The publishers will isue gratuitously with the Sept. number an elegant tinted duplicate title-proce, preserving the emblematic character of the magazine cover. Subscribers hid better, thorefore, wait recelpt of this before binaing the volume.

## THE APPROACHING BOOK SEASON,

Nothing could be more suggestive of the prosperity of a country, or could more satisfactorily indicate its status among nations than a statement oí its intellectual condition and the record of its book consumption. Canada, in this respect, stands well; and, judging from the value and extent of her book-inportations and the development and activity of her book-trade, she asserts for herself a high position in the intellectual scale of nations. No doubt, when she becomes a producer in the bookmorld, and has done more in developing a native literature than she has hitherto done, her people may more justly claim recognition of this feature in her historythe active literary taste and habits of her people. In proportion to the pupulation, hovever, there is n 0 dependency of the Crown whose book-imports exceed that of Canala; and the extent of the increase of that trade is a remarkable and gratifying feature in ber national progress. And though our native production has not Been very considerable, yet, bearing in mind how our porinting industrics have been trammeled by the foolish restrictions of the English Copyright law-from Which the American press has been free, and which has been
the great stimulus to its development-we have no reason to be ashamed of our achievement in this respect.
What the value of the total amnual book-production of Cauadx is we camot place before our readers; but the following figures in regard to one City, that of Montreal (not the chief literary centre of the Dominion, it will be borne in mind) will indicate in some degree, the progress of the trade amongst us. In 1824, with a population of 20,000 , Nontreal had one Iron printing press (the only one in the country, we believe). In 1847, the population being 84,000, the first Book-press (Adams' platen press) was introduced; and to-day, having now a population of about 130,000, one house alone, that of Mr. John Lovell, has 14 Book printing-presses rumning, and employs over 100 printers, besides a large stafforbookbinders and others engaged in the kindred branthes of the trade. The Newspaper press of the country is equally active, Ontario alone, having some 25 daily newspapers, 25 monthly periodicals and 200 weekly issues of the press. These facts are encouraging; and, when the high character, generally, of these issues is considered, we may safely augur well for the future of the country. Moreover, should the native trade have justice done it in regard to the republishing of English Copyrights for the home markets, in competition with that of the United States, we shall, no doubt, ere long, have to chronicle a more remarkable and gratifying progress. In the meantime, the Book-imports of the Dominion, as we have stated, are very large and continue each year to increase at a rapid ratio. The age is marvellously a producing one, and in the field of literature, thauks to the activity, thought and enterprise of authors and publishers, books which formerly were the luxury of the few, are now the heritage and possession of the many. Each yearincreases the value and importance of the publishers' catalogues; and, with the lists of the current productions of the das, the attractions of the producing markets are many and varied. With the other importing houses of the country, the publishing firm of this serial have been active in these markets this season ; and through the channel of the retail trade, the public may expect an ample feast of good things in literature which must delight the most fastidious and appease the most roracious reader.

We append the jottings of a portion of the doings of the home publishing houses for the new season, and our advertising pages will give some further information in regard to these forthcoming issucs. In our next nuunber we purpose to supply a list of, and some information in
regard to, the now publications in tite Educational World,-an important field to a large proportion of the readers in our communities, and a department in which Messrs. Adan, Stevenson \& Co., have made extensive and important purchases. This firm, it may be added, now represent every important British Publishing House, besides the leading houses of the American trade; and it may serve to indicate the extent of the trade connections of the Colony with the Mother Country in the businoss of book-importing, when we state thant Messrs. A., S \& Co., have direct dealings with over ono hundred British Publishing Houses, the more important of whose publications will be found in their Trade Catalogues, and represented in their warerooms.
Mr. Joen myrray will hhortly publish a new work by Mr. Darwin, on "The Emotions in Kan and Animals." This work may be considered as a sequel to the author's interesting volumes on "The Descent of Man," and will, no doubt, be hailed with a good deal of interest. It is to be ready about the middle of November, and will have a number of photographic illustrations. From the same house we shall have the second volume of "The Spaakers Commentary," on "The Historical Books," prepared by the Bishop of Bath and Wells, the Rev. T. E. Espen, and Rev. George Rawliuson; a "Life of George Grote, the Historian of Greece," edited, with selections from his correspondetice, by Mrs. Grote ; a work by Mr. Chas. M. Clode, Solicitor to tho War Department, on "The Administration of Justice under Military and Martial Law"; a "History of the Royal Regiment of Artillery," by Capt. F. Duncau, the lst volume of which will bring the history to the peace of 1783; and a work of Lord Houghton's, entitled "Monographs." Mr. Mur. ray will also have soon ready cheaper editions of Sir R. Nurchison's "Siluria, a History of the Oldest Rooks in the British Isles and other Countries," and of Earl Stanhope's "Reign of Queen Anne." A new edition of the late Mr. Grote's profound work on "Aristotle," edited by Alex. Ban, LL.D., and G. C. Robertson, in two volumes, is also preparing. Two recent issues from Mr. Murray's press, which have met with very encouragiug sale, we commend to our readers;-the one anexceedingly interesting hography, that of the Rev. Dr. Cooke, of Belfast, by his son-in-law, Prof. J. L. Porter, D.D., aud the otbera valuablestatistical worl, of greatservice to the commercial classes of the country: Prof. Levi's "History of British Commerce, and of the Economic Progress of the British Nation." The period covered by the volume is from 1765 to 1870 , and the worl may be had, as well as all the important publications of Mr. Murray's press, from any native bookseller, through the house of the publishers of this serial. Messrs. A. S. \& Co. make also Targe importatious of the varions educational works issued by Mrr. Mruray, particularly those of Dr. Wm. Smith, in history and classics, and will now supply them as advantageously as the American reprints of those well known and approved text books.
Messes. Lovaravi's new publications embrace a valuable referenco work, prepared with a vast amount of labour, by the late B. B. Woodmard, B.A., Librarian to the Queen, and edited by Wm. L. R. Cates, entitled "A

Encyclopadia of Chronology, Historical and Biographical." The work comprises the dates of all the grent erentsin history, including treaties, alliạnces, wars, battles, \&cc. Incidents in the lives of eminent men and their works, scientific and geographical discoveries, mechanical inventions, and social, domestic and economical imprpvements, \&c., \&c. Mr. Buckle's "Miscollaneous and Posthumous Works"; Mr. Glennio's work on "The Mnnning Land ; (Travel and Discussion in the BirthCountries of Christianity with the late Mr. Buckle) and Mr. R. A. Proctor's new work, "Orbs Around Us," will be among the forth-coming issues of this firm; also a handy text book for divinity students, by the Rev. W. E.
