"Into this scrape, and some others of the same kind, the Mail has been betrayed by the same temper, or the same influence which has led it to depart generally from its programme, and thereby to disappoint the hopes of its friends and of the public 1 ts programme led us to believe that it would not be the mere tool of a political clique, but a good general newspaper, and on this basis its founders not only appealed to the public, but, if we are rightly informed, obtained subscriptions. In point of literary ability, of enterprise in the collection of news, and of typography, the Mail has not fallen short of the general expectation, though the literary ability has almost been quenched by the fetid system of party invective and personalty. In other respects it has been a calamitous disappointment. From the very outset it became the tool not only of a clique, but almost of a single politician. Instead of public manners; instead of purifying the political atmosphere, it has loaded it with a fresh taint. That the line it has taken has been the best for its stockholders, nobody can believe, who has persuaded himself that a narrow constituency is a better basis of circulation than a broad one. One of the most successful orators who ever addressed the masses used to say that there are two things which always told with them—a good story and a generous sentiment. Even for the purpose of a party, the object should have been to gain the public conscience, as the Mail did at the time of the Pacific Rallway Scandal."

A sistor to the Seaforth salt wells write as follows:—A very thick bed of roce salt seems to underlie this whole region of country. The wells are bored to the depth of ten or twenty hundred feet; the water from the springs that are penetrated in the downward passage is allowed to flow down upon the bed, and then having the salt solution, is again pumpup into the reservoirs. Such wells are put down at Clinton and Goderich and at Kineardine. In some cases the salt rock itself has been penetrated about one hundred feet, and not yet pierced entirely through. The stratum of this wonderful thickness seems to extend many miles east and west, and to have a considerable breadth north and south, so as to indicate an inexhaustible supply of this great preservation.

All the presbyteries had approved of the remit. The Presbytery of London had approved simpliciter by the casting vote of the Moderator, the only question being the resolution anent modes of worship. The Presbytery of Guelph had carried the basis simpliciter by 16 to 6. The basis was approved simpliciter by 217 sessions, while eight disapproved of the resolution on modes of worship. Only one session disapproved generally. The basis was approved simpliciter by 231 congregations, disapproved by one generally, and by six on the ground of the resolution on modes of worship. Piffteen Presbyteries approved simpliciter of the remit on the constitution of the next General Assembly, and one—the Presbytery of Paris—disapproved on the ground that it was autonstitutional.
