

Reichstag Approves Acceptance of Dawes' Report

New French Cabinet Under Marsal Will Have Short Life--Battle Cruisers to Visit Newfoundland in September--Jury Disagree in the Bank Murder Trial.

REICHSTAG ELATION

OVER APPROVAL.
BERLIN, June 7. Elation was expressed in Government headquarters to-day over the outcome of the voting in the Reichstag on the question of approving Germany's acceptance of the Reparations Experts' Report with a clear majority of 64 votes in favor. The Marx Cabinet now is equipped with full authority to carry on negotiations with the Reparations Commission for the fulfilment of the provisions contained in the Experts' plan.

FRENCH POLITICAL DEADLOCK.

PARIS, June 7. The Governmental deadlock continues but there was evidence this morning that President Millerand who has been withholding his hand thus far would take action this evening and name a Premier after consulting M. Steeg and a few other political leaders. According to those near him the President is convinced that he has lost nothing by being deliberate inasmuch as his resistance to the interests of the left has been approved by steadily growing sections of Parliament opinion.

THE EVANESCENT CABINET.

PARIS, June 8. The new French political Cabinet named to-day by M. M. Francois Marsal, to take the place of that headed by M. Poincare which recently resigned, is as follows:—Premier and Minister of Finance, M. Francois Marsal; Foreign Affairs, Edmond Lefebvre Du Prey; Justice, Senator Antoine Rateur; Interior, Justin De Selves; War and Pensions, Andre Maginot; Labor and Hygiene, Paul Jourdain; Navy, Desre Ferry; Public Works, Yvesse Trocquer; Education, M. Landy; Commerce, Pierre Flaudin; Agriculture, M. Capus; Devastated Regions, Louis Marin; Colonies, Jean Fabry. The Ministry was made known after a final interview between President Millerand and M. Francois Marsal. It will make its appearance before Parliament on Tuesday when the Premier will read a message from President Millerand in the Chamber explaining the political situation as the President sees it. Simultaneously the Minister of Justice will perform a similar duty in the Senate. The entire appearance of the Cabinet before the Chamber is likewise likely to prove its farewell. The general impression is that France which has been without a responsible Government since June 1st, will have one Tuesday, but only for a few hours. The Francois Marsal Cabinet has already been referred to by its friends as an "evanescent cabinet" while the Opposition has dubbed it "the still born government." So certain is everybody who concerns himself with politics that the message from the President, the delivery of which to the parliament is the sole purpose of its formation, will find the Government in a minority upon the first vote.

SQUADRON WILL VISIT Nfld.

OTTAWA, June 7. The British battleships at present on the world cruise are scheduled to reach Esquimaux, June 21. The squadron is now in Honolulu. According to the naval service branch of the Department of National Defence, the ships will visit Victoria and Vancouver and leave for San Francisco July 5th, where they will remain until July 11. The two battle cruisers Hood and Repulse, will pass through the Panama Canal, while the four light cruisers will proceed down the coast of South America, visiting various ports, and home via Cape Horn. The Battle cruisers will make no stops in American Atlantic ports, the first port being Halifax on August 18th to September 2. The ships will be at Quebec. There will be a cruise through Newfoundland and Nova Scotian waters until September 17th, when the ships will leave for England.

LOEB BLAMES HIS PAL.

CHICAGO, June 8. All blame for the murder of Robert Francis is placed upon Nathan Leopold, Jr., by his former pal, Richard Loeb, in a confession made by the latter to State Attorney Crowe a week ago and made public on Saturday. "I want to say that I offer no excuse. If it was not for the suggestion and stimulus of Leopold the crime would not have been committed," Loeb said in ending his confession.

BOTH SOMEWHAT AT FAULT.

LONDON, June 8. The debate in the House of Commons on the Lausanne Treaty matter and the relation of the Dominions thereto will have done good, the Manchester Guardian says, if it leads to a re-arranging of the machinery required for the unification of the

entire policy. The Guardian commenting on Premier MacDonald's suggestion that if Great Britain were to engage in further negotiations involving either the honour or resources of the Empire these should be made the subject of very careful enquiry by constitutional representatives of Dominions as well as of Great Britain, says: "In this particular case (signing of the Lausanne Treaty) which has not the support of all the dominions an examination of the rapid fire cablegrams between London and Ottawa indicate that neither Great Britain nor Canada is altogether blameless. It clearly would have been better for the Home Government then and there to have discovered what the Canadian reservations in the signing of the Treaty implied. It is equally clear the Canadian Government might have volunteered more details in explanation."

SQUADRON REACHES HONOLULU.

HONOLULU, June 7. The special service squadron of the British navy headed by the battle cruiser Hood arrived here yesterday for a week's visit.

FOURTEEN DEAD IN COLLIERY EXPLOSION.

WILKESBARRE, Pa., June 8. Fourteen dead have been established as the total of the gas explosion on Friday at the Loomis Colliery of the Alden Coal Co. Two men are in hospital seriously injured, while four or five slightly hurt are at their homes.

EIGHT DROWNED WHEN LAUNCH SWAMPED.

SANTA ANA, Calif., June 8. Six men and two boys, members of a fishing party, were pounded to death on the rocks of Newport Bay Jetty here to-day when the launch in which they were heading out to sea was swamped and capsized. Five others were saved.

JURY DISAGREES.

MONTREAL, June 7. The jury in the trial of Giuseppe Serafini, charged with the murder of Henri Cleroux, Bank of Hochelaga messenger in the bank car hold-up,



BRITISH COMMUNISTS ACT.
LONDON, June 7. British Communists to-day showed their hand in the rail strike which is continuing to spread, while the public is awaiting further statements of the Government's intentions beyond Labor Minister Shaw's declaration that it would endeavour to maintain the public utilities and protect the men who are continuing to work. The Communist party of Great Britain issued a statement declaring the workers had tried vainly to get their grievance remedied through constitutional Trade Union methods, and charged that the National Union of Railwaymen did not intend to act.

LORD PIRRIE DIES AT SEA.
BELFAST, June 8. Word was received here to-day that Viscount Pirrie, Chairman of the Wolf Shipbuilding Company, has died at sea near the Panama Canal. Lord Pirrie accompanied by Lady Pirrie sailed March 20 from Southampton for a three months' visit to Brazil and Argentina to make an inspection of harbor conditions and port facilities for new steamers of the Harland and Wolff concern.

Game Wardens Keep Going With Mercury At 78 Below

Anchorage, Alaska, May 8. (A.P.)—Frank Dutresne, fur warden at Nome, and his trail assistant, Fay Delesene, a noted northern dog musher, encountered some of the coldest weather known in the territory during a trip last winter to the north of the Arctic Circle. Leaving Nome on the 1474 mile journey, the two first traveled to Safety, then to Bluff, across Norton Sound to the reindeer station; thence to Unalakleet and Kaltag, up the Yukon River to Nulato and on to Koyukak. From Koyukak they followed the military telegraph line and the Yukon River to Louden, Ruby, Kolvines, Birch and Port Gibbon. They next struck north to Alakakak,

swinging west in a circle to Shungnak and down the Kobuk River to Noorvik, Kotzebue, Keewalik, Candie and overland to Norton Sound and Nome.

For ten days at one stretch the mercury registered from 62 to 78 degrees below zero, according to Dutresne.

"An interesting fact," said Dutresne, "is that when the thermometer registers 60 degrees below or colder, animal life ceases to move and burrows into the snow, remaining there until the weather warms up."

MENTAL PUSHING.

A friend of mine has just gotten the new house which she started to build last summer completely finished. At last it is ready to move into.

But my friend, who has looked forward to this moment so eagerly, is not ready to move into it.

Instead she is going off to take a rest cure.

She has finished the house, as she puts it, and at the same time the house has finished her.

It is a lovely house, she had plenty of money to build it with and to correct mistakes when things didn't turn out as she had planned, and her friends cannot see why it should have tired her so.

"She didn't do anything to speak of."

"She didn't have to do anything but tell the architect and contractor and the decorator what she wanted done," says one of the neighbors. "I wonder how she would feel if she did as I did and painted all her walls and rubbed down all her floors herself. Then she might have something to be tired out over. As it is I don't see any reason why it should have tired her so. She didn't do anything to speak of."

In a way her critic is right. There isn't any reason why she needed to tire herself out so over the thing. But I think I can understand perfectly why she did.

And a sentence that I heard her use over and over again in the long months when the work was dragging along in the way such work almost always drags, is the key-note of that

"It doesn't seem as if I could wait to see how it is going to look," she would say to me over and over again about some effect that she was working towards.

She was always Pushing Forward. You could tell by her tone and her look just how eagerly she was trying to push the work forward with her mind.

And I think it was undoubtedly that impatience, that constant mental pushing that tired her out so completely.

It always does. There is no form of physical exercise that is any more exhausting than that mental exercise.

I know people who drive automobiles that say, "A car ahead" of them that they can't get by is something that their mind constantly pushes against. And they are the people who find driving so tiring.

A Day's Work To Push A Trolley Car.

When you are in a hurry to catch a train or to make an appointment and the trolley goes slowly, don't you sometimes catch yourself sitting forward in your seat all tensed up and trying to push the car along with your mind? And when you have been doing that don't you always arrive at your destination as worn out as if you had done a day's work? Small wonder it is a day's work for one man to push a trolley car even if he does it with his mind.

Mental pushing, whether it be of the trolley or of the auto, or of the slow workman, or of time itself, is something to be carefully avoided. You use up an amount of energy by it that is simply incalculable. And the worst of it is that you don't help things out one tiny bit. Could any use of energy be more foolish or more extravagant?


IT IS STRANGE.

A Pronouncement on a Definite Issue

With the poll declared in St. Barbe District the battle of the ballots has ended, and the Monroe Party have received a direct mandate from the people to proceed with the programme outlined in the Manifesto.

In the St. Barbe count appears a discrepancy between the number of votes polled and those recorded, but steps will doubtless be taken as soon as possible to ascertain how the error occurred.

The policy laid before the country was brief and definite. There were no tempting baits thrown out in the form of dazzling promises, and there was nothing introduced by the candidates of the Party during the campaign to divert the attention of the electorate from the main issue. The Report of T. Hollis Walker, K.C., had been read, marked, learned, and inwardly digested by the whole community, and the sweeping majority given the Liberal-Conservatives was due to their pledge to carry out the reforms which the Commissioner suggested, to allow nothing to interfere with the process of cleansing public life and of re-establishing the service on a new foundation.

During the campaign many irregularities were practised or condoned by the party repudiated by the country, and its defeat was in no small measure directly due to those irregularities. Abuses of public utilities were not uncommon, and Government officials in several cases so far forgot themselves as to take advantage of their positions to actively participate in the contest. It is common knowledge that even certain magistrates held and openly expressed partizan views, thereby showing that they were utterly lacking in a due appreciation of the responsibilities vested in them by virtue of their office.

The public, however, allowed nothing to interfere with their desire to uphold Right and to vindicate themselves in the eyes of the world. In commenting upon the Election results the Halifax Herald states the case exactly. "It is a result," it says, "that gives new point and meaning to the maxim that the good sense of the people will triumph in the end. . . . Political observers will . . . look upon it as a definite action backed by a determination on the part of a majority of the people to cut absolutely clear of the Old Order. And the people have done well; they have given a clear lead out of chaos and demoralizing conditions."

Time will be required and the patience of the public may be tested before the difficult work which lies before the Government is completed. We feel certain, however, that the confidence shown in the Monroe Party throughout the country will be regarded as a sacred trust, and that having put their hand to the plough, they will not turn back until their task has been fully and conscientiously carried out.

The meeting was brought to a close with the National Anthem and cheers for the Fighting Trio and the Monroe party.

Sudden Demise of Prominent Citizen

The passing of Mr. R. F. Goodridge occurred this morning under tragic circumstances. The deceased, the son of the late Hon. F. Goodridge, was born at St. John's in 1877. He was educated in England and engaged in business with his father's firm. He married Miss Frances McNeil, daughter of the late John McNeil, and leaves two sons and one daughter, all of whom are now in England. Mr. Goodridge took a prominent part in Cadets and resigned that post last year. His unexpected passing will be mourned with regret by a host of friends. The sympathy of the community, in which the Telegram joins, goes out to the family in their hour of bereavement.

DUNDEE GOT DECISION.

New York, June 2.—Johnny Dundee
defeated Louis Vicentini, Chilean
lightweight to-night at Madison
Square Garden.

Dundee gained the verdict after a
closely fought twelve-round contest,
before a crowd of nearly seven thou-
sand that paid \$18,000 to witness it.
The decision was greeted with dis-
favor by a large portion of the crowd
that seemed to have the belief that
the Chilean's stiffer punches had
given him the edge.

Dundee had an advantage in five
rounds and Vicentini in three, while
four appeared even. Vicentini tried
hard to penetrate Dundee's defence,
but seldom was able to land effecti-
vely on his bounding target.

Vicentini's most effective spurt
came in the last round. With but a
few seconds remaining, the Chilean
staggered Dundee with a swinging
right. As Dundee backed away
Vicentini followed with a battery of
stinging lefts and rights to the head.
The crowd was in an uproar for a
moment as Dundee seemed to wilt,
but the gone rang and the veteran
Italian jumped back, then shook hands
with his young opponent, apparently
as fresh as at the start. Neither
Dundee's featherweight or junior
lightweight titles were at stake, as
Vicentini's weighed 133½, Dundee
scaled 129½.

SWIMMING.

Some Fancy "Stunts."
Most fancy swimming, or, to give it
its true name, trick swimming, is
purely and simply a matter of muscle
control. Sometimes, for example, in
deep water, preparatory to making
the somersault, the swimmer treads
water while holding the arms out at
right angles to the body. He then
makes one strong stroke forward,
drops the head down and brings the
legs over, taking care to keep the
body curled up until the head comes
to the surface. The back somersault
is a little more difficult. From the
same initial position the body, includ-
ing the head, is bent back from the
hips, the knees are drawn under, and
a back spring, combined with a strong
stroke of the hands, does the rest.

Logging is a trick in which the side
muscles do the principal part of the
work. The swimmer floats with the
thumbs grasping, and by pure muscle
control—that is to say, without mov-
ing the arms or legs, turns over on
the side. The novice will find he can
only do this trick very slowly at
first, but as to the power of the mus-
cles increases, his body will roll over
and over, without any perceptible
movement of the muscles, as fast as
does a log in a swiftly flowing stream.

U. S. A. RECORDS.

The U. S. A. holds all world's
running records from 100 to 1,200
yards. England possesses the re-
cords from one to twenty-five miles.
U.S.A. holds seventeen of the nineteen
records in weight throwing, jump-
ing and relays, but the pole vault is
held by Charles Hoff, a Norwegian
who competed in 1920 for Denmark.
All distances at the Paris meets will
be on metric measurement basis. A
meter is a trifle more than one yard.
To simplify matters for those who
will attempt to translate meters into
yards, the following is submitted.
100 meters means 109 yards, 200
meters means 218 yards, 400 meters
means 436 yards, 800 meters means
872 yards, 1,500 meters means 1,635
yards, 110 meter hurdle 120 yards,
400 meter hurdle 436 yards.

COMPETE IN FIVE EVENTS.

As can be seen, the 200, 400, 800
and 1,500 meter races are just a bit
short of our 220, 440, 880 and mile
distance standards.

Those who try for pentathlon
honors must compete in five different
events, the biggest point winner of
those events being awarded the cham-
pionship. The decathlon involves
participation in ten events.

Then pentathlon and decathlon
events follow:
Pentathlon—Broad jump, javelin,
200 meter dash, discus, 1,500 meter
run, all same day.
Decathlon—100 meter dash, broad
jump, 16-pound shot put, high jump,
400 meter run, 110 meter hurdles,
discus, pole vault, javelin, all same
day, 1,500 meter run second day.

Naturally the man who wins the
decathlon is generally regarded as the
all-around champion of the meet
because he must demonstrate great

Great Fire of 1846

(H. F. SHORTIS.)

To-day is the 78th anniversary of the great fire in St. John's which occurred on the 9th of June, 1846, when the fire broke out in the western portion of the city, and the tongues of flames licked up everything before them. Before night closed in, about three-fourths of the city was in ruins. There was a high wind blowing during the evening, and the blazing brands and "flankers" were hurled over the whole city. At that time the majority of the houses were built of wood, but even the mercantile and other establishments, which were built of brick and stone, were swept away as quickly as those built of the more inflammable material. Few of the public buildings escaped, except the Government House. All others, such as the Post Office, Savings Bank, Bank of British North America, Custom House, Police Office, Exchange Buildings, Ordinance Stores, and numerous others were totally wiped out. To make matters worse, while the great conflagration was at its height, and the flames were spreading in all directions, the large oil vats took fire, and the flames spread over the waters of the harbor, and set fire to several vessels. It is estimated that twelve thousand people were rendered homeless, and the amount of property destroyed was valued at one million pounds. Yet the people did not despair, and vessels were quickly sent off for provisions, etc. When the British Government heard of the terrible calamity, the sum of £5,000 (five thousand pounds) was sent for immediate relief, and Parliament granted £25,000 more. Queen Victoria sent a letter to the Archbishops of Canterbury and York, and collections were taken up in the Churches, which greatly augmented the amount, and the people of the United States and Canada were not slow in rendering very valuable assistance by liberal contributions. Mr. James Macbride, who was so unjustly abused by one of our historians, sent out the sum of £100, and I know, he gave further assistance. Anyhow he was ever ready to extend a helping hand to Newfoundland and its people, and a poor return he received for his kindness, by having it said in one of our histories that when leaving Newfoundland he waved his hand, remarking, "Good-bye, you poor fools, etc." He did not say a word derogatory to Newfoundland or our people. He had previously advised the merchants as to what they had to expect, having foreseen that "hard times" were coming, but they would not listen to him, and the result was that they all went down with a crash.

There was no provision made for the future, and at the end of 1846, after the battle of Waterloo, the price of fish dropped from forty-five shillings to twelve shillings per quintal, and nearly all the large firms became hopelessly insolvent, and utterly unable to meet their creditors. Others who saved a little from the wreck, became despondent, wound up their affairs and left the country. About 900 cases from failures came before the courts, and the losses in bankruptcies amounted to £1,900,000 sterling. All classes of people suffered. In those days the fishermen and others left their money in the merchants hands, as there was very little business done with the banks, and when the merchants went down in the crash, about £400,000 of the people's money was lost—the hard earnings of years.

In looking over an old paper, dated April 30th, 1846, (the year of the great fire, and only six months before it occurred), I was struck with the tenor of the presentment of the Grand Jury, composed of the following gentlemen:—Nicholas Stabb, Esq., foreman; Hon. Lawrence O'Brien, Hon. John Kent, Thomas Glen, Thomas Rowe, Dugald McKillar, W. Lemessurier, T. G. Marey, J. I. Rogers, E. E. Jones, H. K. Bowring, S. Mudge, John McWilliam, Walker Dillon, Gilbert Clapp, and Edward Morris, Esqs. The majority of these gentlemen were intellectual giants, and largely in the commercial, professional and political life of our country, and their names are carved in marble in the history of Newfoundland. I wonder had they a premonition of what was going to happen when they made this presentment to the court? The Hon. Assistant Judge Des Barres, presiding, addressed the jury in reply to their presentment and said:

"There was a presentment which his Honor could not refrain from bringing under special notice of the Grand Jury, relative to the manifest want of a public safe for the security from fire of the public records, private deeds and official documents, deposited in the Registrar's Office. This is a subject of vast importance, involving a large amount of property, for if a fire should unfortunately occur, which Providence avert—and consume these papers, the consequences would be incalculable. His Honor had hoped that, as the matter had formerly been brought under the attention of the Court by the Grand Jury some members of that body, holding a seat in the General Assembly, would have exerted his influence to obtain the necessary means to construct a safe, yet he regretted that it seemed to have escaped their notice. Six weeks after, the greater portion of the city was in ruins, and it is not probable that the safe was procured in time, and, of course, many valuable documents, public records, deeds, etc., must have been destroyed with, as Judge Des Barres remarked, incalculable consequences.



THE NEW ST. MARY'S HOSPITAL.
 The home of the late Baron Shangnessy has been purchased by Rev. Thomas O'Reilly for the sum of \$65,000. At present it is to be used as the new St. Mary's Hospital, until such time as a site can be purchased and a large building erected. The Shangnessy home will then be a home for Catholic working girls, replacing the present one "Killarney" on LaSalle Street. In the meantime the campaign for funds for the new hospital is still in progress.

CHANGES AT THE CATHOLIC SAILORS' CLUB.

The Catholic Sailors' Building is being renovated and much needed improvements added. Large and more attractive common rooms, billiard rooms and rest rooms will be attractively equipped. Tiled bathrooms and shower baths are also being built.

Up till this year the club rooms and offices have been leased to outside organizations. This space will now be all given over to new reception rooms on the ground floor, and to the enlargement of the concert room in the rear of the building which has been used as a reception room will be turned over for a billiard room.

The most complete and interesting changes are being made in the concert hall, where entertainments are held every Wednesday evening. The stage in the rear end of the hall is being raised, and extended on both sides and in front. Dressing rooms and green rooms are being built on either side, and a bathroom underneath. The back of the old hall has been torn down, making it reach to the very front of the building. The space, by this arrangement, will serve a double purpose, as a reception room during the day, and a theatre by night. The same room will be used for chapel on Sunday mornings, when the stage will be transformed by a portable altar.

Not only has the interior of the building been changed, but the exterior also will be so scarcely recognizable when the contractors have completed their improvements and alterations. A large entrance is being built on St. Peter Street, while an entirely new stone front will transform the concert hall. The workmen will polish the stone on the rest of the building.

THE WEATHER STILL UNSETTLED.

May has been a very unsettled month, with dreary, cold, and rainy days holding sway. In fact it was more like April weather. Owing to the prevalence of frost, many people in the suburban districts are unable to do any planting.

LARGE NUMBER OF UNEMPLOYED.

The number of unemployed here is still very large, notwithstanding the opening of navigation and building operations. 


