The adjourned investigation of the charges against Mr. Peter Robb of Mooretown was proceeded with yesterday at Tiviotdale before a bench of Magistrates, Adam Hunt, Esq., chairman. Mr. A. H. Macdonald appeared for the defence. Mr. Robb was charged with receiving a large number of sheep from one Donally, knowing them to be stolen. The sheep were the property of nine separate persons, each of whom had laid an information. It however appeared from the pletely.
