



World Going to Be Dry in 1925

SCIENTISTS SAY.

Flaming Gas Tongues Shooting From the Sun's Surface Said to be Responsible for the Predicted Drought This Year.

London, Dec. 13.—The year 1925 will be the driest the universe has experienced this century, an official of the British Meteorological Department said in explaining a new discovery which enables experts to pick out the wet and dry years to come. The drought to come will dry up not only hese soggy islands, but will extend to the rest of the world.

This statement was made after much study on the part of weather scientists, and as the result of the discovery that a close connection exists between rainfull, particularly in Great Britain, and the frequency of solar prominences. The latter are explained to be the tongues of flaming gas that dart out from the sun's surface. sometimes 250,000 miles and at a speed of more than 150 miles an hour. Experts say mathematical curves ndicate a relationship that is too definite to be overlooked, say the department chiefs.

First Noticed About 1865.

This relatively is nothing new. It was noticed about 1865, and for the next twenty-five years every fifth year in England was wet, the other four being dry or normal. A delay has been caused in the report of the School Commission appointed by the Provincial Government, owing to the absence of Commissioner Geoffrion, who is at present in Europe. Two days ago. Commissioner J A Rickard died, which leaves only one Catholic representative at present. Sir Lomer Gouin. It is said that the Protestant Board will still continue to educate the Jewish children on condition that the Catholics contribute a million dollars of their taxes. Such a proposition seems to be absurd, as they have not sufficient moneys to meet their own obligations. Verdun practically wants the Catholic landlords to pay their taxes when Protestant tenants lease their houses from them to the Protestant Board, which would mean double taxation for such landlords. The Quebec Legislature will scarcely agree to such propositions, and unless some other commendations are made, the Jewsh school question and the Verdun Protestant School troubles will be left unsolved.
