There is considerable excitement at Bass River and Portaupique, over the discovery of coal lately made on Por aupique Mountain, by Messis. Rolt, and Alexander McNeil. These men some time ago took out a mining lease, and have since, with the sedifference of an expert, done considerable prospecting. It is reported that a 12-fo t seam of coal has been located. The fortunate owners are now sinking a shaft, and the prospects are excellent for their future success. This new coal find is situated about four miles from the wharf at Bass River, and a few rola from the "Big Trestlo" on the Pole Railway of the Fossil Flour Company.

Two of the most interesting automata now working within the limits of the United States are those used by the government for counting and tying pestal cards into amail bundles. These machines were made in Connecticut, and the two are capable of counting SOUREM cares in ten hours and wrapping and tying the same in packages of twenty-five each. In this operation the paper is pulled off a drum by two long "fingers" which come up from below, and another tinger dus in a vat of mucilage and applies itself to the wrapping paper in equally the right spot. Other parts of the machine twine the paper around the pack of cards and then a "thumb" preses over the suot where the mucilage is, and the package is thrown upon a carry belt ready for delivery.

New shingle mills are still being erected in Restigouche, there are upwards of 100 machines running, some of them night and day. Of course, politics are largely responsible for this state of affairs; for during the first three weeks of last month universal attention was given to election affairs—doubtless to the detriment of business--for, in such a time, there is always a wholesale postpone. ment of orders, of huying and of payments, owing to the elections being made an excuse for delay.

The circulation last month increased \$941,000 over that of Max, and was thus raised \$230,000 above the figures of June last year, and nearly two millions above the circutation in May, 1895, in which month the note issues went down to an extremely low mark. But the movement of circulation in June is always somewhat eccentric. In some years the increase in that month reaches several millions. In 1872, for mstance, the increase in June was \$3,986,000, while in the same month of the following year it was only \$600,000. But this year the comparative smallness of the increase indicates that not only was the movement of agricultural products less than had been anticipated, but that the prices secured for it were lower on the average than those ruling a year ago. Unfortunately the outlook for prices is not encouraging at present. All forms of agricultural produce are exceptionally cheap at the moment, and since it is to the prices obtained for these, and the volume of their movement, that the fluctuations in circulation must be principally ascribed, it is hardly likely that the returns for July will show much improvement in this respect over those of June.

In view of this fact it is difficult to believe that the increase of \$1,044,000 m the volume of current loans indicates any real increase in the over-turn of trade, although it is too evenly distributed among the banks to be ascribable to any single large transaction, such as the transfer of railway deposits, or the negotiation of bonds. Canada is marvellously rich in minerals, and yet, during the year 1895, only 102,797 tons of iron ore, valued at \$238,070, were mined in this country and the total bounty paid at the rate of \$2 per ton for pig iron smelted in Canada was but \$63,-384, showing that the year's output of the Dominion was only 31,692 tons, while 376,003 tons were imported

This is possibly due to the high cost of a blast furnace plant and the consequent doubt as to whether the works will be able to pay a satisfactory dividend in this country on the capital invested. The plant usually consists of from one to mue furnace stacks. Each stack is composed of a shell or casing made of furnace is closed by a bell or cone, so

that the gases formed by the combustion of the fuel are diverted into one or more large tubes, termed "down takes," having near the ground level "dust catchers," in which the heavier particles carried over are deposited, and subsequently carried away. From these dust chambers the gas is conveyed in pipes to the boilers and hot blast stoves where it is used as fuel.

The blast enters through tuyers which are water cooled, and these generally fit into breasts similarly arranged. Cinder is tapped through an opening kept cool by water, and the dam from which the iron flows from the furnace is protected in like manner, while all round the hearth or crucible, and often on the boshes large quantities of water are applied by jets or sprays. The supply of water for a modern blast furnace is, in fact, no inconsiderable item.

As the smelting of the ores proceeds crucible, and the gangue from which it is relieved unites with the flux to form einder, which, being of less specific gravity, floats on the iron, and protects it from oxidation. As the emder accumulates, it is tapped off, and every six or eight hours the iron is drawn out. The cinder runs either into cinder moulds, or into cars, by which it is taken to the slag pile, while the iron runs in a trough made through the centre of a large building known as a cast house, the floor of which, being of sand, is filled with moulds, connecting with the main trough by means of auxiliary channels, or "sows." The moulds which are the final receptacle for the molten metal, being attached to the sow, are known as "pigs." When cold, the pigs are broken from the sows, graded, and piled for shipment.

The system of grading adopted varies greatly in different sections of the country, and, in fact, at neighboring furnaces. Some recognize but four grades, which are known as numbers produced when the furnace is very hot and has the greatest percentage of graphitic carbon, the crystallization being large and distinct. The last is the product from a cold furnace, the carbon being in the combined form, and the fracture white and lamellar. Other furnaces have five, six, and as high even as sixteen grades, although non seldom receives a number greater than five or six, the intermediate grading being distinguished by letters, half numbers or special names, such as "IA," "2B," "2½," "3½," "mot-tled,""silver-gray," "white," "open,"

The work of the fields falls entirely upon the women, who start off ground and raise the grain and corn. Millet or sorghum, called mabele by the Matabeles and imphi by the other tribes, constitutes their principal food. The cooking is carefully attended to by the men


A NEW BUTTER-MAKING MACHINE.

A machine invented by Mr. Salenius, a Swedish Engineer, makes butter in about a minute from sterilized milk direct. Milk is heated in the sterilizer to 160 degrees F., and runs into the cream-skimming chainber of the machine. As the cream is skimmed it rises into the churning chamber, being cooled down to sixty degrees in its progress by means of very small cooling frames, through which ice water constantly passes; these revolve with the skimmer at the rate of 6000 revolutions per minute. The cream is forced into a tube nerforsted with kiny holes, through which it emerges with great force upon each fresh layer of cream that rises, converting it into bu ter by concussion. The butter, thus formed by granules, emerges from a spout into a tub, mixed with buttermilk. The butter is then taken out and passes through a butter worker, which sources out most of the buttermilk remaining, after which it is placed on ice for two hours, and then worked a little more and made up. Sevoral advantages are claimed for this remarkable machine, which bid fair to create a revolution in butter-making upon a large scale. In the first place, by Pasteurizing the milk, disease germs, if any are in it. are destroyed, as well as the microbes which cause putrefaction of the butter. The process of butter making is so rapid that there is very little chance of any germs that may exist in the atmosphere of the dairy getting into the butter, especially as all, or nearly all, air must be forced out of the chamber of the machine by the extreme rapidity of the movement going on inside. When the butter is once pressed, the possibility of germ impregnation is almost eliminated. Thus a wholesome and long-keeping butter is produced. Another advantage is that milk can be converted into butter directly after being obtained from the cow; and yet another is that there is a considerable saving of labor, when the use of the "radiator" is compared with that of the ordinary separator and and churn.



of silver. That is to say, while 23.22 grains of pure gold went to the dollar in gold. 371} grains of pure silver were required for a silver dollar. With the alloy added it took 25.8 grains of standard gold for the dollar in gold, and 4123 grains of standard silver for the eilver dollar. The provision of this law as to silver, was repealed in 1873, and this provision the silverites now demand to have reenacted. As a matter of fact, an ounce of silver was worth in the markets of the world, from 1834 to 1873, more than one sixteenth of an ounce of gold, the value in Europe being at the rate of 15} to 1. Consequently, our silver com was exported as fast as it was coined, gold became the only coin in circulation, and in 1853 small change had become so scarce that C . gress authorized silver halves and quart rs of a dollar to be coined on Gov ernment account exclusively, of less weight than the proportionate parts of r full dollar, so that two halves and four quarters contained only 384 grains of standard eilver, instead of 4124 grams. At the present moment, the market value of silver bullion relatively to that of gold bullion is as about 31 to 1. That is to say, one ounce of gold is exchangeable in the market for 31 ounces of silver. Hence, if the law of 1834 relating to silver were reenacted, the dollar would sink in value very nearly one-half, because under free and unlimited coinage, silver coin would be worth no more than silver bullion. The rosson that the silver dollars now in circulation remain equal in value to dollars in gold is that the quantity of them is limited, and they are received by the Govemment on the same footing as gold in payment of duties and taxes.

FROZFN SALMON FREIGHTS.

The Canadian Pacific Railway is now in correspondence with a prominent English business house on the subject of the carrisge of frozen salmon between British Columbia and Great Britain, over our transcontinental road. For a year or more the salmon exporters of New Westminster have been building up a large trade in frozen salmon with England, but they have been shipping it by way of Australia. THE AUSTRIAN CURRENCY.

Nearly four years have now elapsed since the laws for the reform of the Austro-Hungarian currency came into force. It cannot be said, however, that the hopes for a speedy introduction of a gold standard which were originally entertained have been realized. It was to be anticipated that monetary reform in a country like Austria-Hungary could not be accomplished in a day. Nevertheless, there was reason to believe that the requisite linancial operations would take a normal course, and that no undue delay would occur in the projected resumption of specie payments. This, however, has not proved to be the case, and the prolongation of the reform is causing considerable inconvenience to the public at large,

It must, however, be borne in mind that as yet practically no gold has been issued. The present currency chiefly consists of Bank and State notes of comparatively large denominations, together with bulky one-florin silver pieces, and minor silver, and nickel and bronze coins of the new crown system. It is this which is causing so much annoyance to the general public. The withdrawal of the small bank notes and the substitution for them of heavy coin has not contributed to facilitate the transaction of business, to say nothing of the inconvenience caused by the carrying of quantities of small coin about the

Various reasons are advanced to account for the delay which has occurred in the completion of the reforms. It is urged that so long as the Austro-Hungarian Ausgleich and the divers financial questions connected therewith are not settled, it will be impossible to proceed with the reforms. Moreover, it is pointed out that the views entertained by the State and the Directors of the Austro-Hungarian Bank with regard to the renewal of the charter of that institution are so divergent, that unless some arrangement is arrived at in the near future there is every prospect of still further postponement.

During the past few weeks conferences have repeatedly taken place in Vienna and Buda-Pesth, but they have as yet led to no definite result. As matters now stand, the authorities are willing, under certain conditions, to renew the charter of the bank for a term of twelve years. On the other hand, the representatives of the bank require a charter extending over not less a period than fifteen years, and, should it be granted, they are prepared to make several minor concessions to the Government. Furthermore, an understanding will have to be arrived at relative to the participation of the Government in the management and in the annual profits of the establishment, tegether with various other items of more or less importance.

The local stock market is recovering slowly from the petty panic which marked the opening of the week, although it would be unsafe to say that all the liquidation is over.
