Three witnesses were called, but their evidence went to show that they had their heads read by her and that there was no "fortune telling" about the performance.

Whereupon Madame paced smilingly up to the court, and in her thankfulness of heart held out her dexter hand to the bench, in order of seniority. But Magistrate Barker declined her thanks, and told her in plain, unvarnished terms that, had the evidence borne out the charge, he should have been obliged to commit her to the common jail.

The verdict was really one of, "Not guilty, but don't do it again." Mayor Tolmie said that, while the case had not been proven, he was of the opinion that there was something serious behind it all. 





The Deputy Registrar of Peterboro Was Afraid Re'd "Upset the Constitution," and He Has a Wife and Seven Children - The Pathetic Testimony of a Frightened Witness Before the Public

Accounts Committee, The Public Accounts Committee of the Legislature had a field day on Saturday, when the Registrars of East Northumberland and Peterborough, whose attendance they have been so long endeavoring to secure,

were up for examination. Dr. Mallory, Registrar of East Northumberland, stated in regard to the accusation that he had returned under the item of expenses \$500 for extra work done by himself, that the work was really done by his deputy, though put in his name. The deputy had ted this course because it had been done by his predecessor. As a rule he had given more than the time required to the duties of his office. He admitted having gone to Algoma to take part in the Dominion election campaign of '91, but claimed that he had the right to take a holiday, as he had had none for several years. His gross income from his medical practice might be about \$1500; his net income from that source was about \$500. He managed the business of the drug store of Spalsbury & Co., but the actual work was done by a clerk. He himself was a licensed pharmacist, but the clerk was not. He also owned a newspaper.

A Scared Deputy. Henry Grundy, deputy registrar of Peterboro, a depressed, nervous-looking man, next took the stand. He answered the ions put to him by Mr. Whitney in a very low tone of voice and with much hesi-tation. He stated that the work of comtation. He stated that the work of comparing was not regularly done. Documents stamped as having been compared had turned out to be incorrect. Probably the number of such in his experience was 200 to 250. Outside parties had changed the wording of documents after registration. In some cases instruments had been registered without the fees being paid. Documents of his own had been registered and not charged for, and also one for Mr. Stratton, M.L.A., and in some other cases.

Then Mr. Whitney began to press him erry hard as to any conversations he had held with anyone about the testimony he would give. The reluctance of the witness increased and for some time he refused to answer. Chairman Awrey said he must answer any questions put.

Mustn't Compromise the Government. "It's a pretty hard thing," said the witness athetically, "for a man to be placed in a sition like this. I have a wife and seven children, and when I go back to Peterboro to-morrow I may be told that I'm not wanted." He went on to say that he had called on Mr. Stratton to ask him as to the examination. "Now, are you insinuating that Mr. Stratton didn't want you to tell the truth?"

He went on to say that the changes made in documents subsequent to registration were all of minor character not affecting the important parts of the instruments.

Everybody who came to the office would have something to say about it." On being further urged by Mr./Harcourt to remember what had been said and to give further names, he burst out in the desperation of a timid, nervous man worried beyond endurance.

Terribly Worried Over It. "If you talk to me like that I won't answer you a word. You can't browbeat me! I'm pretty sick of this business. I've been terribly worried over it."

Chairman Awrey assured him that no harm

would come to him.
"Why, how can I remember what everyone said to me about it? It was the regular talk of the street. Why, one of the lawyers said if Grundy went up to Toronto he'd up-

set the constitution!"
Of course this raised a general laugh, and considerable chaffing ensued, and Grundy, seeing the situation was not so desperately serious as he had imagined, looked reassured,


