



Washington, April 22—Secretary of State Bryan is about to launch his first distinctive policy of International im-portance. It is a plan for promotion of world peace, which contemplates the negotiation of treaties between the United States and all the civilized na-tions of the earth. It will have as its most original feature, a temporary limitation upon the armament and war proparations of disputing nations. Mr. Bryan discussed his plan inform-ally with members of the senate com-
