The Proposed New Hall.
To the Editor of the Mercury:

DEAN SIR,—I notice with pleasure that
you have devoted space in your journal
to the subject of the proposed new Town to the subject of the proposed new Town Hall, and I hope that now it is before the ratepayers they will give it the consideration that a matter of its importance

Although I am in favor of giving our butchers all the accommodation they require, and am fully impressed with the quire, and am fully impressed with the fact that we need a larger Hall, those who have read reports of the proceedings of the Town Council will notice that I have opposed the adoption of either of the present schemes. I have given my reasons for so doing in the Council, but it will do no harm, and may do some good, to give them more publicly, and

have the subject ventilated a little.

The position I take is, that it is neither necessary nor expedient to have the butcher stalls and Music Hall under the butcher stalls and Music Hall under the same roof. You, Mr. Editor, and others who have travelled will have noticed that in most cities they are kept separate, and very properly so, for a site that is suitable for one is sometimes unsuitable for the other, as in the present case; for while the thunder of a passing train does not seriously interfere with the business of selling most, &c., those who sing or speak in public, or attend concerts and lectures, know what an intolerable nuisance it is to them to have the effect of a choice piece of music, or an interesting speech, spoiled by having to stop while trains are passing, and talk or mutter their wishes in regard to the G. T. R. and the city fathers who built the Hall.

Then, again, the style of architecture suitable for the one is too costly for the other. Music Halls are classed with public buildings, and are supposed to be an ornament to their location and a pride to their owners, but butcher, fish same roof. You, Mr. Editor, and others who have travelled will have noticed

public buildings, and are supposed to be a no rnament to their location and a pride to their owners, but butcher, fish and vegetable stalls are built for business, and while they should have every necessary convenience, should be built in plain style, so that the cost would be within the reach of those who do business in them, without being let at a sacrifice.

Another, and the last argument that I will give you in favor of separating the two interests, is that it is impossible to keep the streets and surroundings of market stalls in a state that would be in keeping with a Music Hall. The necessary and proper standing of horses and carts, the litter of dirt, the weighing of hogs, the weighing and storing of hides, &c., make the streets, walks, and walls look anything but what they should be of a building costing \$22,000 for the bare building and \$30,000 before it is furnished, as will be the case if the proposed scheme is carried out. Proof of this any ratepayer can have who will take a look under the verandah over the present butcher market.

My opinion is that the present market should be kept intact, and as a matter of course, if those who do business there, need more accommodation, they should have it, and I think that to enclose part or all the vegetable sheds, or build a more substantial place for them, these would answer every purpose, but I have too much regard for the welfare of the town to spend \$30,000 of the people's money to build a Music Hall on a railroad where the traffic is increasing, and the nuisance becoming so great that I believe inside of five years the Hall would have to be abandoned, or used for something else, especially as there is now being a switch laid down for loading cars, and a central depot is taked about, to be placed in the immediate vicinity.

If we need, and are going to build a Music Hall, don't let us have it in a place where we shall have to give all our songs and speeches to a railroad accompaniment.

At the opening of the House a very large number of petitions were presented in favor of a prohibitory liquor law.

Owing to the unusual occurrence of a heavy fall of snow in the ordinarily warm regions of Grevethe aspect of that country has been lately changed into that of a Siborian landscape, and terrible distress has been caused to the inhabitants of some of the mountain villages, who have been unable to get provisions, owing to their communication with the outer world being interrupted. With some difficulty a party of villagers from the mountainsmanaged to make their way the other day through the snow diffs to Gane, and made known to the authorities the sore need of provisions in the mountain-ous districts. A supply of grain was accordingly sent off to the starving people, but on approaching Keramia the convoy stuck fast in the snow and was unable to proceed. A number of villagers, however, hearing that supplies were at hand, managed to reach the spot where they convoy had had halted, and carried the welcome sacks of corn to their hungry families.

Great reductions have been made in the engineering staff of the Intercolonial Railway, affecting a saving of between \$40,000 and \$50,000 per annum in salieries. As the works near completion other reductions will be made, and towards the closs of the year the staff will be very small. The old staff cost about \$90,000 per annum.
