Meeting of Government Representatives for the Promotion of Emigration

The convention of representatives from the Governments of Ontario, Quebec, Nova Scotia, and New Brunswick, met on Tuesday afternoon at Ottawa, along with a deputation from the Federal Cabinet, in the office of the Minister of Agriculture, Hon. M. LeTolier de St. Just presided. A discussion took place as to the best mode of promoting immigration from the European continent, especially from the United Kingdom. A scheme of joint and harmonious action on the part of the Dominion and the various Provincial Governments was under consideration.

MEETINGS OF THE ASSEMBLY AND SYNOD. A resume of the proceedings of these two bodies, which met at Toronto on Tuesday, will be of interest to our readers. In the General Assembly of the Canada Presbyterian Church, no business of importance was transacted the first day. On Wednesday, the Rev. Dr. Burns, of Montreal, brought up a motion on temperance, expressing approval of a Prohibitory Liquor Law, and calling for the passage of that, recommending the Legislature to adopt any lesser measure which may seem likely to abridge the evils of intemperance. The motion was carried by a very large majority.

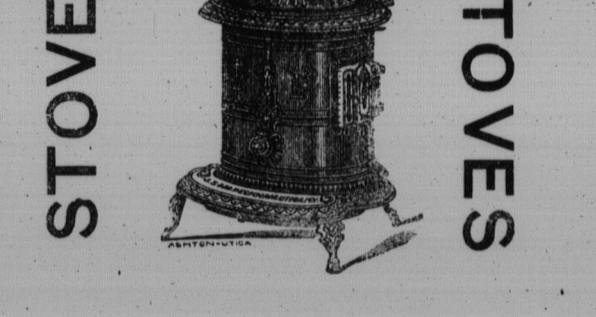
