






LONDON, July 24. (Via Reuter's Ottawa Agency.)despatch from French headquarters eads as follows: Some of the hardest fighting on the whole battlefield is now raging on the new British front stride the Ardre in Montague-de-Rheims. The British arrived at the point of concentration south of the Marne on the 17th inst. and attacked on the morning of the 20th on a five mile front, between the southern edge. of Coverton Wood and the village of St. Euprase. They were opposed by four German divisions, the 26th, 103rd, 123rd and 22nd which have been engaged since the 15th, and suffered heavily in an attempt to pierce the Italian front with a view to reaching the Marne and turning the French position at Montagne-de-Rheims. Last evening the German resistance was most stubborn and the fighting was persistent along the whole front between the Marne and Vrigny, which village with the woods to the east was captured by the British. Two British divisions in the Ardre sector were engaged in the battle for four days and scored advances. The line to-night runs roughly along the railway from Nanteuil to Chateau Thiery. The Germans are using artillery on both sides of the Ourcq, and their front is stiffened with machine gun nests. Generally speaking the Franco-American bridgeheads north of the river are being steadily enlarged. During the day we advanced two miles in the region of Chartreves and Mont Pierre. It is known that the enemy engaged with 60 or 70 divisions since the 15th

UNABLE TO HALT MOVEMENT.

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY ON THE AISNE-MARNE FRONT, July 24.-Along the line north of Chateau Thiery the Franco-American forces have driven the Germans out of nearly all of the Chatelet Forest. The Allied advance has made a considerable jump in this area. The Germans are continuing their rearguard fighting, and depending much on their machine guns. Further northwest the Americans gained the ascendancy over the Germans and drove through beyond the town of Enjeds. American cavalry was used alone in the operations north of the Chateau Thiery. Northward the most intense resistance was offered along the extended German right flank, but the reports are that the Allies have made gains and that the Germans have been unable to 00 halt the movement towards their line






REVOLUTIONISTS SHOT.
