-carrying schooner bound for a Mexican West Coast port, was fired upon and captured by two U. S. torpedo boat destroyers it was learned last night from authoritative sources. Five shots were fired at the vessel when she attempted to escape. The ship was then beached and several thousand rounds of rifle and machine gun ammunition were taken aboard the destroyers and landed at a Pacific Coast port.

1.00 P. M.
DECIDED TO BREAK.
RIO JANEIRO, To-day.

At a Cabinet Council yesterday it was decided that Brazil should sever her relations with Germany.

MOST SUCCESSFUL OPERATION IN THE WAR.
LONDON, To-day.

The accumulated accounts of the Battle of Arras impress commentators here with the conviction that it probably was the most successful operation on a great scale yet carried out by the British during the war, being the only one in which every unit triumphantly obtained its immediate objective. Critics compare it to the offensive on the Somme last July, of which one of the commentators says: "We failed on one-third of the front attacked and on the other two thirds attained a number of very important but imperfectly connected successes which it took some days to link into continuous advance. The prisoners on the first day were two thousand and after three days they numbered 4,300, while the British casualties were exceedingly heavy. On the other hand Monday's advance was complete and continuous. The attack was now being baffled and the casualties were proportionately so light that the spear point of the attacking forces was not materially blunted. Everything went in accordance with the programme and with nice precision. The perfected tactical method practised by the French at Verdun last October and December and by the British on the Ancre and at Arras, a method which enabled the strongest field fortresses to be captured with less loss to the attackers than to the defenders, did not exist in its present form in July. It is a new factor slowly brought into birth, but of tremendous significance for the fighting for the occupied land." It is held here that if the advance could be continued at Monday's speed it would result in an almost crushing blow for the Germans; but military critics deprecate expectations that it can be continued indefinitely, and predict violent counter attacks with large reserves, which, they say, the Germans have already.

ARGENTINE SUPPORTS U.S.A.
BUENOS AYRES, To-day.

The Government issued a declaration late last night announcing that it supported the position of the United States in reference to Germany.

RUSSIA'S GREATEST ENEMIES.
LONDON, To-day.

A Petrograd despatch to the Times dated Sunday, says that the Committee of Labor Deputies has published a series of resolutions revealing a desire to insure the defeat of the Russian Army and a dishonorable peace. The despatch says that the delegates have formed a committee to open direct negotiations with the Germans and are sending a deputation to Stockholm for this purpose. The Labor Deputies further demand control of messages sent to the Foreign press by the Petrograd Telegraph Agency, and their programme includes a propaganda among the Russian masses with a view to terminating the war, which they say benefits only the Bourgeoisie. Another demand is that military opera-

tions be controlled by committees of soldiers.

THE BATTLE OF ARRAS.
BRITISH HEADQUARTERS IN FRANCE, To-day.

The speed and power of the British assault in what will probably be known in history as the Battle of Arras, seems to have thoroughly surprised the Germans, so much so in fact that their usual retaliatory artillery fire has been absolutely negligible in the last two days. This is partly due to the number of guns captured, to which must be added the number knocked out by the British artillery before the actual assault was begun. It is also due to the fact that the Germans have been too busy trying to get their remaining guns away from the immediate danger of the others' firing to bother firing them at the enemy. In a German artillery position east of Arras, known as Battery Valley, could be seen the remains of twenty-four field pieces. To-day a trip over the newly taken lines revealed conditions of trenches closely approaching those recently evacuated by the Germans in the valley of the Somme. Many dugouts remained with only damaged portals, but trenches, including all communication lines, have been unmercifully battered about. So successful was the artillery barrier set up by the British back of the German lines that some of the German prisoners reported they had been without food supplies for four days. Barbed wire entanglements protecting the German positions were obliterated, and only stray strands could be seen here and there on the first line. The thoroughness with which the wire cutting was carried out in accelerating the speed of the infantry in the attack. The rest of offensive warfare could be felt in all parts of the British front to-day. Troops were swinging forward with the hands playing gay tunes. Scotch troops behind their pipers were particularly picturesque, for not even the vicissitudes of nearly three years of war have caused them to discard their kilts. Out over the newly won ground airplanes were scouting, while beneath them were the tanks at rest. The tanks had done splendidly throughout, especially in attacking strongly wired points with which the artillery had not dealt. Some German anti-tank guns were captured. Machine guns and trench mortars were taken in such large numbers that they have not been counted. A cavalry corps had the unique distinction of capturing two big howitzers. They charged these guns in the open, killing several members of the crew before the others surrendered. A German motor transport column was captured intact. It had expected to meet the German troops at a certain point, but encountered the British instead. The drivers said that when they left Douai there was no idea that the attackers had reached so far. Thousands of German prisoners could be seen along the road to-day. Some had little round caps and others were wearing the great coal scuttle steel helmet. Although the intense cold continues, only a few had overcoats. They are a docile lot and somewhat surprised their captors by carefully sorting themselves into their respective units before being registered and temporarily caged. Smaller cages were provided for the officers. Four of the latter have been in a furious rage ever since they were taken. They were in a forward observation post, they said, and saw the infantry coming back from the front line, but had no idea that they were actually retreating. Their anger was due to the failure of these troops to give them warning, so that they could flee.

BRAZILIAN ENTHUSIASM FOR ALLIES.
RIO JANEIRO, To-day.

Pro-ally demonstrations are growing in volume throughout the city. The flags of the Entente are visible everywhere and the streets are thronged with paraders cheering for Great Britain and France and shouting "down with Germany."

ANOTHER ONE!
MONTE VIDEO, To-day.

It is asserted in official circles that the rupture of relations between Uruguay and Germany is probable.

A FURTHER GAIN.
LONDON, To-day.

The British have captured the village and heights of Monchy-le-Preux early this morning, according to a British official statement.

CLEVER CRAFTSMANSHIP OF AN ENGLISH LADY.—On exhibition at the Royal Stores yesterday was a miniature suite of furniture made of steel, contrived by Miss Lisma Felding for her niece, the Governor's daughter. Miss Felding is one of the many of Great Britain's noble women who are now engaged in a munition factory. The toys, which are very nicely constructed, were admired by hundreds yesterday.

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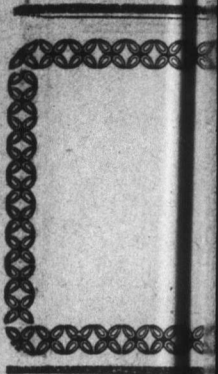
