Council met at the Court House, Bridge-

town, on Tuesday, the 16th day of April,

A. D. 1889, at 4 o'clock, P. M.

The Warden and all the Councilors of the

Municipality present, except Councilor

James J. Ritchie, Jr.

Minutes of annual session, 1888, read and

approved.

Upon reading the petition of Jas. M.

Dolan and others, praying for the closing

of the "Parland" canal in Ward

No. 3, and also the petition of George

Bruce and others; It was ordered, That

a committee be appointed to inquire into

the propriety of closing said canal and

report, if possible at the present session.

Committee—Robert Langley, W. Dan-

iel, and Minard C. Beal.

Upon reading the amended report of

Edmund P. Smith, John Phelan, and Wm.

H. Durbin, a committee appointed to in-

quire into the propriety of opening a new

road from a point near the intersection of

Treat Lake Brook with the New Albany

road, to the most convenient point on the

Nova Scotia Central Railway, a distance

of one mile and a half; It was ordered,

That the same be received, and that the

Clerk post notices as required by statute.

Upon reading the petition of Stephen

Sprowl and others, praying for the same

to be laid over.

Resolved, That the sympathy of the

Council be extended to Councilor Vitto

in account of injuries, and that he be al-

lowed to address the Council from his

chair.

Adjoined to 9 o'clock Wednesday

morning.

WEDNESDAY MORNING.

Council met at 9 o'clock.

All the Councilors present except Council-

ors E. J. Elliott, J. S. Ritchie, Jr., J. D.

Miner and Wm. Piggott.

Minutes read and approved.

Upon reading the petition of D. I. Morse

and others, asking that the district there-

described be assessed in a sum not exceed-

ing two hundred dollars, and that the per-

centage be assessed on the property owned

therein; It was ordered, That the prayer

of said petition be granted.

ordered, That the same be received, and

that he be allowed to perform his statute

labor on his own private road, under the

supervision of the Surveyor of Highways.

ris, Collector, Ward No. 10, be referred to

the committee on assessments.
