### COVERS FOR BINDING.

THE publishers have issued a handsome cloth case for blading the first volume of "THE CAXADIAN MONTHIN" ending with the June number. The cost will be40c., or by postfree for 50c. City subscribers can have their volumes bound, including case, for 75c. The pub-lishers will issue gratuitously with the Sept. number an elegant tinted duplicate title-page, preserving the em-blematic character of the magazine cover. Subscribers had better, therefore, wait receipt of this before binding the volume. the volume.

### THE APPROACHING BOOK SEASON.

NOTHING could be more suggestive of the prosperity of a country, or could more satisfactorily indicate its status among nations than a statement of its intellectual condition and the record of its book consumption. Canada, in this respect, stands well; and, judging from the value and extent of her book-importations and the development and activity of her book-trade, she asserts for herself a high position in the intellectual scale of nations. No doubt, when she becomes a producer in the bookworld, and has done more in developing a native literature than she has hitherto done, her people may more justly claim recognition of this feature in her historythe active literary taste and habits of her people. In proportion to the population, however, there is no dependency of the Crown whose book-imports exceed that of Canada ; and the extent of the increase of that trade is a remarkable and gratifying feature in her national progress. And though our native production has not been very considerable, yet, bearing in mind how our printing industries have been trammeled by the foolish restrictions of the English Copyright law-from which the American press has been free, and which has been

the great stimulus to its development-we have no reason to be ashamed of our achievement in this respect.

What the value of the total annual book-production of Canada is we cannot place before our readers ; but the following figures in regard to one City, that of Montreal (not the chief literary centre of the Dominion, it will be borne in mind) will indicate in some degree, the progress of the trade amongst us. In 1824, with a population of 20,000, Montreal had one Iron printing press (the only one in the country, we believe). In 1847, the population being 84,000, the first Book-press (Adams' platen press) was introduced ; and to-day, having now a population of about 130,000, one house alone, that of Mr. John Lovell, has 14 Book printing-presses running, and employs over 100 printers, besides a large staff of bookbinders and others engaged in the kindred branches of the trade. The Newspaper press of the country is equally active, Ontario alone, having some 25 daily newspapers, 25 monthly periodicals and 200 weekly issues of the press. These facts are encouraging; and, when the high character, generally, of these issues is considered, we may safely augur well for the future of the country. Moreover, should the native trade have justice done it in regard to the republishing of English Copyrights for the home markets, in competition with that of the United States, we shall, no doubt, ere long, have to chronicle a more remarkable and gratifying progress. In the meantime, the Book-imports of the Dominion, as we have stated, are very large and continue each year to increase at a rapid ratio. The age is marvellously a producing one, and in the field of literature, thanks to the activity, thought and enterprise of authors and publishers, books which formerly were the luxury of the few, are now the heritage and possession of the many. Each year increases the value and importance of the publishers' catalogues; and, with the lists of the current productions of the day, the attractions of the producing markets are many and varied. With the other importing houses of the country, the publishing firm of this serial have been active in these markets this season ; and through the channel of the retail trade, the public may expect an ample feast of good things in literature which must delight the most fastidious and appease the most voracious reader.

We append the jottings of a portion of the doings of the home publishing houses for the new season, and our advertising pages will give some further information in regard to these forthcoming issues. In our next number we purpose to supply a list of, and some information in regard to, the new publications in the Educational World,—an important field to a large proportion of the readers in our communities, and a department in which Messrs. Adam, Stevenson & Co., have made extensive and important purchases. This firm, it may be added, now represent every important British Publishing House, besides the leading houses of the American trade; and it may serve to indicate the extent of the trade connections of the Colony with the Mother Country in the business of book-importing, when we state that Messrs. A., S & Co., have direct dealings with over one hundred British Publishing Houses, themore important of whose publications will be found in their Trade Catalogues, and represented in their warerooms.

MR. JOHN MURRAY will shortly publish a new work by Mr. Darwin, on "The Emotions in Man and Animals." This work may be considered as a sequel to the author's interesting volumes on "The Descent of Man," and will, no doubt, be hailed with a good deal of interest. It is to be ready about the middle of November, and will have a number of photographic illustrations. From the same house we shall have the second volume of "The Speaker's Commentary," on "The Historical Books," prepared by the Bishop of Bath and Wells, the Rev. T. E. Espen, and Rev. George Rawlinson; a "Life of George Grote, the Historian of Greece," edited, with selections from his correspondence, by Mrs. Grote ; a work by Mr. Chas. M. Clode, Solicitor to the War Department, on "The Administration of Justice under Military and Martial Law"; a "History of the Royal Regiment of Artillery," by Capt. F. Duncan, the 1st volume of which will bring the history to the peace of 1783; and a work of Lord Houghton's, entitled "Monographs." Mr. Murray will also have soon ready cheaper editions of Sir R. Murchison's "Siluria, a History of the Oldest Rocks in the British Isles and other Countries," and of Earl Stanhope's "Reign of Queen Anne." A new edition of the late Mr. Grote's profound work on "Aristotle," edited by Alex. Bain, LL.D., and G. C. Robertson, in two volumes, is also preparing. Two recent issues from Mr. Murray's press, which have met with very encouraging sale, we commend to our readers ;- the one an exceedingly interesting biography, that of the Rev. Dr. Cooke, of Belfast, by his son-in-law, Prof. J. L. Porter, D.D., and the other a valuable statistical work, of great service to the commercial classes of the country : Prof. Levi's "History of British Commerce, and of the Economic Progress of the British Nation." The period covered by the volume is from 1765 to 1870, and the work may be had, as well as all the important publications of Mr. Murray's press, from any native bookseller, through the house of the publishers of this serial. Messrs. A. S. & Co. make also large importations of the various educational works issued by Mr. Murray, particularly those of Dr. Wm. Smith, in history and classics, and will now supply them as advantageously as the American reprints of those well known and approved text books.

MESSES. LONGMAN'S new publications embrace a valuable reference work, prepared with a vast amount of labour, by the late B. B. Woodward, B.A., Librarian to the Queen, and edited by Wm. L. R. Cates, entitled "A

Encyclopædia of Chronology, Historical and Biographical." The work comprises the dates of all the great events in history, including treaties, alliances, wars, battles. &c. Incidents in the lives of eminent men and their works, scientific and geographical discoveries, mechanical inventions, and social, domestic and economical improvements, &c., &c. Mr. Buckle's "Miscellaneous and Posthumous Works"; Mr. Glennie's work on "The Moining Land; (Travel and Discussion in the Birth-Countries of Christianity with the late Mr. Buckle) and Mr. R. A. Proctor's new work, "Orbs Around Us," will be among the forth-coming issues of this firm; also a handy text book for divinity students, by the Rev. W. E. Littlewood, "The Essentials of New Testament Study," consisting of an account of the Greek and English Texts, with lives of the writers and introductions to each book, a harmony of the gospels, life of Christ, chronology of the Acts, &c. A new historical work by Mr. J. L. Sanford, author of "Studies and Illustrations of the Great Rebellion," will be among the approaching issues of this firm. Its subject will be "Estimates of the English Kings, from William the Conqueror to George III." A volume of much interest to English readers, from the intimacy of the subject of the biography with the late Prince Consort and the Queen, will be found in the "Memoirs of Baron Stockmar," translated from the German by Prof. Max Muller, shortly to be published. Prof. Tyndall's contributions to the "Philosophical Transactions," on the subject of "Molecular Physics," will also shortly appear from Messrs. Longman's press; a new volume from Messre. Cox & Jones, of a mythological character, will also appear in "Tales of the Teutonic Lands," and will form a sequel to the " Popular Romances of the Middle Ages;" as well as a new work by A. K. H. B., the Country Parson, entitIed "Sea Side Musings on Sundays and Week-days."

MESSRS. H. S. KING & Co's new publications will comprise the first volume of the new "International Scientific Series of Text-Books, on "The Forms of Water in Rain and Rivers, Ice and Glaciers" by Prof. J. Tyndall, LL.D., F.R.S.; a volume of Sketches of Statesmen, by Mr. J. W. Reed, entitled "Cabinet Portraits;" a collection of Sketches of the Bar and the Press, by two Idle Apprentices, bearing the title of "Briefs and Papers;" and a new edition , revised, with an introductory dissertation on recent changes and events, of Mr. Walter Bagehot, on "The English Constitution." This house are also producing translations of the more important of the German official works on the Franco-Prussian War, a number of which have been published; also three volumes of their new Cornhill Library of Fiction, the popular stories of Mr. C. Gibbon, "Robin Gray"; "Kitty," by Miss Edwards, and "Hirell," by Mr. J. Saunders; also from the same firm, a new work by the Rev. H. R. Haweis, author of "Music and Morals," entitled "Thoughts for the Times," on such subjects as Christianity, The Bible, The Articles, Life, V'orship, &c.

CHAPMAN & HALL'S now list contains announcement, as in press, of the second volume of Mr. John Forster's "Life of Charles Dickens:" and cheaper editions of the same biographer's interesting lives of "Oliver Goldsmith" and "Sir John Elliot"; also a new work, descriptive of the "Ocean, the Atmosphere, and Life," by the French Communist Savan, Elisee Reclus ;" a "Life of Rousseau," by John Morley ; and an elegant work on Rome, by Francis Vey, illustrated by 250 magnificent engravings. Dr. Fullerton's recent and excellent work, "The Family Medical Guide," with plain directions for every case, and a List of Medicines required for any household, issued by this firm, will be reproduced by Messrs. Adam, Stevenson & Co., for the Canadian trade, in popular form, and will, no donbt, meet with a wide sale; and new and attractive editions of "Charles Dickens' Works" and "Ouida's Novels," are imported by Messrs. A. S. & Co, for this season's trade.

OF MESSRS. SMITH, ELDFR & Co's new and admirable *Kensington Edition* of "Thackeray's Works" in 12 vols., Crown 8vo., in various styles of binding, large importations have been made by Messrs. A. S. &. Co. and the trade may now be congratulated on having a really choice and compact library edition of this author at a reasonable price.

MESSRS. MACMILLAN & CO's announcements are important, as usual, embracing a work entitled "The Beginnings of Life," an account of the nature, modes of origin and transformation of lower organisms, by Dr. C. Bastain, F. R. S. ; "Essays on Eastern Questions," by W. G. Palgrave, author of "Narrative of a Journey through Central and Eastern Arabia"; the second volume of the translation from the French of Mons. Lanfrey, of a History of Napoleon I.;" and a translation from the French of Guillemin, by Mr. Norman Lockyer, of "The Forces of Nature," a popular introduction to the study of Physical Phenomena. In Theology we have two works with the imprimatur of this house, viz. Dr. C. J. Vaughan's Lent Lectures at the Temple (March, 1872) on "The Two Great Temptations," that of man and of Christ; and a Selection from the Sermons of the late Rev. J. McLeod Campbell, D.D., under the title of "Responsibility for the Gift of Eternal Life." Messrs. E. Thorold Rogers; "Elementary Astronomy," by R. A. Proctor; Morell's "Manual of Spelling," on the principles of contrast and comparison; and "Elementary Chemistry," by Prof. Barff. Of their illustrated serial issues, the 3rd volume of "Little Folks" and "The World of Wit and Humour" may be noted, both of which will prove attractive and popular works.

MESSRS. A. STRAHAN & Co. have in press a translation of a valuable and popular work on "Political Economy," from the French of Edmond A bout, by the translator of M. The book is to be ready about the end of October, and will be about \$4.00 or \$5.00 in price. A popular and cheaper edition of Capt. Butler's interesting work on the Red River and Far West Country, "The Great Lone Land," will be shortly issued by this firm, and Messrs. A. S. & Co. have arranged for supplies of this and the other novelties in the new lists of Messrs. Low, Son & Co.

MESSRS. TINSLET BROTHERS' list embraces many interesting works, the prominent of which are a new book of Travels by Capt. Burton, F.R.G.S., entitled "Unexplored Syria"; "Recollections," by J. R. Planche, a volume of dramatic reminiscence, Mr. Grant's entertaining volumes on "The Newspaper Press. its Origin, Progress and Present Position", The *Tunes*' Correspondent's "Letters on International Relations, before and During the War of 1870", a number of volumes of Sketches and Photographs of Travel; Collections of Essays, Light Papers, &c., and the new volumes in the various series of popular works published by this House.

FROM THE COMPILER OF "ENQUIRE WITHIN" comes a very useful and instructive manual for every household, viz., "The Domestic World, a practical guide in all the daily difficulties of the higher branches of domestic and social economy." Leifchild, on "The Higher Ministry of Nature," which has been written with the view of reconciling Theology and Natural Science, and as an aid to advanced Christian philosophy.

MESSRS. W. COLLINS, SONS & Co. have ready cheaper editions of the valuable family Commentaries of Jamieson, Faussett and Brown—perhaps the most serviceable popular Expository work of the day, and one thoroughly up with the times. They continue to issue new volumes in their important series of Elementary Science Text books prapared by professors of distinguished ability, and which deserve the notice of educationists in Canada.

MESSRS. BELL & DALDY have ready a book of interest to Canadian readers, in Sir Arthur Help's "Life and Labours of the late Mr. Brassey" C.E., whose engineering skill we have many examples of in the Country. A number of historical and theological works have also been lately issued by this firm, but which, from lack of space, we must defer notice of.




